stArts with D

A performing arts ensemble engaging artists with disability in programs to build skills, co-create, collaborate and present disability-led performance works.

Unbroken Land

Unbroken Land is an Incite Arts' branded framework; a performative community event that provides a platform for collective community storytelling.

Southern Ngaliya

An Intergenerational Warlpiri Women's program facilitating ceremonial song and dance experiences for women and girls from Yuendumu, Nyirrpi, Willowra and Lajamanu.

- Make contact and build rapport with deaf or hard of hearing and disability organisations
- Web Content Accessibility Guidelines: www.w3.org
- Consider applying an accessibility widget on your website such as Userway

Access Tips for Digital and Print Materials and Communications

- Preferably 18px (13.5 point) font size with a minimum of 16px (12 point)
- Sans Serif font
- Do not use italics
- Do not use all Upper Case (Caps Lock) lettering
- Infrequent use of bold
- Line spacing. Consider 1.5 or more.
- Colour contrast to be at least 25%. [**www.contrastchecker.com**](http://www.contrastchecker.com)
- Use image descriptions

- Audio description used when possible
- Closed and/or Open Captioning used when possible
- Auslan used when possible
- Advise on the accessibility of the venue, project and/or event
- Provide photographs of your office or venue
- Provide transport advice
- Call out for people's access requirements in lead up
- Braille used when possible

Further Access Tips for Festivals and Events

- Ask for access requirements/riders when booking patrons and artists

Strongly consider providing the following:

- Accessible program formats
- Pre-show notes
- Visual ratings
- Tactile tours

- Assistive listening
- Sensory/quiet room
- Sensory friendly/relaxed performances
- Content warnings
- Provide an online platform to watch the event either live or recorded
- A sliding cost scale and also provide Companion Cards
- Have access workers to support persons with access requirements

- Don't continue putting access and inclusion in the "too hard basket"
- There are resources to support you
- Start with creating a budget line for access
- Education and seeking advice is also a great way to start!
