The Athenaeum Theatre **A Brief History**.

The Athenaeum Theatre began its life in 1839 "as a Mechanic's Institute for the promotion of science in this rising colony." Thirty two years on the first building was pulled down, the foundation stone was laid for the present building and it was renamed the Melbourne Athenaeum. The Ath. as it is affectionately called is a unique theatre built as a commercial theatre with a compact and friendly interior that contradicts its formal external appearance. The Athenaeum was originally a live theatre venue before being used as a cinema for many years until the Melbourne Theatre Company took over the lease in 1977. Since 1910, the Ath's upper hall had been used as an Art Gallery. In 1979, M.T.C. established the Athenaeum Two in that upstairs space. The Company's aim was to mount special productions of the classics alongside new local work. In 1987 Elston, Hocking & Woods took over the lease and continue to present a wide variety of productions in both spaces as well as hiring the theatres out to visiting companies. In 1991 the Athenaeum Theatre will receive a new lease of life when restoration of the building begins in June. The Theatre will be closed for 3 months. The restoration will concentrate on the facade and foyer areas and parts of the auditorium.

Venue Notes The Athenaeum Theatre

188 Collins Street Melbourne 3000 Phone: 650 3504 General Manager: Noel Davis Public Transport: The Athenaeum Theatre is located in the heart of the city close to the intersection of Swanston and Collins Street. It is next to the Melbourne Town Hall and opposite the City Square. The nearest Tram stops are at the intersection of Collins and Swanston Streets.

Parking: Parking in the city is difficult. There is limited meter parking and after hours parking in the streets. There are parking stations in Little Collins Street between Russell & Swanston Streets. Hoyts Parking in Flinders Lane between Russell and Swanston Streets is only \$4.00 per night after 6pm. The nearest disabled parking bay is in Little Collins Street near Swanston Street.

Box Office: Supervisor: Deb Dowling The Athenaeum Box Office and BASS Outlet is located just inside the main entrance on the left. The Box Office counter is high but not inaccessible. Box Office Hours: Monday - Friday 9am -5pm & Saturday 9am - 5pm. Performance days: Till 8pm

Entrance: There is a 2 inch step from the footpath to the entrance lobby, increasing in height as the footpath slopes downhill towards Swanston Street. The lowest point is on the right side of the lobby facing the Theatre and Barbara was able to get up this step in her electric wheelchair. The footpath outside the entrance is covered by a large awning. The floor surface of the lobby is marble.

Foyers: All foyers are carpeted. The stalls fover is guite small with a second annexed area off the main fover and up two steps. There is no Circle or Gallery Foyers. A licensed bar opens one hour prior to the performance (or after 6pm) and also sells tea, coffee, confectionery etc. A second bar operates in the annexed stalls fover opposite the main bar when it is busy. (Cafe on Collins next door to the Athenaeum often remains open until after interval

Toilets: The toilets are located in the main foyer on the left past the Box Office. The female facilities have 3 cubicles none of which are wheelchair accessible. The height of the basins is okay for wheelchair users but the handtowels and mirrors are too high. The male facilities have 3 cubicles none of which are wheelchair accessible. Space is limited. Access to the male toilets is through a door and down 3 steps. There are no disabled toilet facilities at present.

Telephone: There are 3 Public Telephones outside the Athenaeum Theatre towards the Town Hall. One is wheelchair accessible.

The Theatre: Total Capacity: 914. The Stalls has a capacity of 453. Access to the Stalls is via two sets of double doors which are opened and staffed prior to the performance. The back of the auditorium has two aisles. The front of the auditorium has a centre aisle and two aisles along the side walls,

Row numbers & seat numbers are clearly marked. The Athenaeum recently refurbished the original seats and there is plenty of leg room. Two pillars in the stalls impair viewing but seats affected are sold as restricted viewing at a reduced rate. The floor of the auditorium is slightly raked to facilitate viewing. The floor surface is wood and the aisles are carpeted. Wheelchair seating is at the rear of the stalls behind the last row of the 2 side blocks. A chair will be provided for an accompanying person. The staff are extremely helpful and will assist.

Dress Circle: Capacity-218. It is accessible via stairs beyond the Candy Bar. Steps lead down to all seats in the

Circle. Access is via a centre aisle and two side aisles dividing the seating into 3 blocks. The ladies toilet is off the Dress Circle entrance foyer up two steps.

Gallery: Capacity-247. It is accessible via the glass doors off the street level lobby next to the main entrance. (This is also the access to The Athenaeum Library and the Athenaeum Two Theatre.) The Gallery is up two sets of steps with handrails. There are steep steps to all seats.

The Athenaeum Two

Enter from street level through the glass doors on the right of the lobby. Access to this Theatre is via 4 flights of stairs...a long way up! There are rails on all stairs. There is lift access to the Athenaeum Two Theatre. The lift is located next to the Box Office in the ground floor foyer. It is an old style wooden lift and can only hold 1 wheelchair and 2 accompanying people. Assistance is required with the Lift doors but the staff will assist. Entrance to the Theatre is via double doors off a landing at the top of the final flight of steps. This door is staffed prior to the performance. Tickets for this venue are available at the main Box Office downstairs or at the door. This Theatre is small and intimate and is used for a wide variety of productions including comedy, dance, and new work. The capacity of the Theatre is 150. The seating is end on and raked fairly steeply. There are steps to all seats and viewing is excellent. New seating has been installed recently. Wheelchairs can be placed in front of the front row of seats.

The Athenaeum Library

Library Hours: Monday - Friday: 8.30am-5.00pm Saturday: 8.30am - 12 midday.

Membership: There are a variety of memberships available depending on the number of books you wish to borrow in one visit. For one book at a time for up to a month, the fee is \$28.30. You can borrow up to 12 books at a time and fees increase with the number of books. Membership can be paid quarterly, half vearly or yearly.

There is a 15% discount for people over 60. Entrance to the Library is off the lobby to the right of the Athenaeum Theatre street entrance through the glass doors. There are two flights of stairs up with handrails. The lift near the Athenaeum Box Office is available for Library patrons and stops on the second floor inside the Library.
