Parking

Limited parking in the area. St. Martins Lane is one way from Park Street and has "No-Parking" signs down its length. Some people, however, still park there! Street parking on Millswyn Street. Off street parking in a site behind the theatre. Entrance to this parking area is SF not marked. Drive down St Martins Lane continued over 790-19605 EA

and turn right at the west side of the theatre, this lane passes behind two blocks of flats.

Accessible Parking

Possible to drop off at theatre but no place specifically marked. Parking behind the theatre (see above) is rough gravel.

Entrances

No steps into fover.

There are 12 steps from the fover into the auditorium. These steps have rails up the middle and on both sides.

People requiring assistance up and down the theatre steps should ring the theatre beforehand on 267 2551. During the day this number will have an answering service, leave an appropriate message and the Front of House Manager will make arrangements.

A gallery space leads off the fover, small performances and temporary exhibitions are held in this space. One section of this area, known as "The Pit" is three steps down, the rest is accessible. Foyer bar (unlicensed) is high.

Seating

The auditorium is divided into two sections by a broad passage. Seating on the first row of the upper section, Row H, is level with the top of the twelve steps leading into the theatre.

There is no central aisle. Seats numbered and the set

1, or, for some rows, 23, 24 or 25 are on the side. Rails line both sides of the auditorium.

Accessible Seating

Once the twelve steps into the auditorium have been negotiated, people remaining in their wheelchairs can stay in front of Row H, to the side. People transferring also use Row H. These are the best seats in the house.

Toilets

Toilets are down a short corridor off the Gallery Space, this corridor is unmarked and dimly lit. There are two steps down to the Ladies and a further three steps to the Mens with no rail to either level.

Accessible Toilet

One accessible toilet at the far end of the Gallery Space. This toilet is not marked on the wall and may be difficult to see from a distance. The sliding door leads directly into toilet. Movable bench seating may obstruct this doorway. There is no rail behind the toilet, only one thick rail to the side and high up. During the EASE visit there was no toilet paper holder.

Phone

One red phone in the foyer. Too high for wheelchair users.

Both Theatres are fitted with audio loops. These are not, however, permanently connected. If you wish to use the loop system you would need to contact the Theatre twenty-four hours beforehand. Ring 267 2477.

Helpful Hints

- 1. St. Martins Lane is one way. When searching for a parking spot try the gravel car park behind the theatre.
- 2. Because of the twelve steps into the main auditorium people requiring assistance should ring 267 2551. Once these steps have been negotiated, however, the view from Row H is excellent.

HOW TO BOOK WITH EASE

To book tickets with EASE, ring 699 8497, discuss with Barbara or Chris what you would like to see and where you would like to sit. Make out a cheque to Arts Access for the appropriate amount and post it to Arts Access, 109-111 Sturt Street South Melbourne 3205. We will either hold the tickets for you, post them or arrange for them to be at the box office-whichever you prefer. It does help us if you can provide a stamped, self-addressed envelope.

EASE Ticket Prices Explained

EASE has received numerous enquiries about the price of tickets available through the service. EASE negotiates with Promoters and Entrepreneurs for access to tickets at a reduced rate. The scheme may purchase tickets directly from the promoters or a ticketing agency. The price on the ticket, therefore, need not correspond to the price paid by EASE or the price quoted by us. Some promoters, for example, wish to distribute tickets directly to us using "house seats." These tickets have no price on them, yet the promoter will charge EASE. EASE places a commission on its tickets in order to support the service. Our commission is no longer a fixed rate but varies depending on the arrangement reached with the promoter. Prices quoted over the phone take all these factors into account. If you would like to know more please don't besitate to give us a call.
