Notes

"Somebody Everybody" began as an exploration of 'home' in response to the artists missing their families and homes while living away during school time. This theme inspired us to explore personal stories of loss and grief, particularly in relation to family members and loved ones who have passed on.

The work then expanded on the theme of 'loss' to explore all sorts of lost things including loved ones, pets and memories and the sorts of things we all lose at some point in our lives; hair, money, patience, the-way-home.

Interestingly, much of what we lose we also commonly find; hope, joy, friendship, peace, food and shoes. The list of items goes on and on.

"Somebody Everybody" reminds us that at some point in our lives we all lose someone or something and we are not alone in this experience. In coming together we discover something else just as poignant along the way.

A huge and heartfelt congratulations to 'stArts with D' members who have remarkable stories to share and who offered so much of themselves alongside the artistic and management team, to the successful collaborative process of making this work.

Enjoy our performance and come and say 'hello' after the show to share your own stories of loss and discovery with us.

Biography

Kat is an established community dance artist, choreographer and director based in Melbourne who leads a diversity of community dance projects. She facilitates the transformation of stories into art. Kat first came to Alice Springs to work with Arts Access on "Mapping New Territory" in 2003 and has worked with Incite Arts since 2011 on Accessible Arts and the Southern Ngalia projects.

Kat is currently artistic director of 'Boilover' Inclusive Performance Ensemble (VIC) and former artistic director of 'Restless Dance Theatre' (SA) and 'Company CHAOS' (NSW). She has directed works for 'Australian Dance Theatre' (SA), Arts in Health at Flinders Medical Centre (SA) and several independent works including multi-award winning dance film, "Sixteen". Kat has also worked as a dramaturg for 'WEAVE Movement Theatre' (VIC), 'Southern Youth Theatre Ensemble' (SA) and 'Vitalstatistics Theatre Company' (SA). Kat runs her own business 'Whole Body Dance Movement' and is currently doing the 5Rhythms ® teacher training certification.
