

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President's Message

2005 at Access Arts, besides speeding by very swiftly, has seen another set of remarkable achievements for the organisation and its members.

The Management Committee has thoroughly enjoyed its duties; and their wide range of skills and extensive experience in the arts, education, business, youth, indigenous arts and culture has been invaluable in helping to position Access Arts in a very good growth position.

The Committee thanks Marcus Hughes for his time as President and his continued work for the aims of the organisation. As current President I extend my personal gratitude to the Committee who all commit so strongly and consistently to the organisation when their work, personal and family lives are extremely busy.

In a year that saw so many highlights I will mention a few that give an indication of the scale and scope of Access Arts' activities.

The Staff:

Access Arts received a WOW Award for its commitment to employing people with a disability.

Access Arts has a strong commitment to employing staff experiencing a disability and we now have five staff in decision-making positions that identify as experiencing a disability. We are committed to developing a workplace that balances work, health and family commitments of staff and volunteers parallel with the development of the organisation. Our extremely strategic Executive Director, Ross Barber, has just been appointed as Treasurer of Arts Access Australia, the national body representing arts and disability organisations.

The Scope:

Access Arts has been able to reach communities and individuals and talk to them as peers with empathy. Because of those discussions we have increased our organisational programs, workshops and support skills beyond Brisbane to five regions: Darling Downs; South Burnett; Caboolture; Sunshine Coast and Cairns. We are expecting Rockhampton and Mt Isa to follow in 2006.

Queensland Festivals:

The absolutely remarkable *Sound Circles* was launched in collaboration with the Queensland Music Festival and at the 11th World Music Therapy Congress in July.

The Program:

In October, 43 *Sound Circles* from South East Queensland and the South Burnett travelled to Cairns and the Atherton Tablelands to deliver workshops and attend the Yungaburra Folk Festival, workshops and arts development program.

Access Arts delivered three workshops each Saturday for four terms of workshops in all art forms. The Brisbane Outsider Artist studio runs two days per week.

Whole of Community Arts workshops have commenced on Wednesdays and freestyle drumming continues on Fridays. *Sound Circles* workshops run weekly in five communities across Queensland.

International Projects:

Thirteen people from across regional Queensland travelled to the 2005 World Expo in Aichi, Japan and delivered a twenty-one day series of *Sound Circles* workshops. The team was chosen from participants who had been part of the *Sound Circles* development workshops. The workshop program attracted 120 people per day and our partners Tanpopo no ye and Toyola Japan were amazed at the wholehearted participation of Japanese public. The team was invited to run a workshop in Nara where they strengthened links with Japanese partners Tanpopo-no-ye and organisations in other countries, particularly Papua New Guinea.

The 'My Dream' performance Chinese Disabled Performing Arts Troupe collaboration was also very successful in many ways.

A significant contribution from the Queensland Government was of great assistance. Access Arts performing artists Peter Vance, Emma and Vaughn Bonnison performed flawlessly after only one rehearsal with the troupe. Peter was asked to do the English voiceover for the troupes' new DVD. Access Arts was invited to attend the Celebration of the Founding of the Chinese Republic by the Chinese Consulate.

Five delegates from Brisbane and Cairns travelled to the Shanghai Wataboshi Music Festival to perform and make a bid to host the 2011 -13 Wataboshi Music Festival in Cairns. Opera Singer and composer Hayley Klitchener performed her own gospel compositions at the closing event. And Adam Norman, a young rap artist from Cairns, performed his latest compositions each night at the Wataboshi night club.

Thanks to all our members and friends - your ongoing support is vital in positioning Access Arts as the premier active developer of arts and culture for people experiencing disability and disadvantage. I look forward with enthusiasm to Access Arts 2006.

Our flagship program for 2005 was of course, *Sound Circles* and from the very start it attracted strong interest across Queensland and in Asia. *Sound Circles* continues to grow and it does so for a number of very good reasons.

At one level it functions as a great social activity for people to meet with old friends make new ones and be creative. Underpinning that, are strong skilling techniques that can assist the development of participants in whatever form of the performing arts that they may be interested in: music, performance, theatre, storytelling to name a few.

As Peter Vance, *Sound Circles* facilitator says "Connect – Create - Celebrate"

Sound Circles has been one of the reasons that our local and regional membership has grown enormously. But three hundred percent rise in membership does not just come about because of a single program, it requires a huge commitment by Access Arts management committee, staff, arts workers, volunteers and our members all working towards making Access Arts an active, responsive organisation and community. PROJECTS & PROGRAMS

Indigenous Projects Report

In February, Access Arts employed two Indigenous workers to the Regional Indigenous Project Officer (RIPO) position Bre Capell and Bruce Simpson. Both workers developed a database of information and contacts connected to the Inala community and the broader arts industries government and non-government organisations, agencies and individuals.

Initially the RIPOs began meeting with various groups and individuals within the Inala community and working with Chelsea Bond of Inala Wangarra to develop an Action Plan for Inala. The Focus of the Action Plan was to implement creative arts development in the community identified areas including young people, Elders, families and broader community to address issues of drug and alcohol abuse, community access to services and participation, isolation, emotional health and wellbeing.

RIPO supported the development of a number of arts and cultural activities and events in Inala including the design and distribution of over 400 NAIDOC Week posters and coordination of the Elders community exhibition at the Inala Art Gallery in July.

Throughout the year RIPO also assisted with the promotions, workshop documentation, facilitation support and assisting young people involved in Stylin Up and the Inala Wangarra and Vulcana Women's Circus - Inala Dreaming Project, which saw the development of a large scale community production called "Bungu the Money God" written by local elder Uncle Herb Wharton. The production was performed at the Brisbane Powerhouse in November and December of 2005.

In October of 2005 Access Arts Indigenous projects worker Bre Capell coordinated *So-Superfly*, a pilot community arts project, for homeless and disadvantaged youth. This project developed as a partnership project between Red Cross Night Café and Queensland Community Arts Network.

The project titled *So-Superfly* saw the development of an 8 week series of Sunday workshops throughout October through to December, successfully engaging an average of 15-25 young people each week.

This project engaged a broad range of individuals, arts practitioners and cultural workers with a specific focus on employing young people to design, implement and manage the programming. The project introduced a variety of creative arts, digital media, physical exercise and traditional and contemporary cultural activities for young Indigenous people to explore.

This included Traditional Indigenous games/sports, African drumming, "Digital

Rap Storeys", emceeing, and lyric writing development, circus skills, Brazilian Capoeira/martial arts, digital technology use and operation (cameras/laptops/film) interviewing and media skills.

With the facilitated support of Indigenous Programs Officer Debra Bennet McLean, this program also "invoked" a contemporary Indigenous methodology "Yarning Circle", this introduced a set of traditional Indigenous protocols and processes for determining each individual's (including cultural workers and participants) role and responsibility in ensuring the social, emotional and spiritual health and well-being of all involved. The success of the "Yarning Circle" became evident when closing the last session, as many of the young Indigenous men and women thanked the elders whom were present, and displayed an impromptu performance (traditional dance) for them and the project workers in respect.

The video documentation of the project was collated, edited and premiered at the Red Cross Night Café at City Hall in December. The film warmly received a notable "teary-eyed" response from the young people, project workers and Red Cross staff at the café.

Brisbane Outsider Artists Studio Report

Like a scene on a no longer blank canvas, the Brisbane Outsider Artists (BOA) Studio was alive with colour, depth and movement in 2005. Fifteen regular participants displayed their talents every Monday and Tuesday at BOA under the guidance of Britta Gudd, with a number of these artists attending a "Marketing Your Art" workshop, run by Stephanie Outridge Field, Executive Officer of Fusions. The artwork resulting from BOA's sessions has reached several exhibitions, including Hands On Art in June at South Bank, lobbying towards supporting the field of art and disability; Minority in Majority in July at Footsteps Gallery, celebrating NAIDOC and Disability Action Week; and the Access Arts Exhibition in October at the Brisbane Powerhouse which was in celebration of Mental Health Week. Access Arts also supported a number of organisations, including Crossroads and the Community Resource Unit to work towards exhibitions with their members. Brisbane Outsider Artists is one of Access Art's fantastic success stories, and it is only as limited as its participant's imaginations.

Sound Circles Report

In 2005, *Sound Circles* was the catalyst for Access Arts to strengthen our partnerships with communities both throughout Queensland and internationally.

Sound Circles Brisbane:

Workshops were held weekly and numbers increased throughout the year. An average of 18 participants attended each week. The group was facilitated by Peter Vance and Emma Bennison, formerly *Sound Circles*' participants and was supported by two support workers and a number of volunteers.

The group focused on all aspects of sound and movement, but particularly on

song-writing and story-telling. Outcomes included a CD containing two of the groups' songs and a *Sound Circle* in the Visy Theatre at the Brisbane Powerhouse as part of Access Arts' Members' Day and 'International Day of People with a Disability' celebrations on 3rd December, 2005.

Sound Circles Caboolture:

The Caboolture group has fifteen participants with seven support staff. They meet twice weekly on Tuesdays and Fridays as part of the Caboolture CentaCare Services' Performing Arts Program. Outcomes have included the production of a CD entitled "Dream On" in conjunction with a recording engineer as part of a project supported by the Regional Arts Development Fund. They also gave an end of year performance on 16 December.

Sound Circles South Burnett:

The group was established in May 2005 by Sue Evans through DSQ. Sixteen enthusiastic *Sound Circles* and two support staff meet at the Pulse in Murgon every Wednesday morning. The venue has been generously donated by the Murgon Shire Council. Highlights included a trip to Cairns involving *Sound Circles* participants from across Queensland, and a series of workshops facilitated by the Brisbane and Caboolture groups.

Sound Circles Cairns:

The Cairns *Sound Circles* group is co-ordinated by Arts Nexus and has had a very successful 2005.

Everyone involved has seen a marked improvement in their own ability and that of others. One of the groups own members, Stephen Sakach, has excelled to become their new group leader. They have been working with other artists such as dancers and choreographers with great success and can boast of having performed publicly for an audience at their local NBA Titan games, singing the national anthem to much applause.

A major breakthrough was that this group, originally only funded as a 20 week program, have now achieved independence as a self-managed group. They acknowledge the ongoing support they have received from Access Arts as a crucial element in their being able to sustain this.

Sound Circles Summit

In October 2005, forty-six *Sound Circles* enthusiasts from Brisbane, Caboolture, and the South Burnett travelled to Cairns to join with twenty participants from the Cairns *Sound Circles* group for a week of *Sound Circles*. Workshops were held at a number of scenic venues which included the beach at Palm Cove, the Tanks Art Centre and the Curtain Fig Tree. The trip provided new experiences for many and was a once in a lifetime opportunity for some which will be fondly remembered.

Queensland Music Festival

Access Arts was privileged to have *Sound Circles* included as an umbrella event in the 2005 Queensland Music Festival in July. *Sound Circles* workshops were held in Brisbane, Cairns, Caboolture and the South Burnett and were widely advertised in local communities. Workshops proved extremely popular with young and old alike.

Sound Circles Tool Kit Launch at the World Music Therapy Congress

From 19-23 July, 550 delegates attended the 11th World Congress of Music Therapy held at the Brisbane Convention Centre. Access Arts assisted the WMTC Organising Committee to apply for funding from the Department of Family and Community Services to enable people with disabilities and their support workers to attend the Congress. Four Access Arts members were supported to attend the Congress: Stephen Sakach and Jill Blackman from Cairns and Peter Vance and Emma Bennison from Brisbane. All four are facilitators of their local *Sound Circles* groups.

The *Sound Circles* Tool Kit DVD and booklet developed by Access Arts in partnership with Helicon Dance was launched via a poster presentation at the Congress. The Tool Kit is available to people interested in taking *Sound Circles* into their community by contacting Access Arts on 3358 6200 or 1300 663 651 (local call cost).

2005 World Expo – Aichi, Japan

Sound Circles took on the world in September when Access Arts joined with our Japanese partner organisation Tanpopo-No ye to deliver *Sound Circles* at World Expo 2005. Thirteen *Sound Circles* facilitators, (over half of whom experience a disability) presented *Sound Circles* workshops in the NGO village of the 2005 World Expo in Aichi, Japan. The team delivered two workshops per day over a twenty-one day period to an audience of 120 per day. They kept a web-based journal containing photos, audio and text-based reflections on their experiences. The journal can be accessed from www.accessarts.org.au.

1. There are 10 standards:
2. Service access
3. Individual needs
4. Decision –making and choice
5. Privacy, dignity and confidentiality
6. Participation and Integration
7. Valued status
8. Complaints and disputes
9. Service management
10. Protection of legal and human rights and freedom from abuse and neglect
11. Staff recruitment, employment and development

This is an opportune time for Access Arts to review and update its constitution, policies and procedures. Staff, the advisory committee, management committee and members are assisting with this process.

We appreciate the support of the Management Committee, staff and members as we move towards ensuring compliance with the standards. We look forward to working with you in 2006.

Asia Pacific Wataboshi Music Festival

In November, Robert and Marian Plant, Hayley Kitchener and Hae Jin Yi, from Access Arts, and Melissa Robertson and Adam Norman from Arts Nexus, Cairns went to Shanghai, China for the Wataboshi Music Festival.

At the 8th Wataboshi Music Festival in Shanghai 2005, eleven Asia -Pacific countries participated including Ho Chi Minh City, Korea, Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia, China and Australia. From Australia, one of Access Arts' members, Hayley Kitchener performed. There was a mixture of dancers, singers and musicians. The standard of performance was very high. Performances were composed, written, choreographed and/or performed by people with disability.

The concert from beginning to end was splendid and everything went to plan. A Chinese television compere hosted the concert with immediate translations into English and Japanese. The huge concert hall, which was the size of Brisbane's City Hall, was packed. The whole concert was broadcast across China on National television.

For the Closing Ceremony, festival delegates were driven in a convoy of coaches (escorted by police in cars and motorbikes), one hour away, to a Shanghai Sports

Club. The Shanghai Federation of Disabled People had organised performances by hearing impaired dancers, opera and semi-operatic performances by singers who were vision or physically impaired and performances by performers from other countries. Adam performed a rap dance/song which he had written/choreographed. The 2007 Wataboshi Music Festival will be in Johor Baru, Malaysia.

EVENTS & CELEBRATIONS

Members' Day of Celebration

On International Day of People with Disability, Saturday the 3rd of December we held our Members Day, an audience of more than eighty, including members, friends and family, and supporters of Access Arts joined in a celebration of disability within the arts and community. Activities on the day included a free members' BBQ, a visual art exhibition and variety of performances showcasing outcomes from the workshops held in term four. Michael Russell captivated audience with his entertaining and poignant poetry. The true spirit of our organisation was reflected in the enthusiasm and involvement of people on the day, and it was indeed a day to celebrate.

Disability Action Week

Disability Action Week was indeed a vital period of recognition for those at Access Arts. Held from the 17th - 23rd of July, there were several different displays of celebration. Brisbane Outsider Artists were featured in the 'Minority in Majority' exhibition at Footsteps Gallery; our own Peter Vance hosted a variety of talent in King George Square on Thursday the 21st, which coincided with the Disability Action Week Awards luncheon, held at the Carlton Crest Hotel and attended by several Access Arts representatives.

Mental Health Week

As an organisation which deals with disability and disadvantage within the arts, Access Arts supports people experiencing mental illness. One particular form of expression at which many of them excel is through visual arts, and from the 7th - 17th of October at The Powerhouse, the 'Diagnosed Artist' exhibition was held. This was in celebration of Mental Health Week, with participants including: West End Mental Health Services, New Farm Neighbourhood Centre, Nundah House, Brooke Red, Open Minds, Schizophrenia Fellowship, Access Arts, and Healing Centre. This was a great success.

Workshops 2005

In 2005, Access Arts workshops took a new approach. They were structured in 2 x 4 week blocks per term, with each block having two art forms to choose from, resulting in 16 workshops being offered throughout the year. This gave members a broader choice and opportunities to try some new and different art forms. The theme 'Capturing Brisbane' encouraged the participants of the workshops to

explore the communities and environment in which they live.

The workshops were well attended with some great art works emerging from the sessions. There were 112 participants throughout the Saturday morning workshops, 18 arts workers and 13 support workers were employed and 10 people volunteered.

Drumming Sessions

Starting in April 2005, Access Arts ran free informal drumming sessions on Friday afternoons from 1-3pm using drums that had been made in Access Arts workshops in previous years. The drummers have grown in confidence and gave a short performance during the Members' Day of Celebration on 3 December. The group continues to grow in popularity and professional drummers will be employed periodically to support them in 2006.

Scope

The financial report and committee's responsibility:

The financial report comprises the Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Statement, accompanying Notes to the Financial Statements and the statement by members of the committee for Access Arts Inc. (the association), for the year ended 31st December 2005.

The committee of the association is responsible for the preparation and true and fair presentation of the financial report and has determined that the accounting policies used and described in Note 1 to the financial statements which form part of the financial report are consistent with the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Qld) and are appropriate to meet the needs of the members. This includes responsibility for the maintenance of adequate accounting records and internal controls that are designed to prevent and detect fraud and error, and for the accounting policies and accounting estimates inherent in the financial report.

The financial report has been prepared for distribution to members for the purpose of fulfilling the committee's financial reporting requirements under the Associations Incorporation Act (Qld).
