JUKEBOX

Our new school show JUKEBOX kicked off at the start of this year. The 4-5 week busy rehearsal period paid off as everyone enjoyed working on the production. Our very own Gillion Minervini wrote the show and Mike Canfield directed it. We also had guests from outside the Company involved with the development of the production - William

with the development of the production - William Forsythe who choreographed the dances for the songs and Philippa Playford who did a wonderful job designing a brilliant set - a huge jukebox!

The show has travelled to schools in the Sydney metro and outer regional areas for the last 2 months and will continue to do so until the end of 1997.

JUKEBOX is proving to be a hit with school audiences, ranging from late primary to early secondary. The show focuses on increasing awareness of Deafrelated issues based on personal experiences of the actors as well as portraying a positive image through some brilliant song signing. Audiences are given an opportunity to learn to sign a popular song. JUKE-BOX is a dynamic show using a blend of music, comedy, dance and visual theatre.

SHOW AND TELL

Rehearsals have just started for this new show despecially designed for our very young audiences - Preschool to Year 2. Sofya Gollan (an old time Toddie) is directing it and it is good to have her back with the Compony. The actors Robert, Nina and Medina will bring a famous Austrolian children's story to life as well as give an opportunity for the children to learn to sign a well known song. SHOW AND TELL is expected to "hit the road" in late April.

DEAF DRAMA WEEKEND

We have just had our first of 2 Deaf Drama Weekends planned for this year. A total of 20 children (aged 7-12 yrs) participated from different backgrounds to join together for what was an active non-stop weekend. We had Deaf children both signing and oral, hearing impaired children and a couple of CODA's (Children of Deof Adults).

On Friday night we ate our first meol together, introduced ourselves, played games and activities and got to know one another.

Saturday was a busy day, scheduled with circus acts (juggling, etc.), 'working tagether' activities, visual communication exercises and acrobotic skills. At night after dinner we played more games until bedtime.

Up early on Sunday morning (eek!) to do some more circus acts, followed by a session of learning basic dance steps. After lunch our creativity was 'put to the test' to make up stories visually and we finished off with playing a visual version of the game Pictionary.

Certificates of completion were presented to the 'little graduates' and then parents came at 5pm ta take them home. Phew!

The weekend was held at the North Rocks Institute for Deaf and Blind Children. Mike, Pam, and the actors stayed through the whole weekend ensuring things went without a





hitch! Apart from ATOD leading some of the sessions we invited some guest teachers - Sofya Gollon (acrobatics), Louise de Beuzeville (circus skills) and Helen Dallas (dance). It was a pleasure to have them with us.

The weekend was a

big one for all and we are sure that the children went home with new knowledge, new friends and plenty of stories to tell!!

VICTORIAN/TASMANIAN TOUR

The actors will pack their bags again soon for a tour down south of Australia. They head straight to Victoria on 29th April for 3 weeks presenting our new show JUKEBOX, organised by the Victorian Arts Council.

Then, to Tasmania for a 2 week stay, presenting JUKEBOX and our community show HANDS & TALES to general audiences in Hobart, Launceston and Burnie. Porticipants at the National Deafness

Conference in Hobart will have the opportunity to see us in HANDS & TALES. While in Tosmania, we will be joined by our Artistic Director Mike Canfield who will be the MC for the show and Pam Spicer,



our interpreter. We look forward to meeting old and new faces from the Australian Deaf Community at the Conference.

Finally, the actors travel back to Victoria to continue with JUKEBOX in schools for two weeks. This marks the end of their seven week tour and they will arrive back home to Sydney in mid June.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

The Australian Youth Foundation held a conference at Sydney University and invited us to perform JUKEBOX to their participants from all over Australia. It was held after their dinner and turned out to be a successful and enjoyable evening for all (including the actors!). We received a letter of thanks which included the following comment... "Through their professional and enthusiastic performance, Caroline, Medina, Robert and Nina touched us and made us laugh with them. They enabled us, as hearing people, to cotch a glimpse of what it's like to be deaf in a hearing world and hopefully our attitudes will have been changed by the experience..." This certainly proves that the message portrayed though the show JUKEBOX is reaching out to our audiences!!

Telstra held a launch of the new program that provides free TTYs to Deaf Australians. Through the launch we presented an excerpt from JUKE-BOX - a short skit along with signing a song relating to TTY's!!

The Powerhouse Museum held a Communications
Theme Week in March for high school students
Yrs 7 - 12. A variety of events were conducted by
various guest artists and teachers. Mike Canfield
presented a workshop ses-

sion everyday during that week to all students who visited the museum. He demonstrat-



ed a story in our very own visual style, visual vernacular, told of the history of ATOD, had the students up on their feet copying facial and body expressions and even had some students volunteering in a few exercises. The organiser of this event commented on what a wonderful and worthwhile session he gave.


WORKSHOPS
