Identity, Ability, Diversity Neridah Wyatt-Spratt

Big, bold and celebrating the creative power of people with a disability the community art project Identity, Ability, Diversity saw exhibitions throughout the southwest region of Sydney in the first week of December. Part of the celebrations for International Day of People with a Disability, this project was coordinated by Accessible Arts and funded by 11 councils from Southern Sydney Region Organization of Council's.

Art works for the exhibitions were produced in workshops and arts programs that involved individuals and groups from Botany Bay, Canterbury, Hurstville, Kogarah, Marrickville, Randwick, Rockdale, South Sydney, Southerland Shire, Woollahra and Waverley areas. Material for the project was generously supplied by Reverse Garbage, a unique community cooperative that recycles industrial material for use in creative endeavours.

300 art works were produced and for many people it has been their first exposure to creative expression. Postive outcomes were achieved in this project and for those participants whose appetites were wetted, AArts is planning an ongoing art class in 1999!

Mid North Coast Artability Tour

With financial support from the Arts Council of NSW, Arts Holiday Coast initiated a joint project with Accessible Arts (AArts) to tour the Mid North Coast region and consult with the local arts and disability communities. Helen Connors Executive Officer of the NSW arts and disability organisation, Accessible Arts traveled with Bruce Tindale from Arts Holiday Coast to Bellingen, Kempsey, Port Macquarie and Taree.

The reason behind the tour is that both the arts and disability communities are relatively isolated groups and there are few or no occasions when these communities come together or even cross paths. The tour provided a rare occasion to bring the communities together for discussion and the exchange of information'. did not have the contacts or networks in the disability community to get the information to people with disabilities. For the disability sector there was often a frustration in the calibre of arts and cultural activities available to people with disabilities. They did not have the contacts or networks in the arts community and it was difficult to access trained arts tutors and appropriate information on artform practice or teaching methods.

Bruce Tindale described the tour as a first step towards the inclusion people with disabilities in local arts and cultural activities. "While brief, the tour provided the opportunity for dialogue and a start to setting up joint arts projects and a regional art and disability network." Collaboration can not be underestimated explained Helen. "It has been the experience of AArts that when the arts and



Local artists, disability workers, education and cultural officers and people with disabilities took part in discussions on the inclusion of people with disabilities in local arts activities and events. The meetings provided the opportunity for communities to discuss potential areas of collaboration and sharing of resources. Discussion with community members indicated communication and the exchange of ideas and information were major issues for the region.

Artists and arts administrators who wanted to include people with disabilities in arts program and events often felt frustrated in their attempts. People disability communities start to develop communication networks there is a change of attitude. People start to work together and in the process exciting, innovative arts initiatives take place."

Japanese Visit

Accessible Arts was asked by Mr Uchiyama, the director of the art program for the '98 Paralympic in Nagan to organise a study tour for a number of artists with disabilities visiting from Japan. Mr Uchiyama was recently in Sydney for a brief visit and came to visit AArts and Print 35.

The group was in Melbourne in November and I have organised a workshop at Arts Project Australia and a visit to the Vic Health Gallery in the Victorian Art Gallery. In Sydney I arranged a TheatreSports workshop, lunch and a visit to Print 35. There were 19 people in the group, seven with disabilities.



Hunter Orthopaedic School Artstart Mural Project Marion Giles

Nadine Ross and I, as art workers, knew that creating a mural on the brick wall outside the school toilets needed to include the participation of students if it was to be more meaningful to them than just wallpaper. With the cooperation of staff we set up weekly half-day workshop sessions to find out what was possible and to allow the students to experiment (and have fun). It became apparent early on that clay was a successful and enjoyable medium for most and luckily the school owned a kiln, so clay became the best way we could involve individual pieces in the overall work. The project provided students with the opportunity to experience clay, painting, carpentry, paper-mache and construction.

Beyond nurturing the imagination and talents of this varied group, our task became devising a way to unify all our work. Early on an underwater theme was agreed upon and collective projects, for example, schools of fish, and groups of bubbles and seaweed that allowed individual interpretation within themes.

We were guided too. We found it was important that we include the navy ship, HMAS Newcastle, that has been a major sponsor of the school. It also became obvious that the personalities of all the students were greatly valued by the entire school population. We decided to include photographs of each young person inside a bubble. The importance of this struck home as two young boys did not live to see the completed mural. The mark of this mural's success, in my mind, is seeing the participants touch the three-dimensional surface to find their own and friend's faces amongst their artwork on the now busy and colourful wall.
