Jem has recently made a big decision and Mouth Music is his story. Because Jem is non-verbal the idea of speaking and not being heard is a major theme. Jem has some important things he wants to say to the world, not least that we must look after the earth and also learn a thing or two about looking after each other. Mouth Music has involved Tutti in the very roots of vocal music-making and has strong emotional resonance for anyone concerned about the voice of the individual and the state of the world. It has been a pleasure to develop this very different new work with Jem and poets, Michael Kingsbury, Kim Mann and Amelia Walker and I thank Michael for being part of the rehearsal process and part of this show. I want also to acknowledge the creative input of Catherine Campbell, Jamie Jewell, Hew Parham and Emma Salter who together with Tutti Arts and Choir performers have refined the raw material for this work in progress presentation. We are delighted to be working again with composer Alies Sluiter and a truly contemporary Mouth Musician - UK Beatboxer, Jason Singh. This work in progress presentation also involves Tutti's new Visual Arts Department for the first time. I thank tutors Melanie Fulton, Justin de Leeun and the Tutti artists who together with our designer Jill Halliday have created the 'Wasteland' set for us. We hope you enjoy stage one of Mouth Music.

*Traditional Gaelic Mouth music (known as Puirt-a-buel) arose in response to suppression of culture by the English. People 'sang' songs and musical lines which described everything from a range of dances to everyday work and conversation with the sounds their mouths could make. It became popular in places where people could not afford instruments. Fiddling, piping and the tenor drum used to be taught this way as did Indian Tabla playing.

Catherine Campbell - Director

Catherine first worked with Tutti on Between The Worlds as Vocal Coach. She is an actor and singer, and this is her second show as director. Catherine has appeared in the Adelaide Cabaret Festival (each year since its beginning in 2001), for the Barossa International Music Festival, the Melbourne Comedy Festival and in 2005, the famous cabaret venue Don't Tell Marna in New York. She is a founder of the award-winning cabaret/comedy trio Gentlemen Prefer Curves, co-wrote the solo show My Blue Angel: Marlene Dietrich with Frank Ford, created the role of Greta for the cult show Berlin Cabaret, and founded the Adelaide Andrews Sisters. Catherine has performed the State Opera of SA since 1997 and co-wrote the comedy opera Is There a Tenor In The House? for their studio program. Catherine has been awarded an Emerging Artists grant to study cabaret at Yale University in the US in July 2006-06-01

Pat Rix - Scriptwriter. Pat is an established writer and composer who founded the Tutti Ensemble in 1997. She has an international reputation as a leader in social inclusion and the arts and has a strong interest in collaboration. Her major works include Between the Worlds, Circles, Towards Unlit Skies, The Singing of Angels, Melrose Under the Big Top and My Life, My Love for the 2002 Adelaide Festival.

Co-writers

Jem Hartgen. Mouth Music is Jem's first time being involved in writing for theatre and he wants you to know it has been awesome! Michael Kingsbury is an extensively published Adelaide poet and spoken word performer known for his lyrical surrealist and imagist verse. 'His 'Burning Man Project' has been published in the US Skyline Magazine Kim Mann is a widely published poet and creative writer who has won prizes and performed at Festivals around Australia. Alies Sluiter - Composer

Alies graduated from the VCA in 2003, has a Master of Arts in Screen Composition from the Australian Film Television and Radio School and is about to finish her first EP. She has composed for 14 shorts and 1 feature film as well as numerous commissioned works and theatre productions. In 2005 she was funded by the Aust Film Commission and the Aust Embassy in Berlin to attend the Berlinale Talent Campus in Germany. In the 2004 Melbourne International Arts Festival she worked with British composer/producer Nitin Sawhney in Aftershock and in 2005 performed in the UK Aftershock at the Sage Concert hall in Gateshead. During 2005 she also worked on the critically acclaimed production Zero Degrees (composer Nitin Sawhney) - nominated for an Olivier Award, Critics Circle Award and Time Out Award. The production toured Europe throughout 2005 and will tour the US, Canada and Mexico in 2006. Alies has performed and recorded with many musicians including David Helfgott, Nitin Sawhney, Aref Durvesh, Shane Howard, Hugh Jackman, Kate Ceberano and Matt Heatherington and in 2005 was invited by the Australia Council to perform at the launch of Undergrowth in London (UK). with Sylvie Guillem and Akram Khan.

Jason is a Beatboxer, turntablelist, composer, percussionist and workshop facilitator based in Manchester, UK. He has collaborated and performed with international artists across a plethora of musical genres and also composes music for theatre productions. Jason also maintains a strong ethos of sharing knowledge and experience at a grass roots level and thus facilitates DJ, percussion and beatboxing workshops in youth clubs, prisons, festivals, schools and colleges both nationally and internationally. In 2005, Jason founded the "Beatbox Orchestra" to facilitate workshops and produce national and international performances.
