CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

A year of momentous change

I've found that every time I've made a radical change it's helper me feel buoyant as an artist.

D AVID BOWIE, in acknowledging the artistic invigoration that comes from major change, could well have been describing the challenge and euphoria that Arts Access SA has experienced in the past year.

Following an extensive review during 2005, which included a major consultation with all our stakeholders, the Board determined that it was essential for Arts Access SA to refocus the way it worked and to restructure the Organisation.

As a result, 2006 has been a year of momentous change. We have implemented a wide range of recommendations and applied the new philosophy to every sphere of our work.

In February 2006 I was pleased to welcome Arts Access SA's inaugural fulltime Executive Director, **Mr Peter Tregligns**, who was charged with developing operations and raising the profile of Arts Access SA.

The new strategic plan and constitution – including the new membership format – were formally adopted at the Annual General Meeting in May 2006. A new name for the Organisation was approved, Arts Access SA more properly reflecting the new focus of advocacy, communication, promotion and leadership inherent in our role as the peak body for arts and disability. This name links us closely with the national Arts Access Australia network.

In applying this new philosophy we have implemented new administrative and budget processes, revamped the IT system network, employed new staff and developed a raft of new policies and procedures to strengthen the governance of the Organisation. Amidst this expansion the office has also undergone major refurbishment, all of which has been smoothly coordinated under the splendid control of our Office Coordinator, Emma Wilsher.

We have also begun developing arts and disability programs to enable opportunities and access for disabled people to participate in the arts as an audience member, a technician or an

artist in their own right. Our aim is to use these programs as models for advocacy to empower disabled people.

One perfect example is the long-term community partnership between Arts Access SA and the **Governor Hindmarsh Hotel**, who have given unwavering support to our rebadged monthly **Club Cooi** events for twelve years. This partnership was recognised by being selected as the 2006 State winner and a national finalist for the Prime Minister's Business Community Partnerships Award.

A particular focus for Arts Access SA during the year has been the development of the communication tools necessary to promote our mainstream and inclusive approach. The development of our weekly radio show, **Radio Cool**; the launch of our new website and regular eNews services; and the appointment of our enthusiastic Communications Officer, **Christopher Wainwright**, are important first steps of a comprehensive communication strategy to promote Arts Access SA, disabled artists and their achievements.

The most ambitious embodiment of Arts Access SA's new philosophy has been the reform of the High Beam festival into **High Beam Local**, based around the International Day of Disabled Persons on 3 December, and the International **High Beam Global** that is now included directly within the Adelaide Fringe Festival. Although this has been the first year for the new model of High Beam all events have been tremendously successful, far exceeding our expectations, and initial response is very positive. Our Arts Industry Liaison Officer, **Phil Neack**, deserves particular acknowledgement for this success, along with **Claire Thackray**, our Volunteers Co-ordinator, and the army of dedicated volunteers, without whom none of the events could take place.

As the Fringe Festival is now to be held annually we aim to ensure that High Beam Global will become a sustainable annual event. The opportunities for South Australian disabled artists to present their work on a truly international stage, and to attract international artists to South Australia, have never been greater or more exciting. Arts Access SA will build ever greater international relationships to improve opportunities for disabled artists to participate equally alongside their able bodied peers.

Arts Access SA has striven to raise its profile as a peak body organisation. We have attained membership of the SA Council of Social Service, the peak nongovernment representative body for community services in South Australia, and National Disability Services, the national industry association for disability services, which gives Arts Access SA the opportunity to contribute and to be heard at the peak level of non-government and not-for-profit organisations. We have also made strenuous efforts to develop strong relationships with key individuals and groups, particularly in the disability, arts, corporate and political arenas, both to raise the awareness of Arts Access SA and to develop viable partnerships to

deliver new services. With the growth of Arts Access SA, the

recruitment of new staff and the development of new events and programs, our offices at 101 Halifax Street are becoming significantly overcrowded. We are also aware that access for disabled people is not as good as it should be. I firmly believe that Arts Access SA should show strong leadership in supporting disabled people, both in paid employment and at Board level. Furthermore, we strongly believe that we do need to be situated in a central location, which also provides a gallery space to give disability visual arts an even greater presence. This is a challenge the Board will confront in the coming year.

I thank my fellow Board members for freely giving their time and expertise so willingly and in such good humour, and acknowledge their individual contributions, dedication and support. This has been a demanding year, but I acknowledge their resolve in staying focused and making hard decisions to overcome the many challenges.

However, Arts Access SA would not be where it is without the dedication and hard work of our staff. On behalf of the Board, I would sincerely like to thank Peter Tregilgas, Executive Director of Arts Access SA, for his support, ardour and affable enthusiasm, and all of his team for their magnificent endeavours. Together they are creating a consummate future for South Australia's arts and disability sector that is truly exciting in its extent and promise for disabled artists.

In the 2005 Annual Report the retiring Chair, **Claire Witham**, proposed a challenge to the Board, the staff and our community, to bed down the changes and seize the increased advocacy role with energy and enthusiasm. I believe that we have unequivocally fulfilled that challenge. but we still have a long way to go and much to achieve if we are to realise the aims and objectives of Arts Access SA.

Arts Access SA is committed to enabling and empowering disabled people to access and engage with the arts in their own right with their able-bodied peers in the mainstream arena. I ask you to join with us on the continuation of our journey in 2007, and I look forward to the myriad challenges of improving our services and cultivating the arts and disability sector to ever-greater heights.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Be careful what you wish for!

N FEBRUARY, it was my pleasure to be appointed Arts in Action's inaugural Executive Director with a brief to provide leadership in the Arts and Disability sector. Following several years working in human services, I had been looking to return to the arts to bring my social enterprise experience into a causerelated organisation with a small and dynamic team of professionals.

The first steps towards reinvigorating the organisation had already been taken by the Board in terms of a broad consultation and the resulting strategic plan. Our initial task was to commence the repositioning and re-branding of the organisation as **Arts Access SA**. It meant contemplating our purpose and vision and identifying the new opportunities that could arise from our new purpose as an advocacy and peak-body organisation.

Arts Access SA is an arts organisation and in terms of artistic venture, to implement the vision of the Board, it is important to acknowledge disability as a mainstream issue. To embark on the ambitious program we need to focus on two key aspects – continuing professional development and creative productions that are a model for advocacy and effective access and communications to ensure that that message of disability arts is not reserved for the converted.

Over its eighteen years of operations, Arts Access SA has been part of the extraordinary development of arts and disability in South Australia particularly in the performing arts with our associates **Restless Dance Company, No Strings Attached** and **Tutti Ensemble** but while these organisations are leaders they still require significant contribution to full operational potential and other areas such as Visual Arts, Film and New Media are identifying as major program gaps.

It was pleasing to see the development of new projects such as the **A-Frame**. A sell out Exhibition and auction was presented at the Adelaide Festival Centre as part of the High Beam Local. This provided an overdue professional presentation of visual arts by emerging and established South Australian artists with a disability.

We were keen to continue supporting opportunities that enabled people with disabilities to celebrate their artistic abilities, while also bringing the mainstream audiences to an awareness of the richness disability arts offers. Communication is a key direction for Arts Access SA and we have implemented several programs that illustrate and empower people with a disability including:

- Radio Cool a weekly one hour radio show on Radio Adelaide provides a voice for Disability Arts 101.5FM
- Arts Access SA's website is now an information portal and includes an open What's on calendar.

No better illustration of the commitment of Arts Access SA to professional development of individual artists and promotion of disability issues is through the **Reins, Rope and Red Tape** program. This project was designed to

identify the future leaders and advocates for disability arts to fill the void left following the deaths of advocates and campaigners Jeff Heath and Richard Llewellyn. The participants demonstrate the capacity of individuals to make a difference.

One of the more difficult challenges for Arts Access SA has been to conceive and remodel the High Beam from the previous resource-hungry model to one that enables community participation and further develops a national and international profile. The Board after much deliberation chose to utilise the High Beam brand in a two-pronged approach: **High Beam Local** to highlight the International Day for People with a Disability and **High Beam Global** to coincide with the new annual Fringe.

Access is a catchcry for the organisation and through research we are aware that many issues exist around accessing performing and visual arts venues for people with disabilities.

The **University of SA** assisted Arts Access SA considerably through 2006 in scoping projects through Student Field work Placements. Disability awareness and the arts is a market based issue and audience development and services by Arts Access SA will through new initiatives to general earned income and reinforce our organisation as a leader.

As the organisation grows in terms of its ability to service the sector it is facing issues including space and resourcing to juggle the needs to be both an advocacy

and key production organ sation to ensure ongoing funding.

It has been a pleasure to join Arts. Access SA.

I thank all those who have contributed over the years who have been the stewards for disability arts in SA. My wish was to work with and manage a small and dynamic team — a cause related arts project. I could not be more pleased with the team we have recruited throughout 2006 and look for ward to the challenge of further developing the arts disability sector.

Notes to and Forming Part of the Financial Statements

As at 31 December 2006

Note 1: Statement of significant accounting policies

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards issued by the Australian accounting bodies and the requirements of the Association Incorporation Act (SA) 1985. The accounts have been prepared on the basis of historical costa and do not take into account changing money values, or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated. All projects, grants and activities are presented in detailed profit and loss statement format to more fully report on the financial activities of the association.

Income Tax

Arts In Action Inc is classed as a not-for-profit organisation and as such is exempt from income tax under sec 50-5 item 1.1 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Segment Reporting

Arts In Action Inc is an organisation operating principally in South Australia and as such comprises only one reportable industry and geographical segment.
