Tickets purchased through EASE are sold under the following conditions:

- 1. Tickets are not transferable. Tickets are sold to individual subscribers on the understanding that they are attending the booked event.
- 2. Tickets are sold to staff members of an organisation on the understanding that they are attending an event as a support person for the clients of that organisation, and under no other circumstances.
- 3. EASE staff reserve the right to refuse sale to any enter who they believe is not eligible to purchase tickets.
- 4. Tickets must be paid for within 14 days of receiving an invoice from EASE.
- 5. EASE will purchase tickets, where possible, to suit a subscriber's particular requirements. Sometimes these requests will not be possible to fulfil.



EASE Managers & Promoters Forum

More than thirty representatives from Melbourne's entertainment industry attended the EASE Venue Managers and Promoters Forum, held at the Arts Access Studio on November 25.

The purpose of the forum was to provide a broader view of the EASE service, to impart important information about the new national Disability Discrimination Act, and to thank the entertainment industry for supporting EASE.

Actor, George Fairfax spoke of the contribution EASE has made to the entertainment industry and about the extraordinary growth of the service, citing \$24, 920 worth of Hoyts film vouchers sold from January to September, 1993 and sales of \$15,149 for Phantom of the Opera tickets from January to June. George stressed the financial and ethical value of increasing audience sizes through EASE and encouraged the industry to look at how they could increase their input to these developments.

EASE consumers, Jan Doran and Trevor Chappell gave personal views EASE's valuable role. Having no central vision, but having peripheral vision, Jan's ideal seating point in a venue is within the first few rows. She described some of her dealings with front-of-house staff, having been treated variously with disbelief (Jan does not 'appear' to be legally blind) and how once she was almost 'carried to her seat'.

Trevor Chappell, a youth development officer with the City of Malvern spoke of EASE's contribution to the lives of isolated, at risk, or otherwise socially disadvantaged young people, emphasising the difficulty of raising \$200 or \$60 to attend a rock concert.

Summer enchanted evenings

One of the all time great stage musicals, Rogers and Hammerstein's South Pacific opens in Melbourne at the State Theatre, Victorian Arts Centre on January 5, 1994. Billed as "a story of love in a world at war" the musical is based on the novel Stories of the South Pacific by James A Michener. The film version is one of the most successful film musicals ever. This Gordon Frost Attractions production includes a dynamic cast of over 50. The daughter of Richard Rogers and the son of Oscar Hamerstein were in Australia recently and gave the productions their unequivocal "thumbs up".

The star international cast includes: American star Paige O'Hara as navy nurse, Nellie Forbush. O'Hara's voice was used for Belle in the Disney film, Beauty and the Beast; French Canadian star, Andre Jobin as plantation owner Emile de Becque; and US star Roz Ryan as Bloody Mary. Australian star Phillip Gould, who plays Lieutenant Cable, has returned from England where he appeared in Show Boat and 42nd Street.

Keith Michell, arguably Australia's best known theatrical export is starring in SCROOGE The Musical, at the Princes Theatre until January 30, 1994.

Peter Shaffer, author of The Gift of the Gorgon, also wrote Lettice and Lovage, Equus and Amadeus. the action takes place on a Greek island, where a hard living playwright has fallen to his death from a cliff. His abandoned, illegitimate son arrives to write his fathers biography, meeting with obstruction from the playwrights widow. Eventually she agrees, and dark revelations follow.

Ruth Cracknell, much loved as Maggie Bear in *Mother & Son*, will star in Geoffrey Atherden's new comedy, **Hotspur** as Fiona McPherson who owns a stately old home, Hotspur. But Fiona is broke, the council is demanding she unpaid rates and she has subdivided the old family home into flats. Fiona has more than the council to deal with. Freddy, a bankrupt developer

is one of Fiona's boarders. She wants him out, but Freddy has a plan.

Later in the year comes Cosi, by Louis Nowra which continues the exploits of Lewis, a character from Nowra's previous acclaimed play, Summer of the Aliens. Lewis takes a job directing a play in a psychiatric hospital. Lewis would like to stage a Brecht play, but the cast of patients insist on performing Mozart's opera, Cosi fan tutte, even though none can sing or speak Italian.

Look out for the Cosi painting by artist, Jane Trengove in the MTC program. Jane is a member of the EASE Sub-Committee and is currently working with the Resource Unit at Arts Access.

Playbox Theatre Company 1994 Season

EASE has tickets for all Playbox productions during its 1994 season at the CUB Malthouse.

Once again the Playbox presents a star studded lineup of great Australian writers, players and playmakers, with the added dimension of US comedian Steve Martin's first play, Picasso At the Lapin Agile, which Playbox workshopped with the author earlier this year.

The season opens in March with a Sydney Theatre Company Production of Michael Gow's new play, Furious, directed by the author. Roland is summoned to an aged care home to collect a box left for him by someone he has never met. The box is filled with newspaper clippings about him and his writing career. he has to find out why. Furious opens on March 11, and stars Nicholas Eadie, Tamblyn Lord and Kerry Walker.

Disturbing the Dust, by Ariette Taylor and Luke Devenish, was commissioned for the 1994 Adelaide Festival and features music by David Chesworth. The play concerns Alice, a former dancer whose past has become her life. She wants no part of the future and all her memories are of illusions. The part of Alice was created for Patricia Kennedy, one of Australia's most distinguished actors. Disturbing the Dust opens on March 15.

Other plays in the season are: David Williamson's new play, Sanctuary, to be directed by Aubrey Mellor, Playbox's new Artistic Director. Underwear, Perfume & Crash Helmet, by Michael Gurr, author of the hit, Sex Diary of an Infidel was commissioned by Playbox. Falling From Grace, by Hannie Rayson; Remember Ronald Ryan, by Barry Dickins; and The Glass Mermaid by Tobsha Lerner.

Catherine Brown, the director of legal and public relations at the Wesley Central Mission spoke on the Disability Discrimination Act, explaining the complaint process, the need for action plans for venues in case of a ruling of discrimination, and explained

'unjustifiable hardship' as a form of defence. Catherine also explained how the Disability Commission is considering setting its own standards, which will be stricter than the current Australian Standards used to guide new and modified buildings.
