VENUE NOTES THE NATIONAL GALLERY OF VICTORIA 180 St. Kilda Road

Admission Fees: Adults \$1.20 ea; children 60cents ea; family groups (i.e. 1 adult and up to 6 children, or 2 adults and up to 5 children) \$2.40 per group. Season tickets: yearly \$10; half yearly \$5. Pensioners and the unemployed can gain free entry to the Gallery on the presentation of either a Social Security card, a T.P.I. badge, a Ministry of Transport Concession card, or a Medical Benefits card.

Opening Times: Tuesday to Sunday, 10am to 5pm

Closed Mondays except on public holidays, and also closed Anzac Day, Good Friday and Christmas Day. **Free Guided Tours:** From the Visitors Desk in the St. Kilda Road Foyer, Tuesday to Friday 11 am, 12,1,2,3pm; Weekends 2pm and 3pm.

Parking

Street Parking close to the Gallery is limited. St. Kilda Road, on the Gallery side, is reserved for buses. Entrance to the car park is from Sturt Street opposite Kavanagh Street, fees apply. For information on parking ring 614 2987. Mini-buses with air-conditioning units or raised tops cannot park in the Car Park. Be prepared for a long walk and steps. **Accessible Parking**

- 1. Two places on the Gallery side St. Kilda Road Service Lane, close to the Arts Centre.
- 2. With prior arrangement it is possible to park on the Gallery Forecourt ring Neil Kirkwood on 618 0350 to check before leaving home.
- 3. Several places in the underground car park, entrance off Sturt Street, opposite Kavanagh Street. Use left lane to upper level. Parking fees apply. Ring 614 2987 for information. There is no lift from the car park to the Gallery. Use the Arts Centre Lifts from Smorgon Family Plaza to St. Kilda Road level and enter the Gallery via Murdoch Court Entrance, in the building's north face.

Entrances

1. St. Kilda Road Entrance. Ticket Office is high. Turn left at the glass windows (water down the front). Security *continued over*



The National Gallery of Victoria

The National Gallery of Victoria was founded in 1861 and is Australia's oldest public gallery. The State collection transferred into the present building in 1968.

Movement throughout the building is not broken by steps or split levels. The lack of obstructions and freedom of movement, with features such as the Great Hall ceiling and water cascading down the St. Kilda Road Foyer windows, give the Gallery a sense of light and relaxation.

The Gallery regularly re-arranges or rotates its permanent collections and plays host to a wide range of temporary exhibitions. But beyond visual arts displays the Gallery offers a variety of entertainment, lectures, and education and resource services. Below is a list of just some of the services, entertainment and temporary exhibitions currently on offer:

PROM CONCERT PROGRAMME

Every Sunday at 2.30pm unless otherwise advertised (no concert 15 October). The only cost is the cost into the Gallery. Ring 618 0203 or 618 0356 for confirmation. Sample programmes: 8 October Sarah Grunstein—Piano; 5 November Judy Jacques Trio—Jązz; 12 November 3rd District Military Band.

2. Murdoch Court Entrance. Path sloped down to doorway. Ticket office high. Hinged door beside rotating door. Wheelchair users may require assistance. But, as with the St. Kilda Road entrance, security personnel will be there to assist.

Exhibition Areas

All exhibition spaces on all floors are level without steps. The building, however, is large and there is a lot to see. Be prepared for a long walk. Floor coverings change from area to area. Carpets are heavy duty, not piled, and the hard surfaces are tiled. Most artwork is at approximately eye level for people standing. Exhibits in glass cases tend to be a little high for wheelchair users. Labels are not large, but are clearly printed, black on white and those labels in glass cases, especially the Herbert Wade Kent Gallery (Chinese Art) are often lying flat and therefore wheelchair users may find them difficult to read. Seats throughout the Exhibition Areas are low, but comfortable. People who have difficulty rising from low seats, and who require rests at intervals, may be advised to plan a visit to the Cafeteria. Another option is the portable stools. See Helpful Hints.

Stairs

All stairs are in dark stone, without markings for the visually impaired. They are dimly lit. Stairs in the northern side of the St. Kilda Road Foyer form a spiral about the lift well.

Escalators

Escalators operate from the St. Kilda Road Foyer. They are narrow, with only enough room for one and they are fast moving.

Lifts

1. One small public lift in the northern end of the St. Kilda Road Foyer. This lift only holds one wheelchair at a time with possibly two or three friends, quite a squeeze! Buttons are high and require a little pressure so it is recommended that people using wheelchairs back in. 2. A goods lift, close to the Gallery Shop off the Murdoch Court Entrance, is available for groups who cannot negotiate the St. Kilda Foyer lift, steps or escalators. This lift is not for public use and assistance must be arranged from one of the desks in the two foyers. Advise the gallery when planning your trip.

FACILITIES Cafeteria

Opening Times: 10.30am—4.00pm The door into the cafeteria is heavy, with a high, round disk shaped handle. Food displays are high for people using wheelchairs but the counter height is not too bad.

What to do at the Gallery

ARTIE MOUSE

A programme for young people (five to ten year olds) and their parents. Activity-based tours conducted once a month on Sundays, each session lasts approximately forty-five minutes. Families will be greeted by Artie Mouse in the St. Kilda Road foyer at 11 am, 1.30pm or 2.30pm. An adult must accompany your children during the session. Bookings are essential. Phone: 618 0356 in the first week of the month.

"THE GALLERY VISITS YOU"

Toilets are located near the southern steps on the Ground, First and Second Floors. There are also toilets on the Ground Floor near the Gallery Shop and "Deli," as well as in the Antiquities display area near the goods lift.

Accessible Toilets

Located at the northern end of the Main Foyer in the passage leading into Special Exhibitions. These toilets have several features to keep in mind:

1. The outer door opens inwards. A rope pulley system has been attached to assist people when leaving. This might get people into a knot.

2. The inner door opens both ways and leads directly into the toilet cubicle. There is no latch and no indication of occupancy.

3. When both doors are open, as in the case of someone exiting, it is possible for a passer-by to see directly into the toilet cubicle.

ENTERTAINMENT ACCESS SERV

EASE aims to assist people with special needs to attend Melbourne's mainstream entertainment by providing information, social support and incentives.

EASE also aims to encourage promoters and venue management to ensure physical access is feasible at all events within the Melbourne metropolitan region.

The toilet cubicle is a large room with two toilet bowls, there is no partition between them and one is slightly higher than the other.

5. There are side rails but no back rails.6. If you require assistance into the toilet, ask for one of the Gallery's first aid attendants.

Telephones

There is one accessible telephone next to the cloak room in the Main Foyer. Wheelchair Hire

Four wheelchairs are available for use within the Gallery at no cost.

Helpful Hints

1. The Gallery is an exciting place and there is much to see, so allow several hours at least.

2. Keep in mind that the chairs within the Gallery are low. If you need to rest but find it difficult to rise from a low chair ask an attendant for assistance.

3. Portable collapsable stools can be borrowed, at no cost, from the cloakroom in the Main Foyer–St. Kilda Street Entrance.

4. For evening concerts in the Great Hall the rest of the Gallery may be closed. For these concerts enter through the St. Kilda Road entrance. Security staff will direct people to the accessible toilets. These toilets are a fair distance from the Hall.

Studio staff are more than willing, however, to transfer audience members into tiered seating (so that wheelchairs can be moved out of the way). Under these circumstances they prefer a maximum of four wheelchairs at any one recording and request that prior notice is given. A single wheelchair user, transferring, need not contact them
