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Chairperson's Message

In 2006 InCite Youth Arts delivered 10 projects and numerous performances involving young people, arts mentors, and local schools and community groups. These projects produced some stunning results: a 22m long permanent mosaic path at the Hidden Valley Town Camp Cultural Centre and a DVD documenting its creation and meanings, a hip hop night on the rooftop of The Lane, and a beautiful multi-layered summer dance performance at Sadadeen Primary school amongst them.

InCite's programs would not be possible without the dedicated work of Co-Artistic Directors Jenine Mackay and Virginia Heydon, and the specialist arts-workers contracted to mentor and deliver each project. Jenine has continued to pull in funding from a range of sources. As we all know, grant-writing is arduous and its outcomes are never guaranteed. InCite looks forward to expanding our funding base in 2008 to include philanthropic foundation investment. Thanks to Jenine for her tireless energy towards this essential work. Many thanks are also due to Virginia for her day-to-day coordination of the InCite office and local partnerships. Usually, working solo on the ground in Alice Springs, Virginia's commitment to InCite is well known throughout town. Thanks also to Mariaa Randall for her work with the Sadadeen Primary kids, to Sue Codee, Philomena Hali, Cait Ryan, Vincent Lamberti, Jane Young and Agnes Abbott for their work on the Hidden Valley Mosaic, to Ali Cobby-Eckerman for her final work on the "Artastic Bush" Project, and to Morganics and Daniel Burdon for their work as Hip Hop mentor & mentoree.

A lack of space at the Red Hot Arts Space has cramped InCite's style for too long. In 2007 InCite will prioritize moving to new premises. I hope that with added breathing space, including an outdoor area, InCite will become a place that young people feel comfortable using; to visit and to kick around their ideas for new projects. There is certainly a lot of need for a purposeful downtown youth spot. I encourage all of our members – especially young people - to make suggestions to the Board and the Co-Artistic Directors for how such a space could best be used to fill a gap in the youth landscape. In partnership with other local organisations InCite can continue to provide alternatives to the boredom, apathy, frustrations and social tensions that all too often become emblematic of young people's lives in small towns.

In March 2007 InCite will hold a stall and launch our 2007 Program at the Harmony Day activities held at the Alice Springs Town Council. Our participation in this event is an opportunity to contribute to a local rendering of the meanings of a national day first proclaimed by the Department of Immigration, Multicultural and Indigenous Affairs in 1997 (before that Commonwealth division became known as the Department of Immigration and Citizenship). Sadly Alice Springs is not currently a place associated with 'harmony' in the broader national consciousness, and'youth'has once again become the name of a perceived problem sometimes also arraigned alongside inflammatory concepts like 'anti-social behaviour'. Young people are our future, and this fact is more than a cliché. It is a dynamic relativity: at one time or other each of our lives will be governed by people younger than us. It is the responsibility of InCite and other local organisations to work together towards the deeper, more ancient, meanings of harmony – the concordance of different sounds rather than the chime of a single assimilated note played in a dominant key – and to keep this ideal in view as each new group of young people start to find and raise their voices in this community.

InCite Mentorships focussed on the needs of the Mentorees; fostered care and support; and encouraged the Mentoree to develop to their fullest potential. Congratulations to the Alice Mentorees, in particular Phillip and Daniel who we look forward to working with again in 2007. The Mt Liebig Hip Hop Mentorees proved their talents and dedication through their participation, a great achievement. Congratulations and commendations to you all.

The scale of development of Arts ACA was yet another inspiration in 2006.

The inclusion of the "Artastic" Exhibition in the Alice Desert Festival with all the support required from the team was unprecedented.

Building on the partnership with Waltja, InCite also partnered with the Mt Liebig Council to deliver Hip Hop Programs with resounding success.

To all the truly dedicated and wonderfully inspirational Artists /Mentors and Mentorees involved in the 2006 Program, we thank you and appreciate you!

To all the unseen work by all the people who have contributed, including the Board, I thank you sincerely.

Co Artistic Director/Coordinator's Message

2006 was a full and exciting year in the life of the organisation.

The highlights:

Hidden Valley Community Centre Mosaic Project

This collaborative project between InCite & Tangentyere Council established a great creative link between this group of significant senior Indigenous Artists and InCite. The project resulting in a 22 metre pathway & 6 metre circle feature of bush tucker created positive role models for young people about the knowledge of traditional foods, nurturing community pride and valuing the environment. Steps were initiated to identify a series of images from the pathway for a postcard series to promote and profile the project.

Original Hip Hop Music and Dance Mentoring program

As a requested extension of the 2005 "Kido Manuvas" Martial Dance program InCite hosted this two stage program offering young participants and Mentorees hands-on skills & experience to tell their own stories through the youth relevant Hip Hop medium. The program integrated Mentorees working closely with the artists in Alice Springs as well as Mt Liebig in partnership Waltja Tjutangku Palyapayi & Watlyawanu Community Government Council.

With the expert support of nationally recognised Hip Hop artists committed to passing on their skills and empowering young people to voice their stories, the project resulted in 29 original music tracks, a professional quality video clip, and three informal public performances; "Hip Hop Up Top" gigs at The Lane Restaurant Café and Town Council Night Markets. With the support of the artists, this gave the Mentorees valuable experience performing their original compositions to warm audience response.

Artastic Bush Program

2006 saw the culmination of this collaborative visual art project with Waltja Tjutangku Palyapayi. The young artists from participating communities of Kintore, Mt Liebig and Santa Teresa exhibited their vibrant, highly coloured works at the Aboriginal Australia Art & Crafts Centre during the Alice Desert Festival in September.

Arts ACA

Arts ACA, in partnership with InCite, revealed great strength and development with the realisation of a visual arts program of workshops culminating in an exhibition at the Alice Springs Town Library and postcard series as well as the creation of a poster for the public launch of International Day of People with Disability.

I would like to acknowledge our InCite staff, guest artists, local tutors, funding organisations and the generosity of community and business support that has enabled us to deliver such a rewarding program. My thanks go to our Board of Management; we have all learnt a lot. It is a great joy to also thank and acknowledge the young and emerging artists who participated in InCite programs in 2006.

I am indebted to Jenine Mackay for her outstanding skills & commitment to InCite and youth arts in Alice Spring. Thank you. I am proud and honoured to be a part of this innovative team.

2006 Projects



Hidden Valley Community Centre Mosaic Project April 3 - 28

Hidden Valley Town Camp Community together with Tangentyere Council and InCite created an "entranceway" to the Community Centre designed and owned by the community. This is a symbol of 'entering into' a harmonious meeting

place transforming traditional and contemporary values into the everyday environment. A 22m entrance pathway and 6m circle feature of bush tucker was designed as a legacy for future generations of learning by young people about the value and knowledge of traditional foods. The project created positive role modelling by senior Artists to the young people about nurturing community pride and valuing the environment. Youth Week workshops highlighted young people's involvement. This artwork will compliment other developments being planned and undertaken at the Community Centre.

"We don't want to stop working – it's looking real good." "We only want to do bush tucker – nothing

else".

"It looks real nice – our favourite one is......" Hidden Valley Artists

While the project was a group effort, obviously the main direction and inspiration for the designs was by the Indigenous women as this was their project, their community centre, their home, and their turf. It was about what they wanted to express. My role was to impart



technical skills as well as suggestions and guidance on design and use of colour, while also providing mentoring in the community cultural development processes involved. The commitment, dedication and enthusiasm of the whole team was fantastic. We all had a role and in the process grew to know what was needed. For the Indigenous artists who tirelessly created it, its about what they hold close- the bush foods and plants- symbols of growth, life, and sustainability, and this also keeps their culture alive, for their family and future generations.

Bush tomatoes were drawn up and work began with everyone being involved. Some of the ladies began the next section of Parakeelya blossoms so two segments were worked on simultaneously as the work needed to progress due to time running out. Everyone worked with keenness and pride at what had been achieved – knocking off was difficult. Wild tobacco and the quandong were established and worked on throughout the day. Both were almost completed and looking stunning, but pack up time came too soon again. The Mosaic project was a wonderful learning experience - working with all the Hidden Valley ladies, Cait Ryan, (Hidden Valley coordinator) Sue Codee, Mosaic Artist and InCite Youth Arts coordinators, Virginia Heydon and Jenine Mackay. This project flowed, with each week being productive. The end result of this work of art says it all. Thank you for this opportunity. *Philomeng Hali, Artist/Mentor*

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Artastic Bush Program Workshop & Exhibition Kintore Workshop March: 13-17, Exhibition: August 31 - September 10

In 2006 InCite's focus has been on delivering programs at a "grass roots" level in consultation with our Community

Partners & Collaborators. We continued to develop our partnership with Waltja Tjutangku Palyapayi which involved a second workshop program at Kintore and culminated in an exhibition of the canvases & bush toys created by the young artists from Kintore, Mt Liebig and Santa Teresa. Artworks were themed on "Nganampa Ngurra" - Our Country - what's good about living where you do / what makes your community special / unique.

The Waltja's Reconnect Team's experience, perseverance and connection to each of the three communities involved provided the vital foundations for the arts programs to be successfully undertaken. Thank you to the communities of Mt Liebig, Kintore and Santa Teresa for their generosity in welcoming us and supporting the opportunities to work with these talented young artists. This collaboration has enhanced the creative and life skills gained by the young participants benefiting their individual personal growth and as members of our diverse society.

We proudly showcased these new & innovative Indigenous youth artworks as part of the 2006 Alice Desert Festival Program enabling the community of Central Australia to enjoy the opportunity the Exhibition offered to share in celebrating the creative talents of these emerging young Centralian Artists. Our commendations and congratulations to all the young artists whose works are part of this exhibition. We look forward to seeing more!

Stage 1 Mt Liebig Workshops: July 17-21 Alice Springs Workshops: July 24 – August 11

Stage 2 Mt Liebig Workshops: October 9 - 13 Alice Springs Workshops: October 16 - 27

Building on our 2005 Community Dance Mentoring Program, in 2006 the focus was on engaging young emerging Artists in this Mentoring Program of Hip Hop Dance & Music. Mt Liebig and Alice Springs Mentorees, young individuals and groups participated in workshops with nationally acclaimed Guest Artists/ Mentors and the local Mentorees.

One of the main things I thought worked well was having both a male and a female dance teacher. Culturally information is better exchanged from the same gender members, as we found out at Yipirinya School. I believe the work InCite does is great and I am very grateful to be apart of the process that delivers dance classes to youth within this community. Mariaa Randall, Dance Artist/Mentor

Morganics was a great teacher, steeping many of his ideas about production, lyric writing and break-dance in the true history of Hip-hop. He taught me some great skills personally. These included, but were not limited to: staying dedicated to the music, lyrics and culture and not letting anything or anyone get in the way of what you want to do in life. Performance skills, such as good preparation, Production skills, such as mixing sounds, tracks and balancing vocals as well as sampling form vinyl and CD's, creating new sounds from old ones through effects controls, and the vocal recording process. The other mentoree, Phillip Coombe, and I made a great new song titled 'Confusion' - related to the troubles many young, Central Australians have in trying to avoid being sucked in to drugs and alcohol. I would like to thank all funding bodies, government agencies and the InCite Youth Arts Board of Management for making this possible - the future is looking very bright for our community youth arts organisation. I would like to extend a very special thank you to Virginia Heydon and Jenine Mackay - this has been one of the most rewarding, informative and character-shaping experiences of my life.

Daniel Burdon, Mentoree

I would like to be involved as a Hip Hop Mentoree in 2007. Daniel & I get on well and I would like to maintain contact and work with him further next year. I like the idea of us having the recording program equipment and being able to access this for my creative development. I would like more performance experience and feel that it will take time. It would be good if InCite helps young people like Daniel & I who are already have an experience of Hip Hop. This would provide a bigger group of peers who are on the same development level in the group. To involve them in the Mentoring program as well would be good. The Mt Liebig workshops, the mentoring, worked really well I think, both Daniel and Phil were really hungry for the more in depth discussion and advice. I think the schools got a kick out of the performances too and it gave the students that were keen a real boost of confidence. Doing two shows was good for this as well, it meant they built up their confidence a little more, got more experience, more exposure. The public performances also linked the project to a broader part of the community which I think is really valuable. *Morganics, Guest Artist/Mentor*

As one can hear on the compiled set of

recorded tracks from the many sessions we held, lyrics are rapped as well as sung, and appear in both in English and in Indigenous languages, from Arrente to Pintupi/Luritja. The content appears equally as vast exhibiting a range of topical terrain; stretching from Aboriginal Dreamtime (as in the track entitled, Amundurrngu Tjukurrpa, from Mt. Liebig) to international and local politics (exemplified in the tracks recorded with the nominated mentorees, both Daniel Burdon (i.e.: "We Don't Sleep") and Phillip Coombe (i.e.: "Love vs. Fear") to social matters, daily life and routines, such as hanging out in the town centre; or in the case of one of the tracks (rhymed in Pintupi/Liritja as well as the Arrente language in combination) the ingredients on the fire being cooked for dinner - composed at the Red Hot Art Space by the kids from Gap Youth Centre and Tangentyere Council.

When considering all the sessions throughout the month, I believe that some of the most empowering moments of collective satisfaction and creative joy (in terms of processes as a lead up to an eventual and gratifying end result/performance) occurred in Mt. Liebig over that initial week. This series of sessions allowed for perhaps the most intimate connections to be made; connection not only on a person to person level but also, in regard to the music as seamlessly bonded with the dance component of the project. Below are the lyrics for one out of the five songs we recorded during the five days we spent working there:

Outcomes achieved between January - end June 2006 included:

· Engaging Arts Worker, Monika McInerney to continue the consultation process with the community

- Workshop, consultation and preparation of 'Strategic Action Plan 2006 2009'
- Success of funding submissions for projects to occur in the second half of 2006

• Established the foundations from which Arts ACA will grow, including within the Arts and Disability networks

The feedback session which I facilitated was again extremely positive with one child saying 'Fridays are boring without InCite Youth Arts'. The movement was described as 'positive and energising'. The scriptwriters loved the process of scriptwriting and said it allowed them to 'think out of the box'. 'you can think anything you want' was another comment.

AiS Sadadeen Primary & InCite (Artist in Schools) Term 4

Students worked with specialist Artist Mariaa Randall to develop a movement and drama performance as a collaborative group focusing on the You Can Do IT (YCDI) Social Skills Program, linking directly with Sadadeen school

philosophy and integrated the learning within relevant curriculum components of the school program. Students were involved in aspects of the production from choreographing the movement sequences to contributing to the design of the T-shirt costumes and promoting the performance. The workshop process focussed on developing new skills in creating original performance that gave voice to and nurtured young people's understanding and practice of working collaboratively. There was a big finale presentation at a whole school assembly and also to students at Ross Park Primary, their buddy school, as part of the "Tribes" Program.

Overall the program worked well and ran smoothly. The final performances were great for me and the students. I got the opportunity to see some of the children shine brighter then I could ever have imagined. To mention a few:

• Fatah was a natural on stage and began to get more confident the more we rehearsed. This changed his contribution to the group i.e. he was more assertive & had confidence in his ideas & expressing them.

- Brooke had very little interest at the beginning of the program but once given a leader role she change completely. She attained a lot of the choreography and directions. She was able to help direct other students and show them the moves.

16 Jason always had great moves and ideas. In the beginning he tended to keep them to

himself and his partners. By the performance time he had stepped on the stage and went from a kid in the AiS program to a great performer. The transformation was gradual i.e. with every exercise that was presented to the whole class he slow developed further and further. Acacia Hill Physical Skills & Expression Project Term 2

This initiative aimed to extend the physical and creative vocabulary of these young people in a program designed to be inclusive of a broad range of physical conditions and focussing on extending physical a-bilities while taking into

consideration dis-abilities.

In the workshops we explored the individual physical expression of each participant. This was done through a process of each participant performing a short solo or duet dance/ movement improvisation to the group in an informal setting each week as well as more formally during the end of term presentation. This process allowed for each individual's manner of engaging and range of abilities to be identified and expanded. Some participants responded well to verbal instruction, others to physical example. Those with very little movement capacity enjoyed being moved by their partner. *Nic Hempel, Dance/Movement Artist*



Hip Hop with Alice Springs High School (ASHS Breakers) Term 4
