How to book with EASE: To book tickets with EASE, phone 699 8497 and discuss with Lisa what you would like to see, when and any special seating requirements.

Free or Cheap Tickets: EASE keeps a list of people who are interested in free or cheap tickets which are usually available at short notice. If you can use this service please call Lisa and join our list.



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Ticket Requests: EASE will, where possible, regotiate for tickets to any event at your request. Your name will be placed on a waiting list and EASE staff will contact you should we be successful. Sometimes we do not receive an allocation until a few days before the event so if you really want tickets for a particular concert and can afford to pay full price, it is best to book with BASS or the venue. EASE will assist with full price tickets only if you have special seating requirements.

Exchange and Refund Policy: There is NO exchange and NO refund on tickets booked with EASE so please be certain of your requirements and the number of tickets before you make a booking. Both BASS and VISA have a NO REFUND, NO EXCHANGE POLICY.

Please remember that a booking is a financial commitment and that EASE must pay for all tickets at the time of booking in order to get you the best seats or the seats you need. If your payment is delayed it means that we cannot continue to make bookings and it puts the service in jeopardy for everyone.

Method of Payment: Payment can be made at the EASE office or by posting a cheque or money order made out to ARTS ACCESS. Payment is never made at the venue as EASE pays for all tickets at the time of booking. Prompt payment for tickets is essential. Tickets must be paid for within two weeks of receiving your tickets and invoice. Please enclose complete invoice or details with your payment otherwise it is difficult to match up cheques with bookings.

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

Melbourne Theatre Company's 1992-93 Season

The MTC's 1992-93 season kicks off with a frothy, swashbuckling comedy, I Hate Hamlet by Paul Rudnick, (Nov 5–21). Tony Sheldon plays the ghost of America's legendary stage actor, Lionel Barrymore, who comes back to coach a young TV star in the art of Shakespeare, life and love. With Gary Day, Natasha Herbert, Irene Inescort and Nicki Wendt.

The MTC production of Willy Russell's comedy hit, *Shirley Valentine* (Nov 19 – Dec 23) returns with Amanda Muggleton in her much loved interpretation of the Liverpudlian housewife who finds love and liberation while on holiday in Greece.

From Ireland's famous Abbey Theatre, comes *Dancing at Lughnasa* (November 27 – Dec 23) the most recent play by Brian Friel, which played to capacity audiences in the West End and on Broadway. Set in County Donegal in 1936 during the local harvest dance festival, called the Lughnasa (pronounced Loo-na-sa). A strict Catholic household is disturbed by the arrival of both an uncle from Uganda and the philandering father of the play's

narrator, a seven year old boy.

The songs and music of Cole Porter combined with a champagne love story make *High Society*, a perfect way to usher in the New Year in appropriate high spirits (December 31 – Jan 23). This production by Simon Phillips (whose *Importance of Being Ernest* thrilled half a million theatre goers around Australia) stars John McTernan (ex *GP*), Lorrae Desmond, Josephine Byrnes (*Brides of Christ*), Helen Buday, Bob Hornery and Kevin Miles.

Later in 1993 you can look forward to:

Chilean playwrite, Ariel Dorfman's new political and psychological thriller, *Death and the Maiden* (February 18-March 27) starring Helen Morse, John Gaden and Frank Gallacher.

David Henry Hwang's, *M.Butterfly* (March 25 – May 1) explores the politics of sex, the misunderstandings between men and women and between East and West, making bold use of Puccini's romantic opera, *Madam Butterfly* and the rituals of Japanese and Chinese theatre.

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Audio Description Update

It is now 18 months since Audio Description was launched in Australia. This free service provided by the Association for the Blind is making possible and enhancing the theatre experiences of people with visual impairment.

Audio Description is the art of describing, if appropriate, what is happening on the stage when there is no dialogue or sound effects. For example: non-verbal action (a character raises a weapon, or enters/exits the stage); scene and costume changes; and program notes that may enhance the appreciation of a performance.

Since its inception, Audio Description has been available at ten Melbourne Theatre Company productions at the Playhouse, at performances of **The King and I** and **Fiddler on the Roof** at the State Theatre of the Victorian Arts Centre, and recently, at the MTC production of **Gulliver's Travels** at the Geelong Performing Arts Centre.

EASE distributed a questionnaire to patrons with visual impairments to help evaluate the service to date and to look at where next to provide Audio Description. The response was extremely favourable:

Puffing Billy (Day)

Departs 9.00am. Includes a ride on the Puffing Billy from Belgrave to Emerald where the coach travels either to Olinda, Healesville Sanctuary or Phillip Island for lunch before returning to Melbourne in the evening.

Blues in the Night

Like the hit musical, 42nd Street the story of Blues in the Night comes from America's depression era and tells the story of three women and a fallen saloon singer in a run-down hotel in Chicago as they reflect on their lives and loves. What could have been a sad tale brings a message of hope to warm the soul, all through the music of the Blues.

Often called the mother of Jazz, the Blues holds the emotions the way no other music can. This is the music that carried many Americans through the Great Depression and on to new lives—"when everything is gone there is always the Blues."
