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"Hair" transfers to accessible Athenaeum

The transfer of the hugely popular revival of Hair to the Athenaeum Theatre on the 12th October marks the re-opening of the historic Melbourne theatre. The Athenaeum Theatre at 188 Collins Street, Melbourne has been undergoing renovation for the past three months. The design by Allom, Lovell and Associates, Conservation Architects, has preserved the original designs and features wherever possible at the same time providing greater access and facilities.

There's now a ramped entrance-it's on the right hand side of the theatre's main entrance. Before the foyer area was very small with audiences having to spill out into the street during interval. Now several walls have been removed and the fover area has been greatly increased. You can now comfortably move about the fover and access the Box Office, the bar, toilets and auditorium.

The Box Office is now located through the entrance foyer and to your right. The counter is fairly high, but is accessible to wheelchair users.

The toilets-including a unisex accessible toilet - are on the left of the entrance foyer just before the stalls auditorium doors.



Wheelchair spaces remain unchanged. These are located at the back of the stalls auditorium on the aisles on either side. EASE is looking into the possibility of two wheelchair spaces at the side front of the stalls auditorium on either side. This is subject to fire regulations.

Venue Notes

Elliott Avenue, Parkville Melways Map: 29 E12 **Telephone:** 347 0309 Public Transport Train or tram to Royal Park Railway

Station.

Parking

General: There is ample parking space near the main entrance and at the Royal Park entrance.

Accessible: There are four accessible parking spaces on the far side of Elliott Avenue next to the pedestrian crossing. The parking area nearer the zoo is gravel and there are no marked parking bays. There is no accessible parking at the Royal Park entrance. Entrances

Both the Elliott Avenue and Royal Park entrances are accessible, but the main entrance, on Elliott Avenue, has the most facilities.

Entry is free for people in wheelchairs plus one accompanying adult. There are wheelchairs available at both entrances. We recommend that people with mobility problems use a wheelchair, as you have to cover a lot of ground to see the entire zoo.

Seal, Butterfly and Reptile Enclosures

Accessible Bear Enclosure Accessible but steep. Assistance required. Deer and Bison Enclosure

Accessible but steep and very long. Assistance required.

Bushland Enclosure

Accessible, but overhanging branches could be a problem for the visually impaired.

Great Flight Aviary

Accessible but steep. Gravelled surfaces difficult to manoeuvre on.

Orangutan/Chimpanzee Enclosure Accessible, but it's hard to see over the bushes.

Lion Enclosure

Entrance near reptile enclosure is ramped.

Facilities

Free Zoo Tours

The zoo's trained guides can provide information or take you on a tour. The Guides' Office is open from 11.00 am-4.00 pm on weekends. It is near the main entrance. Tours must be arranged in advance through the Friends of the Zoo on 347 1533.

Accessible Toilets

Unisex accessible toilets are marked on the zoo map, but not with the usual symbol. They are at the main entrance. the Lakeside Restaurant, the Butterfly Bistro, and near the large floral bed. There are no accessible toilets at the Royal Park entrance.

Telephone

The public telephones near the main entrance are too high up to be used by someone in a wheelchair. Mothers' Rooms

These are at the Butterfly Bistro and the Lakeside Restaurant.

Restaurants

All the restaurants are accessible, but it is difficult to access the outdoor table areas. We suggest you get a take away from one of the restaurants and then go to the far side of the Lakeside Bistro, which is under cover.

-Melbourne Zoo-Tours for the Visually Impaired -

"My involvement with Melbourne Zoo started when I worked with a blind law student" says Joan Naylor. "One day he told me he didn't know how big a giraffe was." Joan took her friend to Melbourne Zoo. "I thought that introducing visually impaired people to the zoo was so worthwhile that I became a volunteer worker." Joan is now the co-ordinator for the visually impaired at Melbourne Zoo. "I've taken literally hundreds of visually impaired people around the zoo," she says. Tours start in a classroom, where you're given information about the animals. Then, under the supervision of the guides, you can handle live lizards and snakes, as well as various skins and skulls. Then the groups are taken around the zoo. "By the seals pool there are life size sculptures of seals, which the visually impaired can feel to get a good

idea of what a seal looks like and people with even a little vision can see the seals through the underwater viewing window.

"In the Great Flight Aviary there are hundreds of plants to touch and smell, and you can listen to the calls of all sorts of exotic birds." "We also visit the Butterfly House, which is sealed and has a tropical climate. The House is full of tropical plants, and the butterflies often settle on people." "The guides for the visually impaired receive thorough training." "We take them around the zoo wearing blindfolds, or glasses that simulate various forms of partial sight," says Joan. The ratio of guides to visually impaired visitors is almost one-to-one, so there's always someone to describe what's going on. "Because the guides know the history of every animal they can tell you all sorts of anecdotes about

them." "A lot of the people we take on these tours are surprised by how much they get out of the visit" says Joan. "There are animals and plants to touch and a huge number of strange sounds and smells."

Melbourne Zoo has produced an embossed Braille book of twenty zoo animals. Almost every library that deals with the visually impaired has a copy, or you can get hold of one by contacting Melbourne Zoo. "It's not a child's book" says Joan. "It has Braille maps and drawings and lots of detailed written information. It's a very helpful thing for people to read before taking the zoo tour." Hay Fever

Noel Coward's comedy Hay Fever, which opens at the Playhouse on 17th October, is described as "an evening of sparkling irresponsibility, wit and fun." Four unsuspecting guests spend a weekend in the country with the delightfully eccentric Bliss family. Each member of the family has invited a house guest without notifying the others, resulting in a comedy of manners (or lack of them), which has made Hay Fever one of Noel Coward's most important and enduringly funny plays.

Audio Description

Three performances of Hay Fever will feature Audio **Description** - a new aid for visually impaired theatre goers. Developed by the Association for the Blind, Audio Description allows concise descriptions of what happens on stage to be relayed to the visually impaired through a radio

receiver no bigger than a "Walkman." The describing is done live. The Describers, who familiarise themselves with each production beforehand, sit in booths at the back of the theatre. Stage movements, sets and the actors'

gestures and facial expressions are all described during breaks in the dialogue. Programme notes and stage setting are also described in detail before the performance starts. Access to Audio Description is free and must be booked through EASE. The equipment - receiver and a new earpiece-is collected on arrival at the theatre.

Hay Fever runs from 17th October to 23rd November 1991 at the Playhouse, Victorian Arts Centre.

There are twenty Audio Description units available at each of the following performances: Wednesday 6th November at 8.00 pm, Thursday 14th November at 8.00 pm, and Saturday 16th November at 4.00 pm.
