In September, Arts Victoria launched its new Disability Action Plan – a project facilitated by Arts Access that will create a ripple effect throughout the Victorian arts industry. We also distributed over 3000 free tickets and 18,000 reduced price tickets for events ranging from "Puppetry of the Penis" to "The Wiggles". Our commitment to training continued. Highlights included *Working with the Untrained Artist* run in partnership with Back to Back Theatre, *Dangerous Territory*, a forum held in conjunction with the very beautiful *Intimate Encounters* exhibition and a face to face meeting for cultural organisations with Rebecca McGuiness, the Access Coordinator from the New York Metropolitan Museum of Art. We also practiced what we preach with staff Auslan training, Deaf awareness training, and cultural diversity training.

And then there were the 11,000 email and telephone enquiries that Sue, Edwina, and Carly coped with admirably, the ongoing projects including Art Day and Saturday Morning Art Classes, the amazing People Sculpture for International Day of People with a Disability, and the incredible time seven of us had in Adelaide attending the wonderful High Beam Festival and DADAA face to face meeting.

Financially we did very well, spending less and bringing in more than budgeted, while running a very full program of activity. Simon's excellent financial management skills were clearly demonstrated.

Finally, a big thanks to all our wonderful participants, artists and support workers, who are the soul of this amazing organisation.

Arts Access is a member of the DADAA National Network, the Australia wide affiliation of arts organisations working to improve access to and participation in the arts for people with disabilities and people experiencing disadvantage. Nicole Beyer is a Director and Treasurer of DADAA National. Nicole is also involved in the Australia Council's Disability Action Plan development. In March, DADAA was represented at the Australia Council's National Service Organisations meeting in Canberra, by Claire Havey, DADAA National Director, and Nicole Beyer, DADAA Treasurer. access program

The Access Program works to improve access and encourage audience participation by people who are disadvantaged and people with a disability through training, audience development projects, and the FASE ticket service.

EASE TICKET SERVICE

A marketing campaign in October included the introduction of membership for small groups and people living in supported accommodation, which resulted in an increased overall membership of approximately 580. Working in partnership with arts organisations, venues and presenters, EASE offers the following services:

- Specialised Booking Service: For people whose choice of seat is restricted due to physical or sensory impairment. and people who require access to flexible booking and payment options.
- Free tickets: This year we distributed over 4000 free tickets to disadvantaged groups through EASE. EASE assists arts organisations in filling slow selling events while introducing new audiences to the arts.
- Reduced price tickets: EASE worked in partnership with 53 arts organisations and presenters to sell over 18,000 tickets to EASE members at a reduced price.
- Information Service: Through an Update, phone service, website and email list, EASE provides members with detailed information about access, services and facilities.
- Agency for special events: EASE also acts as a booking agency for sign interpreted, audio described and other events of specific interest to the disability sector.

PARTNERSHIPS AND ACCESS PROJECTS

Vision Australia Partnership

Arts Access and Vision Australia advocate for and coordinate the provision of Audio Description, touch tours, tactile displays, information in alternate print formats and reserved seating for people who are blind or vision impaired. We provided audio description for 42 performances throughout the year, a substantial increase on previous years.

VicDeaf & VCOD Partnership

Arts Access worked with VicDeaf, VCOD, Melbourne Theatre Company, Playbox and a number of commercial presenters to provide nine sign interpreted performances throughout the year for the Deaf community.

Ability Awards, International Day of People with a Disability

Arts Access was employed by the Department of Human Services to coordinate ten art works as awards for the inaugural Ability Awards, launched by Minister Christine Campbell. Arts Access was also represented on the judging panel by Caroline Bowditch.

Melbourne Festival Access Project

Arts Access worked in partnership with the Melbourne Festival to improve issues of accessibility for the October Festival 2001. This included venue access audits, alternate formats, training and the provision of Sign Interpreting, Audio Description and Guided Touch tours.

Accessible Seating Guidelines

Arts Access is working in partnership with HREOC (Human Rights and Equal Opportunities Commission) and VICNORD to establish guidelines on accessible seating and ticketing policies for arts, entertainment and sporting venues.

TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

Disability Awareness Training

Arts Access ran customised Disability Awareness Training for Arts Victoria, Museums Australia (Victoria), Ticketek and Melbourne and Olympic Park; and Ticketmaster and Melbourne Festival.

Forums

- Arts Victoria Industry Forum Coordination and delivery of a major arts industry forum at the State Library, to publicly launch Arts Victoria's new Disability Action Plan
- Forum for Museums and Galleries (New York Metropolitan Museum of Art) The Access Program hosted a forum provided great insight into access initiatives currently taking place in the US.
- Forum for Theatre Interpreters We also hosted an ASLIA (Association of Sign Language Interpreting Australia) workshop with International Guest presenter Julie Gebron from Portland, Oregon. In the US, almost all productions are sign-interpreted, and we still have a long way to go in Australia.

Consultancy and advocacy

The Access Program worked with many other organisations during the year, on venue access, audience development, addressing legislative issues and lobbying for improved access to the arts. We provided advice to the Victorian Arts Centre, VAPAC, the Comedy Festival, the Fringe Festival, Playbox, the National Gallery, the Public Records Office, ACMI, and Marriner Theatres, amongst others.

artistic program

The Artistic Program aims to use cultural activity as a means of empowering individuals and strengthening communities. We do this by demonstrating leadership in accessible arts projects and services, achieving change through model and pilot projects which target disadvantaged individuals and communities across Victoria, and encouraging other organisations to adopt our values.

PROJECTS

Gneetung Tukae (Well and Healthy Children) Arts Project

In continuing partnership with the Victorian Aboriginal Health Service, two artists worked with children, youth and adults to transform indoor and outdoor children's play areas with artworks telling positive health messages. Several workshops in mosaic tiles, murals, and children's furniture and toys culminated in a launch of the play areas in early 2002. The work is now on permanent display and enjoyed on a daily basis by children attending the Service.

Solid Rock Club – Tallangatta

After coordinating a regional conference in 2000, Arts Access made a commitment to identify a disadvantaged regional community and establish an arts project for young people. Tallangatta Health Service and the Tallangatta Secondary College were identified as suitable community partners, and local artists were sought to run the project. The artistic direction of the program was driven by the students, who (through surveys) identified four art form areas to work in. The students came up with the title Solid Rock Club.

Five artists (Guy Hooper, Wiggy Brennan, Dan Guerin, Rick Randall, Maude Davey) worked with 60 students in dance. singing and voice technique, filmmaking, costume making and design. A final public performance and film screening was held at the Tallangatta Memorial Hall in October 2001.

The artists also ran arts workshops with members of the broader Tallangatta community, to encourage more community participation in the arts. Arts Access is now supporting the Tallangatta community in seeking funds to continue the project independently.

Storm workshops

Long term EASE (Entertainment Access Service) member, Croxton Special School, were thrilled when Arts Access initiated an arts partnership in early 2002, to work with the school and locally based community groups such as the Thornbury Women's Neighbourhood House and the Veronica Gardens Retirement Village. Filmmaking, puppetry, music and theatre will be explored and will culminate in a public community performance in Croxton in late 2002. The artists are Ian Pidd, Vanessa Beck, Rick Randall and James Wilkinson.

Norich (This Show Has Legs - Working Title)

Creative Development, partnership with Snuff Puppets. 18-22 March. Eight professional artists with and without disabilities: Marc Brew, Janice Florence, Emma Cooper, Antony Riddell, Andy Freer, Pauline Cady, James Wilkinson and Ian Pidd worked together for a week to explore themes for a large-scale, high profile performance in 2004. They chose to ignore the issue of disability as a creative concern and simply explored a series of technical / creative opportunities. The Development was structured so that each artist led a workshop in a different discipline: dance, design, musical composition, storytelling and playmaking, contact improvisation, games and game theory. An idea for a performance style and story began to emerge. A final "work in progress" performance sketched out the story of "Norich", gothically describing an 1880's family living in regional Victoria.

TRAINING

A survey identified areas of need for workers in the arts and disability/disadvantage sector. We then designed and ran four training programs:

- Dangerous Territory, exploring sexuality and disability, in association with Belinda Mason-Lovering's photographic exhibition, Intimate Encounters.
- *Circus skills and drawing*, in association with the State Deaf Conference and artists, Asphyxia and Peter Adams.
- working with arts/disability organisations overseas.
- Katrine Gabb, Phil Heuzenroeder, and Rose Myers.

Working with the Untrained Artist, workshops in theatre and music in association with Back to Back Theatre and artists.

ONGOING PROGRAMS

Art in Supported Residential Services

Arts Access worked with elderly and disadvantaged residents in three privately managed Supported Residential Services: Royal Avenue, Footscray House and Western Lodge. The projects bring visual or performing arts into the homes of those who find it difficult to participate in the wider community. The visual arts projects also aim to make artwork to enhance people's enjoyment of their home.

Saturday Morning Art Class Program

This ongoing program for people with a mental health issue this year focused on *Multi-Media Classes*; *Artists Books and Writing* and *Creative Writing*.

In the *Creative Writing* Course, participants explored memory and dreams; the past, present and future; bringing to life characters and experiences. They kept a journal and were encouraged to write regularly about everyday life. Friends and family attended a reading of the work.

In response to an overwhelming need for a similar program on the Mornington peninsula, Arts Access assisted a group of people in the Frankston region to establish an independent arts project. We ran four drawing workshops at Cube 37, Frankston and assisted with some administrative and funding requirements.

Get Out! Summer Holiday Program

A visual and performing arts project was held during the Summer Holidays for adults with an intellectual disability. The two-day workshops included mask making and make-up art; music and circus skills.

Deaf Arts Network

The Deaf Arts Network was auspiced by Arts Access in 2001 and 2002 and the Project Coordinator is based at Arts Access. Two workshop series were run by Deaf artists for Deaf participants:

Eight-Week Visual Arts Program (individual painting and drawing techniques)

Eight-Week Circus Skills Program (training such as hula hoops, acro-balance and clowning.)

Art Day West

The theme over the past year for the 25 participants has been 'self'. An illustrated songbook containing each participant's personalised rewritten favourite song was created. A CD was also produced. The participants designed and created a quirky soft sculpture of themselves that will be exhibited at the Inclusion International Conference in September 2002.

Art Day West - Community Consultations

A feasibility study on remodelling Art Day West to facilitate its independence into the broader community was undertaken and completed. Arts Access will work in partnership with ArtLife, at Footscray Community Art Centre, to hand over the management of the project. Arts Access has also initiated a partnership with Scope and St. John of God to develop a similar pilot project in Deer Park.

Art Day South

In 2001, costume making and performance/installation workshops were held in preparation for the end of year presentation *Now Hello!* at Theatreworks in St. Kilda. In 2002, performing and visual art workshops lead towards a filmmaking project. Three short films are planned, and one of these films, Bird, will be screened at the Inclusion International Conference in late 2002.

Art Day South – Best Practice Video Evaluation Project

A Video Evaluation Project was implemented as an alternative to the usual reporting/evaluation process. Participants were filmed discussing their likes and dislikes of the program, and any ideas for future directions, with staff members. A copy was kept by each participant for future reference. A presentation of the innovative new process was given at the annual D.H.S. best practice showcase.
