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


Arts Project Australia began in 1974 as an arts-based advocacy group for people with intellectual disabilities. A major reason for the formation of the 'Art Project' (as it was then known) was the insight on the part of its members that many people who have an intellectual disability displayed aptitude and talent in the visual arts, and that the flexible conventions of these art forms could provide access to a variety of means of expression and communication, even when more common forms, particularly linguistic, were difficult for them to utilise.

Broadly, the aims of the Association are:

- To provide the means by which people with an intellectual disability can participate fully in the visual arts;
- To promote the work of people with an intellectual disability as integral to the broad spectrum of contemporary art practice;
- To facilitate participation by people with an intellectual disability in appropriate mainstream programs and courses, and to encourage meaningful artistic exchange between disabled and non-disabled artists;
- To broaden understanding and awareness of art by people with intellectual disabilities among artists and the general public;
- · To advocate art as a valid vocational or recreational option;

- To support and provide high quality community based education and training in the visual arts;
- In addition to the above points, the Studio Workshop Program specifically aims to provide educational experiences which will:
- Develop the artistic skills and awareness of people with an intellectual disability so that they may more fully utilise art as a vocational or recreational option;
- Focus on personal development, particularly in the areas
  of self-confidence and self-esteem which will enhance the
  individual's ability to function in other aspects of their lives;
- Encourage the development of personal symbols and expressions so that art may be used as an alternative means of communication.

There is certainly a very rich pool of talented and dedicated artists who have been attending the studio now for many years, as well as a number of new participants who have taken eagerly to the opportunities for artistic involvement which Arts Project offers.

Another major project for this year was Arts Project Australia's participation in an exhibition of Outsider Art in Belgium. Arts Project Australia was the only organisation outside of the EEC which was invited to contribute work to this important show,

which featured work from leading European outsider art museums and organisations.

Works by Arts Project artists were also featured on a series of publications produced by the Department of Human Services and at a fund-raising event for the North Melbourne Football Club where they attracted a good deal of interest with some being auctioned to enthusiastic buyers.

A great focus for the past twelve months has been to further our quest to obtain our own premises, and some important ground work has been laid. We look forward to the day when the clients and staff are able to enjoy proper facilities and enough space to allow for all our activities to be conducted in the one location.

We were very sorry to say farewell to Judy Anderson who has been our Administrator for the past six years. # Studio Workshop program

With over two hundred individuals per week attending the studio it certainly is a hive of activity. The artsworkers are to be congratulated for the excellent job they do in developing and providing individual programs for clients, in ensuring that works are carefully stored, materials are supplied and that the ever-encroaching chaos is kept at bay.

This year, to improve the smooth-running of the studio, some specific positions of responsibility were created and these have contributed tremendously in improving communication between management, staff, volunteers and Committee Members. Thanks to Megan McEvoy, Mandy Laming and Luciano Giardino who oversaw the successful introduction of the new system.

The creation of a new system for storing works on canvas has also been successfully introduced and will hopefully provide an adequate solution to some of our more pressing storage problems whilst we continue to search for larger and more suitable premises.

#### Animation

Funding from ACFE (Adult, Community and Further Education) has enabled the highly successful animation and literacy program to continue. Clients have produced some extraordinarily creative ideas for their films and accompanying narratives. This program highlights the links between different forms of expression and communication, and provides participants with a multi-dimensional approach to learning and artistic endeavour. The video "Short Cuts" produced early in this program continues to receive enthusiastic responses from audiences both here and overseas. Artsworker Tina Douglas, who initiated the program, presented the video at a recent National Arts and Disability Conference in Melbourne, and we look forward to the launch of the next series of short films.

#### Woodwork

Luciano Giardina has instigated a very popular woodworking project in the studio whereby clients are able to transfer their images and ideas onto large, freestanding forms. Terry Williams and John Northe have particularly embraced the opportunity to work on a large scale.

#### Artists' Books

Many beautiful small-scale artists' books have been produced in the studio. Often delicate and poignant, these books provide a different stimulus where artists can create intimate and private worlds. Thanks to Mandy Laming for encouraging the development of this medium.

#### Australian Print Workshop

Funding from the CCDU of the Australia Council enabled our long term association with the Australian Print Workshop in .

Fitzroy to take on a more formalised dimension. Six to eight participants per week, accompanied by artsworker Kitty Ginter, were able to work with artist and printmaker Ros Atkins to produce a range of etchings, lithographs and linocuts. Ros then printed these and selected particular images for editioning. The quality of work produced was outstanding and we would like to thank both Ros and Anne Virgo, the Director, for their enthusiastic support of Arts Project and its artists. An exhibition of some of the prints produced is scheduled for March 2000.

#### RMIT

The participation in tertiary art classes at RMiT by two Arts Project Australia artists continues to reap great rewards, both in terms of their integration into a mainstream learning environment and their artistic development. This year's classes were conducted at RMIT's City campus under the tutelage of Irene Barberis. We are grateful to Jim Taylor for his continued support and to Professor Bill Gregory who retired at end of 1997, who has been an enthusiastic supporter of advanced training opportunities for people with an intellectual disability. Thanks also to Luciano Giradina who has managed this program so capably over a number of years.

#### Statewide Forensic

The weekly program with clients of the Intensive Residential Treatment Centre at Kingsbury for offenders with an intellectual disability continued until December 1999 when the clients were transferred to other facilities. A highlight of the program was an exhibition of their work which was held at the Arts Project Australia Gallery in May 1999. Clients, staff and families were able to come and view this show which was curated by artsworker, Tina Douglas. The success of the program at Kingsbury was due in no small part to the particular skills which Tina was able to bring to the situation, and we thank her for her efforts in bringing art as a meaningful activity into the lives of the clients.

#### Ceramics

The chronic shortage of space at Northcote has meant that ceramics sessions have been held off-site for the past few years. From June this year the program has been held at Northcote Preston ATSS which is much closer to Arts Project than Churinga Pottery, our former venue. We are grateful to Jennifer White, Director of NPATSS for her generosity in allowing us to use their space, and to Jackie Penna from Churinga Pottery for the support she has shown Arts Project over the years. Clients have enjoyed the opportunity to explore a three-dimensional medium and have produced a variety of works ranging from the figurative to the abstract and the functional. Thanks to Nira Shani and Tegrin for their commitment to providing clay as an artistic form for clients.

# Exhibitions

#### 'A' Show/more 'A' show

The VicHealth Access Gallery of the National Gallery of Victoria was the venue for this year's 'A' Show, a highly successful partnership between the Down Syndrome Association of Victoria and Art Project Australia, which is now in its seventh year. Ms. Lorraine Elliott, MLA, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for the Arts opened the show and spoke very well about the artists and their work. Around 300 guests shared the excitement of the opening night alongside the fifty or so participating artists. The show received coverage on the ABC's Snapshot program and the visitor's book recorded hundreds of positive comments about the work. Many thanks to the DSAV, and especially Jane Ware and Ros Allen for the excellent job they do in making this such a wonderful annual event.


### Profile - 25th Anniversary exhibition at Manningham City Gallery

Works from the studio and the Sidney Myer Fund Permanent Collection, as well as a range of ceramic pieces featured in this exhibition at the Manningham City Gallery in Doncaster. We were very pleased to have this opportunity to focus on APA's 25 year history and to display a range of the wonderful works which have been produced over this time by artists with an intellectual disability. The show was opened by the Mayor, Councillor Lionel D. Allemand, and Dr. Cheryl Daye, Director of APA was guest speaker on the opening night. Artsworker and co-founder of APA, Kitty Ginter, gave a separate floor talk at a later date about the history of the project and some of the artists who have made it such a success.

#### Pinacotheca

Bruce Pollard, the Director of Pinacotheca selected works by Valerio Ciccone, Alan Constable, Jimmy Fuller and Chris Mason for APA's final show at this notable venue. Sadly, Bruce Pollard will be closing the gallery at the end of 1999 after thirty-three years as one of Australia's leading commercial galleries. Bruce's uncompromising appreciation of the work of the artists he









showed and his informal yet generous support of APA are gratefully acknowledged.

#### Connected - Geelong Art Gallery

A collaborative show involving APA and Art Unlimited from Geelong was held at the Max Bell Access Gallery of the Geelong Art Gallery. Some thirty-five works from both of these agencies were displayed and many artists and their families attended the opening. We were delighted to be able to work on this event with Art Unlimited and many thanks to Jane Cowan for instigating the project and to Lydia Hill for taking over the final organisation when Jane went on maternity leave.

A Singular Perspective - Salmon Galleries, Sydney Artist Stelio Costa had a solo exhibition in August at Salmon Galleries in Sydney. This show was opened by Sydney artist Karen Atkins who spoke of the importance of art as a means of communication, and of the importance of galleries which are courageous to enough to show the work of new and emerging artists. Many thanks to Judith Salmon for her assistance in bringing Stelio's work to a wider audience.

#### Australian Galleries - Works on Paper Gallery, Sydney & Melbourne

Forty seven works by six artists were shown at Australian Galleries Works on Paper Gallery in Sydney. This show provided a wonderful opportunity for APA to expose some of our artists in Sydney. We were pleased that one third of the works were sold as this was the first time APA has shown in Sydney and the artists are not as well known as in Melbourne.

A separate exhibition of works from Arts Project was held later in the year at Australian Galleries Works on Paper Gallery in Melbourne. Artists Stelio Costa and Fulli Andrinopoulos made an outstanding debut at this venue.

#### Monash University Gallery

Valerio Ciccone, Alan Constable, Kelvin Heffernan, Julian Martin, John Northe, Cathy Staughton and Terry Williams had works displayed at the Monash University Gallery, alongside works from Nadrasca, Art Adventures, Blue Moon, Monkami and Arts Action as part of the university's Disability Awareness Week in May.


#### Bright Reactions - Motorworks Gallery




artist Alan Constable Right: artist Julian Martin

A major exhibition of Outsider art and art by people with an intellectual disability was held in Liege, Belgium. Arts Project Australia was invited to submit work along with the Collection de l'art Brut (Switzerland), the Musee de la Creation (France), Museum de Stadshof (Netherlands), Haus der Kunstler (Austria) and the Musee de l'art Differencie (Belgium). Fifteen artists from APA participated, showing on average five works each. A beautiful catalogue was produced, containing reproductions of work as well as essays and interviews from each of the organisations involved which provided a wide range of approaches and insights into aspects of the work.

#### Ethos on-line gallery

Artists from Arts Project Australia are represented on-line by Ethos on-line gallery. The works have been received very well with some being sold via on-line auction to buyers from as far afield as New York.

#### Northcote Uniting Church

A display of works was held at the Northcote Uniting Church which provided an opportunity for some of our artists to show their work in another venue in the local community.

#### Charlie Brown

#### Kaleidoscope



#### Scott Nye




#### Arts Project Australia - Small Gallery
