

ABOUT ARTS PROJECT AUSTRALIA

Arts Project Australia was founded in 1974 as an organisation dedicated to supporting people with disabilities to become practitioners in the visual arts and to promoting their work as integral to the broad spectrum of contemporary arts practice.

Since its inception, Arts Project Australia has continued to strive for excellence, both in the exhibitions presented and the quality of the innovative studio program. Artists come to the studio each week where they have the opportunity to work in an array of media within the visual arts such as drawing, painting, ceramics, textiles and animation. While the participants are supported by artsworkers, there is a focus on the individual artist, their autonomy of artistic expression and sense of control and ownership over their work.

Exhibitions are integral to Arts Project Australia. The ground floor gallery stages a full annual program of changing exhibitions featuring work by artists from Arts Project Australia as well as the broader community. Arts Project Australia continues to be involved in many exhibitions locally, nationally and internationally and artists from Arts Project Australia are also represented in many private and public collections.

Arts Project Australia has a unique history and approach and has long been recognised as a model for innovative services for people with disabilities. It is committed to providing sustainable programs in an environment dedicated to visual arts practice.

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# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

This year has been a very busy and eventful one but we have now settled down and are locusing on our key activities, in particular, the work in the studio and the development of our collection and our exhibition activities.

The biggest transition for us during the year has been the change of our Executive Director. Lena Cirilio left us in January to take up a position with the Shire of Yama Ranges. Under Lena's leadership we settled into our new building where she strengthered our administration and systems to enable us to manage our organisation efficiently and meet the accreditation and other requirements of our funding bodies. We are most grateful to her for her commitment and strong philosophy about the artists, their work and their place in the arts community.

We have been very pleased to welcome Brendan Lillywhite as our Transitional Executive Director. Brendan comes to us with a background in disability services, planning and management of community organisations, and has a strong interest in the arts. Brendan has fitted into the organisation with ease, quickly getting to know us, managing the day-to-day issues and working with our funding bodies and other partners. Brendan has a strong vision of the opportunities for Arts Project Australia. I would particularly like to thank him for his understanding of the organisation, his energy and commitment to us and for the thinking he is putting into our future directions.

In considering our future, it was clear to us that it is time to focus on our collection, the gallery and the exhibitions program. There is opportunity for more work to be seen and promoted, to develop the Arts Project Australia collection and to build the exhibitions program and profile. A new Gallery Manager position has been created to review and develop these functions, working with the staff in these areas. We are also keen to look at our studio activities to ensure we are making the best use of the space and other resources in this area. This will continue to be an area of interest for the Board in the coming year.

Over the past year we were pleased to see the membership of Arts Project Australia grow stronger. Membership has risen to sixty four and many members are very active in the organisation. We were encouraged by the strong attendance at last year's Annual General Meeting and members, friends and relatives of artists came to a function to mark the beginning of the new year. As always, they are strong supporters at our exhibitions and openings. We appreciate this commitment very much. If was with great delight that John Mackay Northe was awarded Life Membership of Arts Project Australia recognizing his outstanding contribution.

This year we were pleased to welcome several new members to the Board, Stuart Purves, Catherine Easton and Nektaria Kalpakidis. The Board continues to be a very active and robust forum. Members represent a range of experience and skills and bring a valuable contribution to working through some of the complex issues we face. My thanks to all the Board members for their commitment and contribution.

The Board continues to govern in accordance with Arts Project Australia's values and strategic objectives. Some key activities over the coming year will be to develop opportunities and programs for artists, promote the collection and exhibitions activities and strengthen other sources of income.

Our thanks to our funding bodies, the State Government through the Department of Human Services, North and West Metropolitan Region (DHS); the Northern Metropolitan Region of Adult Community and Further Education (ACFE); the Commonwealth Department of Families, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs (FaCSIA). Many of the people we work with in these government departments have taken a particular interest in Arts Project Australia. We appreciate this very much and hope that, in turn, they are enriched by experiencing the work of our artists.

We would also like to thank the organisations and individuals who have given us financial or professional support. The Industry Services Fund, The Community Hentage Grants Program which has supported the management of our collection, The J. T. Reid Charitable Trusts and The Dyson Bequest. Our partnership with State Trustees continued this year with the connected 07 exhibition at Federation Square. This exhibition brings the work of our artists and others to a public venue where it is seen by a wide audience.

In particular, we would also like to recognise the staff and volunteers. We appreciate their active commitment to the philosophy of Arts Project Australia and to working with the artists with thoughtfulness and strong standards of considering and presenting their work. The effect of this sensitivity and understanding is seen in the work, especially when it is exhibited.

Finally, and most importantly, thank you to the artists for their sense of focus, intense commitment and wonderful creativity.

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# DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Since commercing at Arts Project Australia, people have heard me speak about the richness and diversity, depth and achievement that characterises who and what we are – all testament to the cumulative hard work, vision and endeavour of many people over the last 30 years.

The energy and commitment displayed by the artists, artsworkers, operational staff and the Board at Arts. Project Australia continues to be the core of our kindred spirit. These are the keepers of "the flame", as were the founding members and, contemporaneously, are those who are current members.

Whilst reflecting on the previous twelve months, significant milestones are readily identifiable, being strong statements of the tangible achievements both individually and collectively reached.

Achievement can be gauged across a range of indicators including the artists interest in regularly working in the studio, the quality and diversity of the works produced, the celebration and expression in the daily routine, culminating in group and individual exhibitions with the associated anticipation and recognition.

It is a privilege to be part of this dynamic. I continually witness the lack of ego expressed in the quiet pride of an opening night and the resultant recognition when work is sold to an appreciative audience. This is creative endeavour without guile or pretence.

Curetors continue to demonstrate and articulate the sensitivity between artist and artsworker in a refreshing sense of continual flexibility, sensitivity and nonpatronage. In a world increasingly formulated, controlled and homogenised by those seeking membership and identity through conformity, at Arts Project Australia we experience unadulterated human spirit and interpretation portrayed honestly and with purity. By any one measure of achievement, we can just reflect on the amount of work sold this year which is a 50% increase from the previous year.

As part of this expanding recognition, we celebrate the collection: 'Pearls of Arts Project Australia - Stuart Purvet Collection' which had its inaugural exhibition at the Penrith Regional Gallery & The Lewers Bequest at Emu Plains, New South Wales in May 2007. This inspiring body of 180 works is the result of nearly 10 years of collecting. It represents a consummate array of skill and expertise in what is arguably the most comprehensive cross section of work by Arts Project Australia artists in one collection in private hands.

Another active supporter is Peter Fay who continues to regularly visit from New South Wales and whose consistent and enthusiastic response and patronage is noted.

As Arts Project Australia artists continue to grow in recognition, other milestones occurred including Arts Project Australia being selected as the venue to launch the appointment of the first Disability Services Commissioner for Victoria, Mr Laurie Harkin, by the then Minister for Community Services, The Honourable Gavin Jennings. The year has also been somewhat turnuluous, with many changes and challenges as Arts Project Australia continues to settle into an expanded capability and position for new directions. Lena Cirilio, Executive Director, moved on to a new role and other equally valued people have also left to explore new opportunities. We have also been extremely fortunate to recruit new artsworkers with a breadth of talent.

The Board has recognised the importance of directing additional energy into making our collections more accessible with the creation of a new role of Gallery Manager. This new position covers both internal and external exhibitions and we look forward to an active touring program.

I wish to thank all that have devoted their time, energy and passion to the development of Arts Project Australia over the last year. This includes those that have generously volunteered their skills and expertise throughout the year.

The state government Department of Human Services; Adult, Community and Further Education; and the Commonwealth Department of Families, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs continue to support Arts. Project Australia through ongoing funding. Additional key supporters are the Sidney Myer Foundation and The Dyson Beguest.

Equally deserving of recognition are the artists, artsworkers and "front and back of house" including gallery reception, archive, exhibitions and administration.

Finally, the Board members deserve mention for consistently volunteering their time, effort and overarching direction.

I remain in awe of the works that are produced and remain an unapologetic advocate for the artists and their significant accomplishments.

We must collectively appreciate our achievements and continue to celebrate our move forward.

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
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# DIO MANAGER'S REPORT

This year has seen a flurry of activity in the studio. With over 140 artists working in any one week, the studio continues to run smoothly and the artists have developed some intriguing work.

Arts Project Australia artists, supported by other professional artists, undortake their committed role as contemporary arts practitioners. With the sound of an ABBA song or a cello concerto humming in the background, every day sees a canvas being stretched, a mound of pastel dust pile beneath an easel, or perhapsa ceramic glaze take on a new hue.

Out of such activities the artists have developed many captivating and progressive works which have found a home in the Arts Project Australia gallery as well as external exhibition and project spaces. These opportunities have been born out of the many visits tothe studio by recognised curators and collectors as wellas those generated internally.

As mentioned in previous reports, Stuart Purves finally realised his dream to complete and exhibit his extensive collection of Arts Project Australia artists' work.

Peter Fay, collector and curator, continues to make regular trips from interstate to visit the Arts Project Australia studio artists. Along with Peter's enthusiasm to Anthony of Padua.

curate exhibitions with Arts Project Australia artists, he also commissioned Lisa Reid to paint a large scale portrait of himself. Ten months after its inception, Lisa's magnificent painting is well on its way. Peter would like to enter this work into the crestigious Archibald Painting Prize for Portraiture in 2008.

Lisa Reid was also successful being selected as a finalist to exhibit her coloured pencil work titled Tristan in the national 2006 Jacaranda Acquisitive Drawing Award. The award exhibition is touring Australia until early

After producing hundreds of grey lead line drawings and scanning them into the computer, Miles Howard-Wilks created a lyrical animation titled Chocolate Land which takes viewers on a journey through a wonderfully layered landscape made of chocolate. Curator Glenn Barkley keenly selected the animation and some pencildrawings for his exhibition titled Otherworlds at King Street Gallery on Burton in Sydney in June this year.

Other achievements for Arts Project Australia studio artists include Julian Martin and Miles Howard-Wilks' work being acquired for the progressive Ergas Collection and the studio being approached by a Sydney patron to submit for a large commission of the patron Saint

As well as local visitors, the studio has had several visitors from overseas including Huib van den Wilingaard from Kunst & Vilegwerk - studio and gallery in Amsterdam, Suzanne Vesty from Spark Studios in New Zealand and Alex Wester from New York. All were highly impressed with the setup of the studio, the artwork generated, and the philosophy under which the staff are employed and carry out their work.

There have been many valuable developments in the studio this year. Reflecting on a few, Alan Constable, who has an unquestionable work ethic, has had several breakthroughs with his creative processes. Recently Alanhas taken up filmy gouache work on grit grounded papers, a significant shift from his impasto style acrylics. Chris O'Brien has added a new dimension to his sculptural practice by creating domestic dwellings. Dionne Canzano has been following her passion for the feline with numerous pastel works, with this medium allowing her to articulate the qualities of feline for more sensitively and seductively despite their sometimes fierce

It would be impossible to support Arts Project Australia artists and generate the wider interests of Arts Project Australia without such committed and passionate artsworkers. We have such a diverse and rich mix of abilities and technical skills represented which proudly complement the Studio activity.

The Animation program had an injection of new energy and expertise with Michelle Mills and Kate Riedel joining early in 2007, bringing their skills to move the program along with great enthusiasm. Cathy Blanchflower Joined the studio as Artsworker General in March. Cathy has an extensive exhibiting career, having recently returned from working in New York, James McDonald is also a new and valued addition to the Artsworkers.

This year we have farewelled Adam Lee, Simone Sheehan, Shay Minster and Tonia Rowe, all who contributed greatly, and we wish them well in their new pursuits although they will be missed.

The volunteer program continues to be successful and has supported not only the studio but also the archives. exhibitions and administrative areas of Arts Project Australia, Many thanks to the volunteers and Rachel Gorman for her coordination.

As usual the year has been hectic and energetic with a lot of work created. The studio continues to be a vibrant space and we look forward to what the next year will produce.

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# EXHIBITIONS REPORT

Over the past year, Arts Project Australia has been. Involved in a number of exciting and successful. exhibitions at the Arts Project Australia gallery as well as of their work. Extensive work was undertaken by the high profile national and international venues. Theseexhibitions included paintings, drawings and ceramics. reflecting the depth and aesthetic richness of the work produced by studio artists. This year, a number of artists from Arts Project Australia have also been included in public exhibitions and awards alongside established contemporary artists. Exhibitions are developed and managed by the Exhibitions Committee, and we are grateful to David Huriston from the National Gallery of Victoria for his contribution on the committee.

This year, eight exhibitions were presented at the Arts Project Australia gallery, including a number of solo and group exhibitions. Strong audience numbers resulted in increased artwork sales. Further marketing initiatives are being developed to build on this public awareness.

A major exhibition this year was John Mackay Norther Ardent Gleanings - a survey of significant works curated by Dr Cheryl Daye. This exhibition provided a stunning overview of this artist's career and was further enhanced by an informative floor talk by the ourstor. Alongside the exhibition. Arts Project Australia also published a monograph celebrating the work of John Mackey Northe. This publication is a great reference containing essays, full colour images and information about this important artist:

It was significant that Arts Project Australia was approached by Anne Loxley, Curator Penrith Regional Gallery & The Lewers Boquest, to participate in the exciting exhibition Yours, Mine and Ours: 50 YEARS OF ABC TV. This exhibition explored ideas about Australian culture, television and social history and notions of public broadcasting. The exhibition saw over 20 of Australia's leading contemporary artists use the 50 years: of ABC TV broadcast archives as inspiration for the development of a new work. Through a collaborative process involving ABC archive researchers, the artists

used archivel material including stills, publicity shots, documents, print material and film footage, as the basis artsworkers in selecting visual resources and the result. was a highly successful representation.

Arts Project Australia also exhibited at Melbourne Art Fair 2006, the premier fair and public exposition of contemporary visual art in the Asia Pacific region. Arts Project Australia presented a selection of new works produced by artists attending the studio program. These contemporary artworks included a variety of media and were viewed by thousands of national and international visitors. Participation in exhibitions such as these allows. Arts Project Australia to engage a wide and diverse

Building on the achievement of last year, connected07 was again held at Federation Square. The partnership of Arts Project Australia and State Trustees continues to be extremely successful and we are grateful for the support and participation of the many other organisations that contributed to this inspiring exhibition of contemporary artworks. In particular, Art Unlimited, Learn for Yourself. Northern Support Service, Nadrasca ATSS, Oakleigh Centre, Salvation Army Anchorage and the Stables Art

Arts Project Australia also cocrates an artwork leasing. program that leases artworks to corporate, private and public agencies.

The exhibition calendar for the next year promises to be just as exciting with a number of strong exhibitions and events planned. We look forward to further engaging our audience in all Arts Project Australia activities.



# **COLLECTIONS REPORT**

The Arts Project Australia Permanent Collection provides access to selected artworks and heritage items for exhibition and aims to become an education and research resource. It is divided into three main categories.

The Arts Project Australia Art Collection, supported by The Dyson Bequest, is an exciting collection providing for the documentation, preservation and conservation of a representative cross-section of work produced in the studio.

The Arts Project Australia Historical Collection includes correspondence, documents, photographs, video, audiotages, ephemera and publications pertaining to the history of Arts Project Australia.

The Sidney Myer Fund Permanent Collection comprises over four hundred drawings and paintings which formed the basis of two early landmark exhibitions organised by Arts Project Australia. The collection is named in recognition of the support given by the Sidney Myer Fund towards the documentation and conservation of the works from these exhibitions.

The Arts Project Australia Archive again had a very busy year. Many collectors and casual visitors made accointments to view artists' folios after seeing work in exhibitions both at Arts Project Australia and external galleries. The significance of the Permanent Collection was also recognised in the form of a Community Heritage Grant and with support for the Oral History Project. Arts Project Australia's connections to international collections and dealers were expanded when Archivist Monica Syrette. travelled to Ireland and London.

In June 2006, Arts Project Australia applied for a Community Heritage Grant to run a Caring for Collections workshop. The workshop will provide Arts Project Australia staff with a solid grounding in the principles of collection care. The Community Heritage


Grants Program aims to preserve and provide access to locally held nationally significant cultural heritage. collections across Australia.

As part of the grant, Monica Syrette attended an intensive preservation and collection management. training workshop at the National Library of Australia, the National Archives, the National Museum of Australia and the National Film and Sound Archive in Canberra. The grant was awarded to recipients by the Federal Minister for the Arts and Sport, Senator the Hon. Rod Kemp.

Arts Project Australia's history lies not just in the artwork produced or the historical documents but in the memories of its staff and artists. This heritage includes the ideas, philosophies and recollections of key people who have had a long-standing and significant relationship with the Arts Project Australia. studio. In early 2007, Monica Syrette and Camilla Bett created a proposal for an Oral History project that would capture this intangible heritage. This exciting project is currently being developed and will commence in late 2007.

In April 2007, Monica Synette travelled to the UK and Europe where she met with Elmear Martin. Fellow in Outsider Art at the Irish Museum of Modern Art (IMMA) and Henry Boxer, collector and dealer of Outsider and Visionary Art in London. Elmear Martin is the curator of the Musgrave Kinley Outsider Art Collection whilst Henry Boxer has been dealing in Outsider and Visionary Art for years. Upon her return, Monica presented a talk to the staff and Board focusing on the continuing international debate surrounding the label Outsider Art and the important contributions Arts Project Australia can make to this debate.

These ongoing archival projects will ensure the preservation and development of Arts Project Australia's Permanent Collection.

# FINANCIAL REPORT

The year ended 30 June 2007 was a successful year for APA, primarily because the mortgage was repaid. We now look forward to many fruitful years in our custom-designed premises.

The financial statements following outline in detail the income, expenditure, cash flows and financial position of the association during the past two years.

#### REVENUE ANALYSIS

Total revenue increased 35% over the previous year. Continuing support from both Federal and State governments resulted in a small increase in recurrent grants. A special payment from the Victorian Department of Human Services to assist in repaying the mortgage was most appreciated. Increased attendances at both external and internal art exhibitions produced sales growth of 54%. A reduction in sponsorship during the year was evaluated and resulted in a decision to appoint a Gallery Manager. This action is planned to ensure future growth in sponsorship.

#### COPPLISE ANALYSIS

A 13% increase in total expenses was incurred primarily to improve the Studio facilities and staffing levels. Arts Project Australia is justly proud of its facilities and particularly the people who deliver the programs in these facilities. In addition to providing the programs, the cost of marketing and selling the resulting art continues to increase. Containing these costs is very necessary as our failure to do so would result in increased fees, which we are loath to do.

#### CASH PLOWS

Despite the strong profit, there was a net decrease in cash holdings of \$125,000. This was primarily due to the repayment of the bank loan of \$203,000. Importantly, operational cash flows were positive, and these are the underlying cash flows from our normal operations. This gives us confidence when projecting future cash flows.

#### TALASCE THEIR

The net worth of the Association now exceeds \$1.52 million, an increase of \$0.26 million. The strong balance sheet confirms that the longer-term strategy is trending as anticipated.

#### FUTORE

Since the financial year-end, the association has operated in line with its plan and there have been no significant changes in the association's state of affairs. An independent review of administration functions and IT requirements is currently in progress to ensure our future efficiency and capacity to meet the requirements of all our stakeholders.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the management and staff for their support, enthusiasm and focus over the past year.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2007

### HOTE - MATCHEST OF SIGNIFICANT

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations incorporations Act (Vic). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Vic) and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 112: Income Taxes AASB 1031: Materiality

AASB 110: Events Occurring After Reporting Date

AASB 117: Leases

No other applicable Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report:

#### (a) Income tax

The association is exempt from income tax.

#### (b) Fixed Assets

Lessehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation. The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the loase or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

Firtures and Fittings and Floor Covering have been reallocated to Plant & Equipment.

Land and building are to be independently revalued every 3 years. A commercial valuation was received during the 2005/05 financial year.

#### (c) Leases

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership, are transferred to the entity, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised recording an asset and a liability at the lower amounts equal to the fair value of the lease property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are affocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basisover the shorter of their estimated useful fives or the lease term.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the period in which they are incurred.

Lasse incentives under operating leases are recognized as a liability and amortised on a straightline basis over the life of the lease term.


The audit opinion expressed in this report has been formed on the above basis.
