HOW TO MAKE A "WHEELCHAIR" **BOOKING WITH BASS:**

Prepare the following details and have them ready:

- 1. All the details for a "standard" booking.
- 2. Find out where the wheelchair seats are. It even helps to have seat numbers. Such details can be found from EASE, the venue, or BASS on 617 8213.

PHONE BOOKINGS:

Ring 617 8213. You may find that you are referred to either the venue or a BASS agency. Remember that the wheelchair seats are very rarely sold and it is worth persisting along all avenues. Don't hesitate to ring us if you are having problems.

A TWO HOUR JOURNEY TO SEE SEVEN LITTLE AUSTRALIANS Five adult members and two staff from the A.T.C. Grace Berglund Centre Warragul travelled to Melbourne to view the musical play, "Seven Little Australians". We left Warragul at around 10am travelling by bus with the journey taking about 2 hours.

When we arrived at the Comedy Theatre we were able to park just outside. Entry to the theatre from our van was quite easy except for one step at the front. Once inside the fover we were able to purchase some sweets from the kiosk before going to our seats.

The performance itself was very entertaining and enjoyable with drama and singing throughout as well as some laughter thrown in. The setting consisted of many scenes which were moved into place by ropes from above the stage. Actors were dressed in traditional costumes that took you back to the early days.

COUNTER BOOKINGS:

Counter bookings can be made from any BASS agency however it is best to go, if possible, to an agency related to the venue. For example: State Theatre Box Office for all bookings at the Arts Centre (including Melbourne Concert Hall, State Theatre, Playhouse Theatre, Studio); National Tennis Centre Box Office for all bookings to the National Tennis Centre and Melbourne Sports and Entertainment Centre (Glasshouse). Athenaeum Theatre for all bookings to that venue.

THINGS TO KEEP IN MIND

When making a wheelchair booking you have to keep at least two things in mind. One is that because BASS does not necessarily have access to all the seats (in venues other than those just mentioned) it may be better to buy tickets from another source. The other point is that when a BASS operator says the wheelchair seats are unavailable it may be because the tickets are still on hold. The operator should check. If you remain doubtful you will need to contact the people responsible for wheelchair bookings. This unfortunately depends on the venue. Appropriate phone numbers can also be found in this newsletter

Helpful Hints

When booking wheelchair seats, or any seating with a special requirement, try Dallas Brooks Hall, on 419 2288, before BASS. The Hall sometimes has access to tickets and staff obviously know the best and most accessible seating areas. Office hours are 9am - 4pm.

The venue has three wheelchairs for people who require a chair. Notify the Hall in advance, on 419 2288, of your requirement and time of arrival.

BASS MADE EASY =

This newsletter is about how to use BASS.

BASS is a ticketing agency owned by the Victorian Arts Centre Trust and was originally created to sell tickets to Trust Venues. It has expanded so rapidly that there have been a few growing pains. BASS stands for Best Available Seating Service. There are BASS agencies throughout Melbourne, Victoria and the rest of Australia.

In one way or another the vast majority of EASE tickets come via BASS. It is important to understand how BASS functions if you want to gain access to much of Melbourne's entertainment. Although BASS has sole rights to sell tickets to The Victorian Arts Centre, Melbourne Sports and Entertainment. Centre and The National Tennis Centre it does not, contrary to popular belief, control ticket sales at a whole range of other venues.

Because there are other agencies selling tickets, often to a show also handled by BASS, there may well be that if you have a special seating

Many people also think BASS has responsibility for ticket prices. BASS charges a commission on each ticket booking charge for phone bookings with BASS, but they do not determine the ticket cost. Promoters set ticket prices by agreement with artist and performers' management.

On another page of this newsletter you will find advice on how to make bookings with BASS. Problems often arise when people try to make wheelchair bookings - EASE has stumbled a few times - and there are complications if you want to buy tickets for special circumstances. But it can be simplified if you understand how BASS works.

All tickets sold by BASS come through their computer. Venue seating is divided into segments and displayed on the operator's screen as a block. Tickets are sold in a specified order. When you make a phone booking your request is typed into the computer and processed automatically. You have no choice about where you sit, apart from differently priced areas. The seats are chosen by the computer as the best available positions. If you have a special need it is necessary to circumvent this automatic

BASS, through the computer, may place various areas of the auditorium on hold. Quite often wheelchair seats and their accompanying seats are such areas. When the BASS operator tries to bring up wheelchair seats on the screen continued over

VENUE NOTES DALLAS BROOKS HALL

300 Albert Street **EAST MELBOURNE** (Another entrance off Victoria Parade) **Auditorium**

Seating capacity: 2,050 Wheelchair capacity: Flexible. Wheelchair seats are scattered throughout the stalls area of the auditorium. Central aisle, rows A-P, where there is space for wheelchairs, is sloped, some may find this uncomfortable. Transfer is possible down any of the aisles rows A-P into seats numbered 7, 8, 19, 20, 31 or 32. The stalls front row seating is on the flat. Seating arrangements in this area are flexible. You would need to check with the venue for suitable transfer seating in the front rows. Remember, unlike most venues rows are marked from the back of the auditorium. In other words row A is the back row. No wheelchair areas are available in the upper two seating levels.

Parking

No "disabled" parking bays in the surrounding streets. "Disabled" Parking for cars, not buses, available beneath Dallas Brooks Hall. Very few spaces are available. Prior booking essential. Ring 419 2288 after 5.00pm and talk to building security.

Wheelchair Access

There are two ways to access the hall without encountering steps, both are off Eades Street:

- 1. Follow path at the centre of the building and onto the surrounding walkway. Turn right and follow the walkway to the Albert Street entrance. Security personnel in the Albert Street Foyer will direct you to a lift. The Dallas Brooks Hall Foyer is one floor up.
- 2. At the Victoria Parade corner of the building, follow the path until coming to a ramp which swings under the front steps and up to the Hall's main entrance. This ramp is temporarily blocked by scaffolding.

Toilets

One toilet ("multi sexed") for wheelchair users next to the Victoria Parade Entrance.

In the case of the Victorian Arts Centre. National Tennis Centre and Sports and Entertainment Centre. wheelchair seats are controlled by the venue. BASS operators need to contact the venues to have a hold lifted. They can then issue you tickets.

EASE can assist with most enquiries so please don't hesitate to give us a call. Remember that there is an exciting summer coming up. Melbourne will be

HOW TO MAKE A "STANDARD" BOOKING WITH BASS:

Prepare the following details and have them ready:

- 1. Name of Performance
- 2. Date and Time of Performance
- Venue
- 4. Numbér of tickèts you wish to buy
- 5. Ticket price and therefore how much you expect to pay.
- 6. Where you would like to sit (only for counter bookings). You have no choice over seating when making a phone booking but can discuss seating over the counter.
- 7. Credit card number (for phone bookings). Cash, cheque or credit card (for counter bookings). Remember, BASS charge a phone booking fee. This is charged automatically when you make a phone booking and will be on top of the ticket price.
- 8. Your postal address (for phone bookings). Tickets booked over the phone will be posted out to you.

PHONE BOOKINGS:

Ring 11500 or 11522 (for a sports booking)

COUNTER BOOKINGS:

Turn up at any one of the BASS agencies either in person or by representative. To find the closest agency ring BASS 11566 or EASE 6998497

HOW TO MAKE A "SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS" BOOKING:

This is for bookings where you require as few steps as possible, good sight lines, seating close to the front, aisle seats or seats in induction loop areas etc. Prepare the following details: 1. All the details for a standard booking. 2. Find out exactly where you need to sit, including, if possible, seat numbers. Such details can be found from EASE. the venue, or BASS on 617 8213. **PHONE BOOKINGS:** Ring 617 8213. Seats in this category are

not usually on hold you should not therefore be referred elsewhere. **COUNTER BOOKINGS:**

As for "standard" bookings.

HELPFUL HINTS:

The more details you have prepared the easier it is for BASS staff. If you know exactly what you want right down to seat numbers or seating areas there can be little confusion. Remember also that BASS may not have access to all seats. Some can be reserved for sale through another agency or venue. The Comedy Theatre, for example, sells tickets to all its shows. For wheelchair or special requirement bookings it is better to go, in this instance, to the Comedy. The same principle applies to some events at the Dallas Brooks Hall. continued back page.
