A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

At the start of each year we decide on a slogan to communicate the essence of our program for that year. Rather than an overt message it is more of a philosophical message ie a core motivator for our work. In 2012 InCite's slogan was: Changing Perspectives. This was fundamentally about InCite's relocation the Alice Springs Youth Hub and how this might change our and the community's perspectives of InCite. It was also equally about our stronger focus on arts and disability practice through our partnership with Arts Access Central Australia (AACA) and how this work changes the perspectives of the community and the participants.

There were also a significant number of unplanned activities in 2012, so we were, by necessity, constantly 'changing perspectives'.

So as we 'wrap up' the year it is good to look back to see what we really did achieve in relation to the chosen slogan.

We entered 2012 with great expectations of the potential of our relocation to the Alice Springs Youth Hub to provide new links with the youth sector. Foundations were laid that have potential to grow and blossom to maturity in 2013 and beyond.

Inspired by the work we achieved in 2011 in the area of arts and disability practice, we had big dreams for 2012 to produce another show. We had all the passion and commitment of artists, participants and the community but not the dollars to support this dream. We did however progress the work and build strong foundations for fruition in 2013 with the creation of an ensemble of emerging artists with disability and artists/mentors. We constantly work to find ways to secure the financial support needed to realise the community vision of this work.

Unexpectedly we had a new opportunity to develop local arts and disability practice with the hosting of Irish artist, Tara Brandel. This 'win-win' situation allowed Tara to live and work in the desert outback of Australia to develop a new work and we had professional development opportunities rarely afforded to us, with access to an international artist of calibre.

We also had opportunities unlooked for to showcase InCite and AACA's work beyond our local community through presentations at conferences and festivals, both nationally and internationally.

Also unanticipated was a visit from the new Arts Access Australia's CEO, Emma Bennison. InCite hosted Ms Bennison in Alice Springs to further concepts of inclusive practice in the arts sector within the NT. Credit also goes to Arts Access Darwin (AAD) who, with the support of Darwin Community Arts, worked closely with us to advance inclusive arts practice and recognise the incredible work that is already going on in the sector through the NT Arts Access Awards.

I would like to take the opportunity to make mention of AAD's outgoing Project Officer, Penny Campton, whose vision and direct contribution to the development of arts and disability in the NT has been truly inspiring and has positively impacted on so many individual's lives as well as reaching right across the nation.

Another very special and unplanned evolution was that of SPRUNG Youth Dance. This was not possible without Artistic Director Miriam Nicholls and the partnership with Dusty Feet Dance Collective; we are honoured to be invited to collaborate. We have great hopes for what SPRUNG and young committed dancers will achieve as well as the growth of youth culture through dance, both locally and in the national context. SPRUNG is the first and only youth dance company based in the NT.

I would like to take a moment to reflect on the unpredictable and ephemeral nature of our world which was highlighted with the passing of a number of valued individuals connected to InCite and the families and communities with whom we work. We are saddened by their passing.

Possibly the most unexpected project was being asked to tender and wining the opportunity to do the NARIS music video project. This took InCite's delivery of work, for the first time, out of the NT. (Read more about this and other projects throughout the report.)

The 2012 focus of Red Sand Culture was music, resulting in the successful creation of songs that link more strongly with Warlpiri culture and sharing of that music and talents of young Warlpiri musicians at the Alice Desert Festival.

The Southern Ngalia Dance camps were unable to go ahead as planned. We were, however, able to share the success stories of the work from 2010 and 2011 through inclusion in national conferences.

Importantly InCite's responsive model of practice and our adaptability, along with Virginia and I in our dual leadership roles, continued to successfully counterbalance the vicissitudes we faced.

Along with so much unplanned work in 2012 we also said goodbye to, or did not have access to some of our artists; invited new members into the team and worked with those with whom we have long established trust relationships. Thanks goes to Miriam Pickard, now living and studying overseas. Miriam, as well as being a part of our arts and disability team, set a very high benchmark with her exceptional contribution to the visual presentation of our organisation through video edits and documentation.

Thanks to Dan and Ash for their passion, diligence and commitment to young people in the Congress Music workshops and the Ntaria students.

Thanks to Melissa, James and Matt for coming on-board and embracing new work practices as part of our arts and disability team.

Thank you to 'monkeymarc' and 'elftranzporter' guest music artists/ mentors, who took on the mammoth 5 state journey for the NARIS Music Video project and took Red Sand Culture participants to new levels of engagement.

Thank you to Enid Nangala Gallagher who is the visionary and the vital link in the Southern Ngalia three way partnership between Warlpiri women, Mt Theo and InCite.

Thanks to Stephanie Harrison who wove her 'music magic' across a number of 2012 projects as well as applied her music industry knowledge and experience to the Red Sand Cutlure project.

Thanks and credit to Jordan VanderSchuit whose artistic and energetic drive to support the young SPRUNG dancers enabled them to achieve beyond their expectations.

Thank you to the InCite Board whose support to both Virginia and I and the principles of all InCite's work are vital to make it all possible. And crucially, invaluable strategic thinking set in motion plans for new perspectives on the future of InCite and AACA, with a view to positioning InCite for multi-year arts and non-arts funding.

So inevitably, as in previous years, again in 2012 our slogan revealed both its prophetic nature and our capacity to dream our future into being. We shall dream on!

'Youth Culture'

We had the opportunity to extend this project beyond 2011 and into 2012 with dance related activities. This resulted in the formation of SPRUNG Youth Dance. The birth of the new group possible under the artistic direction of Miriam Nicholls (nee Bond) and with the expert guidance of Miriam and dancer/choreographer Jordan VanderSchuit. The group then independently travelled and presented a performance of a short work at the Australian Youth Dance Festival in Gosford NSW, in April.

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'SPRUNG' Youth Dance

SPRUNG Youth Dance began as an initiative of InCite Youth Arts, Dusty Feet Dance Collective and Artistic Director Miriam Nicholls and was supported by JUMP, the Australia Council's National Mentoring Program.

The initiative of SPRUNG takes InCite's investment in growing the culture of dance to a new level. To date InCite has dedicated over a decade to growing the culture of youth dance in Alice Springs and the region. InCite has fostered the development of grassroots programs through partnerships with schools and youth sector organisations to provide inclusive opportunities that engage children and young people in dance activities. As a result there is a great value and recognition in the community to have dance activities that are open to all and cater for all levels of experience. Holiday programs, dance classes at school or after school have flourished.

Dusty Feet Dance Collective formed in 2009 as a collective of dance artists living in Alice Springs who came together to share their passion and develop new skills and audiences. The aim is to support dance artists from Central Australia by providing regular training and performance opportunities, both locally and interstate, and encourage the development of new choreographic work. Dusty Feet offers regular community dance classes for children and adults, and from this outreach the concept for SPRUNG was formed; to enrich and inspire the ongoing development of dance and dancers from this place.

SPRUNG is based on the belief that young people are artists in their own right, with the potential to express and communicate complex ideas and issues through the body in the form of dance. The aim of the company is to extend beyond dance training, into the development of creative and collaborative work. SPRUNG forms part of a national network of youth dance companies.

SPRUNG developed a work titled Graffiti – Make Your Mark, for performance at the Alice Desert Festival. The work looked at themes of identity and place, through the idea of graffiti and language. With choreographers Miriam Bond, Jordan VanderSchuit, Melissa Kerl, James Loveday and Hayley Michener, the dancers explored how they each came to this place and what it means for them to live here.

SPRUNG also had the opportunity to work with Melbourne based '2nd Toe Dance Collective' and create a short work: 'Maps' as part of the Collective's Artist In Residence Program and presentation of 'Alice Can Dance' at the Araluen Arts Centre.

We plan to continue investing in this unique Northern Territory regional youth dance initiative beyond 2012.

'Red Sand Culture' Music & Dance Mentoring

Red Sand Culture continued to provide a tailored, intensive skilled environment for young Warlpiri people to engage in positive creative activity. The 2012 focus was on music. The artists/mentors possessed skills and the commitment to interact with the Warlpiri youth in dynamic and successful ways. These workshops were able to take place based on the significant trust relationships which have been established.

In September 2012, with close guidance and mentoring, three young Jaru Pirrjirdi (Youth Leaders) members from Yuendumu travelled into Alice Springs to perform as part at the Alice Desert Festival. 2012 also focussed on music skills training including recording, production and engineering.

A new link was established with the creation of a music video for the song 'Unified' by Tyrone Spencer aka T-Bone. A hip hop track about Warlpiri culture staying strong in Yuendumu, the music video was produced by PAW Media in collaboration with WYDAC's Jaru Pirjirdi, WETT Youth and Media training.

Mt Theo, in addition to the project, contracted InCite to work with Tracks Dance to support the creation of an original sound track for their production of Milpirri 2012 with the community of Lajamanu.

The RSC performance bore convincing testimony, despite having to face a number of challenges along the way, to a 'milestone moment' for the young participants, Tyrone, Leon and Rene, all moved beyond their own fears and shame-thresholds and managed to perform so confidently on stage. The coming together of all of us as one team, in the final hour was a defining moment of success.

(Nyirripi) Nurtured and developed from many past discussions and evaluations over the years, the focus brief made for a much stronger more in-depth delve into what the production process involved

(Willowra) Support from InCite Youth Arts on both sides of our journey created a team spirit attitude that offered itself to us as guest artists on a guided mission to achieving the best outcomes possible for the project.

(Lajamanu) The professionalism and hospitality offered to us by the Mt Theo staff supported another successful element of this journey, revealed itself with the amount of participants we had overall whose interest and engagement seemed to grow each day, learning as much as they could about recording and producing on Garage Band and Logic Pro and hopefully, absorbing and retaining the data needed on how to create a solid track from start to finish.

Hi guys, Milpirri went off with a bang... We got many great comments about the tracks and it was great to have the chance to work with you. I hope this can happen again.

Marc Peckham (aka 'monkeymarc'), Music Artist/Mentor

(Yuendumu) There where some major family issues arising and due to these things we workshopped some ideas. The process led to a song called "Trouble" which was a very powerful statement from the youth of Yuendumu. This song was really taken on board by the older guys and girls who really took ownership of it. They were very proud of this song. I believe songs like this can have a powerful impact on the community, especially when sung by the youth.

(Nyirripi) The lessons on Garage Band work well as well as more advanced lessons in Logic Pro. We worked closely with Bachelor Institute and were welcomed in to make use of their Mac computers. The "Desert Mulga Band" took well to this and showed great interest in Logic as potentially they would be able to record their band in the future.



Good news stories

The most self-assured and positive feedback came back to us on the day of the performance with a number of audience members saying how much they got from the performance. Tyrone's mood after his confident performance was perhaps the greatest feedback of all that I received personally, as he proclaimed, "Elf, thank you so much for helping me do this...dancing and rapping on stage is the only thing I've ever wanted to do... It's all I've ever wanted to do, my entire life!"

(Nyirripi) Lance Turner spoke of how he's already been to Kintore teaching the community using of the recording methods he learned from us on previous visits and later said to me weeks after we left, "Thank you two for teaching us many techniques... It's been an honour to learn from you guys!" When I (monkeymarc) told Lance Turner that we would see him next time when we would be back in Nyirripi. He looked at me and said "No! I won't be here! I will out on the road recording now that I know how to use Logic."

(Lajamanu) Zedick could potentially become a sound engineer to record bands in the future. He said that "I am so glad you and Elf came back.... When are you coming back again? We need more of these types of workshops".



'Southern Ngalia' Cultural Dance

In 2012 the Southern Ngalia program of activities was not undertaken. This was largely due to significant community unrest in Yuendumu and staff changes at the Mt Theo Program. Plans continued to reinstate the project in 2013.

In 2010 the strong relationship between Mt Theo and InCite initiated a second program. Lead by senior women off the Yuendumu

Warlpiri community, the Southern Ngalia Women's Dance Camp project provides genuine opportunities for intergenerational cultural transference. These dance camps provide a unique opportunity for creative meaningful and challenging experiences exploring Women's dance, culture and it's transmission to the next generation of young Warlpiri girls. InCite's involvement here is crucial with their focus on the arts and community cultural development. 2011 saw this three way partnership grow from strength to strength with performance outcomes as part of Dance Site in Tennant Creek in September.

We are excited about developing the potential of both projects and the ongoing positive contribution the arts makes to our work in youth diversion and development.

Arts & Disability Performing Arts

Two stages of creative development were undertaken in 2012. They were highly successful processes, being truly creative research and development of themes and ideas and making decisions on the direction of the new work without pressure of public outcomes or performance. Over 90% participation rate.

In Stage 1, Guest Mentor Kat Worth worked with the team of local artists and ensemble of community performers with disability to collaborate on developing the theme of 'home' which evolved into exploration about 'family' and then 'identity, freedom and individuality' as the main thematic ideas expressed by and relevant to the participant group. This was strongly driven by the participants and laid foundation for a body of material to be further developed and taken to production outcomes in 2013.



The ensemble and local artists also had access over 4 week period in October/November to visiting international dance mentor, Tara Brandel, courtesy of Arts Access Central Australia, for both professional development and learning of new dance skills.

Stage 2 involved the local team with the standard of creative work, focus, composition and performance skills demonstrated by individual participants with disability evidencing the development of а maturity in artistic practice with clear understanding of 'making new work' together and a strong ensemble approach. In particular the level of self-initiated offers and creative ideas presented in tasks demonstrated growth in confidence and awareness of art making process and new skills.

I think Kat is an amazing facilitator and mentor and it was an honour to work with her. She completely gave us space to try ideas, help to develop them with valuable suggestions and opinions and real honest feedback delivered with such humility even when the feedback was on things we need to improve on.

Stephanie's music is brilliant! The atmosphere and the creative outcomes of our tasks dramatically changed when Steph was playing verses the pre-recorded times. It was diverse, funny and atmospheric. It also worked well to see how interested everyone was at playing music and recording voices. I think this may be a really important part of the future show.

Kat Worth, Guest Artist/Mentor & Director

I was really impressed with the standard of creative work, focus, composition and performance skills. Individuals demonstrated a maturity of artistic practice developed since 'Close to Me'. There was a clear understanding of 'making new work' together and a strong collected ensemble approach. In particular, the level of self- initiated offers and creative ideas presented in tasks demonstrated a growth in confidence and awareness of the art making process.

It was great to have the team/ensemble on the floor for the whole time. Group worked collaboratively in planning and delivery and each member had opportunities to lead and to participate.

Each artist was highly tuned into the group and aware of each participant's strengths and weaknesses and how to best support individuals within the group.

Steph Harrison, Music Artist/Mentor

In the workshops we played around with visual stimuli and I found this a great way to explore storytelling and imagery, and how to represent this musically. I am interested to see how the music and dance elements of the show next year can evolve symbiotically.

I feel that the ensemble of performers will have such great responses if they were dancing to music they create.

Miriam Nicholls, Dance Artist/Mentor

Having the focus not on an outcome but on the creative process was really valuable, as it allowed for a "no-pressure" creative space, where I felt encouraged to try out ideas. We were really working as a company: I felt like one artist in a group of many artists, all contributing to the same idea.

Good news stories

One of the carers said at the end of one session that she felt we were teaching her new strategies and ideas for managing and responding to clients, which she was very interested in and really appreciated.

Generally there was a feeling of welcome and well-being in the group, with people such as Martin and Tiffany being very sad when the week was over.

Everyone was so happy and motivated for the sessions, walking in the door saying "Good Morning – Lets Dance!"

National Alliance of Remote Indigenous Schools (NARIS) Music Video

InCite won the tender to work with the National Alliance of Remote Indigenous Schools (NARIS), managed through NT Department of Education and Training, to provide artists to five remote Indigenous communities and produce a music video promoting teaching as a career.

NARIS is a group of more than 170 schools in remote Indigenous communities across the Northern Territory, Western Australia, Queensland, South Australia and New South Wales. It aims to attract, retain and develop exceptional teachers and leaders in these schools. It is managed by the education departments of these states/territories, with overarching support from the Australian Government and Stronger Smarter Institute.

InCite nationally renowned hip hop artists, Marc Peckham (aka 'monkeymarc') and Marlon Porter (aka 'elftranzporter'), both familiar with working in remote communities, travelled to collaborate with students from Indigenous school in the NARIS network: Alparra NT, Mimili SA, Yarabah State School Qld, Wilcannia Central NSW and Nullagine in WA. The artists conducted music video activities with Year 9 - 12 students to develop and produce a web quality music video promoting teaching as a career choice for local students.

The completed production comprised a seamless composition of key elements from each school group's work and is available to the target audience via the web.

Marlon Porter (aka elftranzporter), Artist/Mentor

Well, the week Monkey Marc and I just spent in Mimili, was just as inspiring as we could have ever dreamt up! Monkey's currently, working on the video edits now as I type this. So far, we have encountered a rapping skeleton and a group of mad scientists in Alparra, as well as alien B-boy break dance battle atop the stunningly beautiful red rocks that surround Mimili!

So, here we are in the middle of the NARIS five school video and song project, conducting our third set of recordings with the sharp and learned students in sub-tropical Yarrabah, QLD. The great flow from the first two locations, kept up its high standard for exciting contributions and footage in Yarrabah starting with 12 bars of the girls rapping a verse in English all about learning and teaching. After that, some multi- talented, poly-linguistic fellas came in and laid down a great bridge using the word 'teacher' as an acronym along with some words in Yindiny, translating the chorus. The class we were in happen to have a 'green-screen' for superimposing different backgrounds, so be prepared for some students and teachers flying through the sky like super heroes... Just because we could and because, as Steve Jampijimpa Patrick from Lajamanu once said to us, "Humans were meant to soar!"

Mimili Feedback

I think it's pretty good for the intended purpose, but see that it could be used to discuss many concepts besides – ie using contemporary and global pop culture, music, dance and media to engage students.

Thanks for sharing this with us. It is great to see Louka engaging students. He is a great ambassador for the teaching profession and inspiration for his students – possibly a role model for young Indigenous people contemplating following in his footsteps.

No doubt producing this video had impact on engaging the kids involved in its production. I agree that it may have many spin off uses. It is also a very authentic project for these students to have been involved in.



Congress Music

Music workshops with Congress Youth Services Program in 2012 grew from the 2010–11 Youth Culture Project. Local musicians Daniel McAleer & Ashley McDonell with the dedicated support of the Congress Afterhours Team worked with young people attending the weekly Saturday night activities at Albrecht Oval/ Congress Drop In Centre and then linking in with Congress basketball nights to create lots of new beats and lyrical inventiveness with five songs going to completion.

Now in the third year of collaborating with the school at Santa Teresa and with the continued support and vision of the Principal, Greg Crowe and his staff and families, the students were able to work with Dance Artists, Miriam Nicholls and Melissa Kerl over two terms with performance presentations both in the community and again in Alice Springs at the Eisteddfod. At the school's request music was introduced with the talented artist Stephanie Harrison working her magic with singing workshops, taking steps towards realising the vision of a school choir.

This highly successful model of sustained workshop delivery, with the dedicated support of the school community, has great potential for benefits for the children of Santa Teresa as well as other remote school communities.

The school were very welcoming. There was excellent organisation and communication amongst the staff.

Keep the dance program going at Santa Teresa! I have noticed such a difference since I first went there several years ago, to now running workshops after Melissa Kerl has been there regularly. There is a stronger understanding of what a dance class is, what is expected and what the outcomes can be.

Thank you for this opportunity – I have really enjoyed it! Santa Teresa is a lovely community with friendly people and happy kids, and I've particularly valued getting to know some of the Indigenous staff members. They really care about their kids' education.

Melissa Kerl, Dance Artist/Mentor

The ongoing relationship that I have developed with the school and the students is the biggest winner with this project. Lots of learning about personalities, group dynamics and trust.

I believe the school values the experience of participation in Alice Springs events and can continue to include this in their calendar of events, with or without InCite, thereby adding to Central Australian Youth access to performance experiences. The teachers all responded well to the program acknowledging how they were always learning different things about the students by observing their engage in movement based activities.



Music, Acacia Hill School

This program of music accessed new and relevant music forms, including new digital technologies, for young people with disability, allowing skills development and the unleashing of creative potential as yet unrealised. This program started the journey to create a musical dialogue with Artist Stephanie Harrison expanding on the work explored in the 2011 'Close to Me' project when the voice group created a truly amazing and powerful example of how this kind of collaboration can work. As music mentor and running percussion/ voice workshops with the students, Stephanie inviting them to be music performers too and also joined with Sophia Williams, in her capacity of Arts Teacher, to develop a complimentary sound-scapes' to the visual landscape Sophia created with the students.This project will continue in 2013.

Keep the creativity going and it is great to hear that such strong connections are happening Internationally with NT and InCite's 'Close To Me'.

Stephanie Harrison, Music Artist/Mentor

This term has been fabulous with regards to developing a relationship with the school and getting to know each class, the students and the teachers. With each group I explored different musical qualities, themes and feelings. As an artist, this process has been a great way to reflect on my own practice and my ability to engage students with special needs. We did a lot of improvising and exploring our own
voices. I used the loop pedal a lot which is a great tool. It is also a fantastic way to engage with students who have a very limited range of movement. Other skills developed include 'conducting' and mimicking each other's vocal sounds. I also recorded some students singing and made little songs in one-on-one sessions, as well as recording different vocal sounds which I would like to use to create a vocal symphony/soundscape.





Arts Program, Ntaria School Hermannsburg

InCite was approached by STEPS to link in with their program with Ntaria school to augment the leadership program with arts activities. Starting with some dynamic dance workshop with Sila Crosley in Alice Springs followed by fabric printing with Philomena Hali, the art program was then followed up by an invitation from the school for musicians Daniel McAleer & Ashley McDonell to work with the student in Hermannsburg to create an original hip-hop song 'Kuprilya Races - Kuprilya Waters' which was then taken by the school to music video production.

ARTS ACCESS CENTRAL AUSTRALIA (AACA)

A lot of very productive work made possible by the increased support from Arts NT in 2012.

While we were not successful in recruiting a CEO for AACA, we had some very high calibre interest from across the sector nationally with six expressions of interest. None were local and five were from beyond the NT. We found that the skills set of the individual applicants were either not suitable for the role or not possible for AACA to manage remotely and the cost of bringing a candidate to Alice was prohibitive.

AACA, AAA and Arts Access Darwin had a strategic development meeting with ArtsNT in September to discuss potential collaborations to develop arts and disability practice in the NT and request assistance with cross sector lobbying for support. AAA sent a letter to Chief Minister, Arts Minister and Arts NT regarding AACA and AAD's plan to request for increase in support for 2013 and thereafter. AACA partnered with InCite for the Arts & Disability Performance project, creative development, stage 1 & 2 (July and Oct-Nov) of a new performance work for 2013. For more details, please see Project section of this report.

In October/November, AACA hosted a four week visit by International Artist Tara Brandel, Artistic Director, Croi Glan Integrated Dance Company, Cork, Ireland.

- Worked collaboratively with the artists/mentors and ensemble of performers with disability on creative material as part of the development of a new work.
- Gave a sector presentation on 8 November about her work with 'Croi Glan' (Clear Heart) and Integrated Dance practice. She also shared a brief look at her solo work in progress, which she had been working on during her time in Alice and talked about the artists with disability directing the solo and composing the music. This event was co-hosted by ArtNT.
