# SECOND SKIN

## Catalyst Dance Masterclass Series :: Studio Showing Bangarra Theatre :: Sunday 15 September 2013

Choreographers Sue Healey, Dean Walsh and Philip Channells worked with more than 20 dancers to devise three short dance works traversing duets between camera and dancer, sub-aquatic space and states of dress and undress. The end result is *Second Skin*, a studio showing at Bangarra Theatre, where dancers will shed their layers and expose what's underneath their skin.

This innovative program, a collaboration involving dancers with and without disability, breaks new ground in integrated dance.

### Project Team

### Dance Work 1 :: Choreographer Sue Healey

Challenging the human desire to conform to a "norm" Sue invited the dancers to devise choreographic movements that explore a sense of space and connection with others. Projected images on moving bodies and the use of fabric and kinesthetic awareness form a "second skin" allowing the dancers to connect inwards and outwards.

### Dance Work 2 :: Choreographer Dean Walsh

Oxygen and water maintain all life, without exception or discrimination – elementally shared "second skins". Dean's movement focuses on human breath and skeletal/muscle mass suspensions – a state of neutral buoyancy one seeks to inhabit during scuba diving.

### Dance Work 3 :: Choreographer Philip Channells

Using imagery from the skeletal and musculature system; exploring physical memories (from childhood) with an emotional attachment; and exposing hidden truths, this movement invites the audience to consider the complexities that shape who we truly are and how we see the world.


Catalyst created an opportunity for artists with and without disability including emerging and professional dancers, physical theatre performers, dance teachers, educators, choreographers and movement therapists to:

- Experience professional development and training
- Explore strategies and methods for devising work
- Engage with Australia's leading choreographers

The Catalyst objectives are in response to several key recommendations identified from the Accessible Arts Dance Symposium held at Carriageworks in 2011

## Catalyst Dance MasterTeachers

Masterclass I - Saturday 30 June and Sunday 1 July



Sue Healey has been at the forefront of Australian contemporary dance for more than two decades, as performer, educator, choreographer and dance film maker. She is a lecturer in Dance, Composition and Dance/Technology at UNSW. As a founding member of Nanette Hassall's iconic Dance Works, she performed and choreographed with the company from 1983-88. From 1993-95 Healey was Artistic Director of the company Vis-à-Vis Dance Canberra, creating seven seasons of new work. Her work has toured into the United States, New Zealand, United Kingdom, China and Japan.

Works made in Sydney include three collections: Niche series (2002-04), In Time series (2005-07) and the current Curiosities series (2009-2012). These encompass 16 works across live performance, dance film, gallery installations and international collaborations. They have won awards nationally and internationally and the major works from each series have been presented by Sydney Opera House and have toured to Melbourne, Canberra, New Zealand and Japan. Her feature documentary dance film Virtuosi also premiered in 2012.



**K**iruna Stamell is an Australian actor and dancer with dwarfism. Based in London since 2004, she is a frequent guest presenter on the BBC's Ouch Podcast and also East-Enders as the teacher Sandra Fielding. Kiruna has also appeared in the BBC drama series, All The Small Things and Come in the UK's Channel 4 series, Cast Off.

Kiruna has long been involved in the disability arts movement and was an original co-founder of Atypical Theatre Company in Australia. Kiruna began her career as a dancer and got her "big break" when she appeared in Baz Luhrmann's *Nim Moulin Rouge*. Kiruna has worked extensively with CanedoCo Dance Company in the UK. She danced in the opening ceremonies of two Olympic Games. Kiruna works in physical theatre in the UK, Australia and Europe.



**D**ean Walsh is the current recipient of the 2011-2012 Australia Council Dance Fellowship. Since 1991 he has worked in the dance and contemporary performance disciplines as performer, collaborator, choreographer, director, mentor and teacher. His repertoires of 25 short and three full-length solo works have been acclaimed, many touring nationally and internationally.

## Masterclass II - Saturday 8 and Sunday 9 September

**H**elen Clarke-Lapin has taught dance movement in many contexts, both professional and community based. Originally a member of Synergy Dance Company based in Vancouver, then as a founding member of Fulcrum, a largely improvisational three-member company, Helen performed across North America. She has performed with Steve Paxton, founder of Contact Improvisation. Helen has a Masters degree in Dance/Movement Therapy (Arnoach University), Masters in Occupational Therapy (Sydney University) and is a certified Yoga Teacher (RYTA).


Highlights of Helens long standing dance career include Force Majeure Company (Teacher), Munro Street Theatre for Young People, (Movement Director), Australian Dance Theatre (Contact Improv Workshops) DV8 Physical Theatre Company - Olympic Arts Festival (Teacher), Stalker Theatre Company (Movement Coach)

Dean's inventive large-scale dance and multi-media group work, Back from Front, premiered at Performance Space in 2008 attracting an extremely diverse audience. In 2009-10 his collaborative dance/aerial duet MirrorMirror toured with Stalker Theatre and director David Clarkson to Holland.

Earlier in 2010 Dean undertook a choreographic residency at Performance Space, choreographing a work for Western Australia Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA) and working with Sydney Theatre Company & London's Frantic Assembly.

In 2002 Dean was awarded the Robert Helpmann Scholarship leading to an engagement with London's DV8 Physical Theatre company working with Amsterdam-based choreographer, Paul Selwyn Norton and a group of ex-Ballet Frankfurt dancers constructing the highly successful work Luxury Item. He won the Australian Dance Award for Most Outstanding Performance by a Male Dancer for his role in Australian Dance Theatre's Age Of Unbeauty and in 2005 Dean was again nominated for his solo work Grounded on Air.

## Masterclass III - Sunday 4 November and Monday 5 November



**P**hilip Channells began training in 1993 at The Con in Lismore before joining the CPA (Adelaide College of the Arts) and Link Dance Company (2003) at WAPPA. Enmeshed in this training has been a commitment to developing disability arts, which he's dedicated 15 years. He spent the first eight years of his career in Australia, gaining an understanding of community cultural development and disability cultural practice, before moving to the UK in 2007. Philip worked with Candoco, StepGAP and Corali dance companies, Scottish Dance Theatre and East London Dance. In Australia he's worked with Elizabeth Cameron-Dalman, Kay Armstrong, Dean Walsh, Michael Whalen, Ingrid Voorenndt and Marc Beesw, No Strings Attached Theatre of Disability, Tati Arts and dFaces of Youth.

Philip spent 10 years working with Resilient Dance Theatre where he was the Artistic Director (2009 – 2012). He directed 'Nest of Kai' for the Youth Ensemble and mentored Andrew Pandos in 'Debut J – the dancers direct'. He was one of eight choreographers at the Australian Youth Dance Festival 2012 and showed inPerspective #1 at ADT's 'Rough Draft' and Ausdance SA's 'Choreolab'. He's presented at the National Dance Forum, Dance Your Heart Out, Arts Activated Conference, Don't DIS my ABILITY, Dance Symposium NSW, Global dCi/WDA Dance Summit Taipei, Australia Week Celebrations Port Moresby and has recently mentored DirtyFeet and Studio Aperio in NSW. Philip is fiercely committed to developing disability arts through redefining an artistic practice that integrates people from diverse backgrounds.
