#### "Penpushers" tutors-the writers' art.

If ever proof was needed that you are never too old to write then there was plenty of proof provided by the Arts Access Western Region Aged Project.

The Project culminated with two seminars entitled "Prologue," which brought together members of the Footscray Over 50's Writers Group, older writers from three institutions and interested older people from the public.

Leading up to the seminars, members of the Footscray Writers Group acted as tutors for older people from three institutions–Mount Royal Hospital, Marie Mill Community Centre and Corandirk Hostelunder the guidance of artist Kristin Henry and unearthed storytelling skills and experiences which were shared with those at each of the Prologue seminars.

The Seminars were held on Friday March 20 and Saturday March 21 at the Footscray Community Arts Centre as part of SENIOR CITIZENS WEEK. Both days had a variety of highlights:

On the Friday tutors and their pupils shared readings from their own worksan event that was both entertaining and 700.9945

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inspiring. A warm note was added to the day with the celebration of the 94th birthday of one of the participants whose stories of her early life in the outback produced lots of laughter.

On the Saturday, Mrs Jean McCaughey, wife of Victoria's Governor Mr Davis McCaughey, launched a collection of writings by members of the Footscray Writers' Group entitled "Penpushers." Mrs McCaughey spoke enthusiastically about the contribution the writers had made towards "art for everyone" and enjoyed the selection of readings from the book which followed the launch.

AND on both days all those who attended had the privilege of viewing a performance entitled "Sweethearts," which was developed and performed by the Newport and Williamstown Senior Citizens' Club with the help of artists Michelle Howard and Steven Kingshott. It was the story of first loves and audiences on both days were happy to join in with many of the songs and to find something in common with the performers. Both days were received so well that tutors are helping Arts Access plan for a similar day in June when the current aged project willend. The project has been hunded by the Department of Premier and Cabinet.

The following is the list of programmes currently being undertaken by Arts Access Society Inc. ST. VINCENT'S BOYS HOME-drama and music (percussion

We will also be conducting a number of one-off one day workshops in regional and metropolitan areas hopefully for staff work-ing with intellectually disabled, to encourage creativity and understanding of our work. We will also be conducting drama, movement and music workshops for residents from Community Residential Units and any other young intellectually disabled people in the local community.

Arts Access also welcomes Susie Dickson who is our receptionist/office assistant. Susie has joined Arts Access

following the resignation of office administrator Sue Malings. Michelle Stone has been promoted to office administrator.

Susie hails from Deniliquin (Downie country) and is a keen photographer and tennis player. "She is the best thing to happen
