

Das Bose ist Immer und Uberall

Look out for the Brisbane Festival and Access Arts' presentation of IHOS Opera's THE DIVINE KISS - Das Bose ist Immer und Uberall (The Evil is Always and Everywhere) at the Brisbane Festival 16-19 September.

The Divine Kiss is a new touring operatic work for an ensemble of nine, exploring the imagery of the Seven Saving Virtures: Prudence, Justice, Fortitude, Temperance, Faith, Hope and Charity. It questions the role of these traditional concepts as we approach the new millennium.

Constantine Koukias and his creative team will impress us all with pyrotechnics (fireworks), laser technology and some very special music. Seven

(About one hundred model aeroplanes will descend on the Town Hall playing the soundtrack to the Opera!) One installation will be in the Anne Street foyer and the other, outdoors in the City Square. Stay alert about three weeks before the festival begins (early September).

HIGH BEAM FESTIVAL

Congratulations to Liz Navratil and Karyn White on their highly successful performances at the High Beam Festival in Adelaide 1-10 May. The ten day festival featured artists and performers from across Australia. We also ran into Access Arts members Robert Oakman and Macushla Doyle and painters from Cascade Palace! Queensland was well represented across several artforms and the high quality work was a pleasure to experience.

Liz Navratil performed several times during the festival and presented a lecture style expose on her career as an actor. Apart from her show 'My Upside Down Life' she tried out a lot of new material about raising children, doctors and some adult themes. Did Steady Eddie hear what she said about him? Apparently the top billing star came looking for Liz late in the night but she 'had left the building'! Her warm and honest approach to comedy won her many new friends and gave her valuable exposure at a national festival.

Karyn White's one woman show 'Im Ulrike Screaming' also captured the audience attention during its two performances. It is a powerful monologue by a dissident political prisoner locked in a white prison cell. This was one of the most thought provoking works shown at the festival due to its loaded political and personal message and the parallels it draws between the work and the performer. The first night performance was delivered with such confidence and vulnerability that you could hear a pin drop. Karyn's attendance at the festival enabled her to establish herself as an actor with depth and skill, able to manage difficult and probing contemporary theatre.

There a plans to present the second High Beam Festival as part of the Adelaide Festival in 2000. Actors, artists and writers should get organised and develop work for this important event! We made many friends and contacts at the festival and were justifiably proud of our Queensland exports.

20th June. Tanpopo-no-ye will host the 23rd Wataboshi Music Festival on 2nd August during his visit.



New Constitution

At the Annual General Meeting of 29 March, the recently revised Constitution was passed. One of the changes is in reference to the commission Access Arts charges on the sale of artwork. The clause now reads:

12 (1) *The association will charge no more than 25% commission for any artwork(s) sold at an exhibition organised by *the association; but where the artwork is framed, there will be no commission on the first \$40 of the sale price, where the sale price of the artwork is over \$100.

I would like to say a big hello to all Access Arts members! I will be taking over from Cathy Dart as Art Path Coordinator. Some of you have already met me at the Multi Arts workshops when I was a support worker last year and artist this year.

Exciting events are coming up this year, with the Disability Access Week - Members Exhibition (19 - 25 July) and the end of year Members Exhibition (25 - 31 October). I am also working on solo exhibitions for several members. If you are interested in participating in a number of exhibitions (both group and individual) please do not hesitate to contact me at the office.

One of the things I get to do as Art Path Coordinator is visit artists and their work so to gain a better understanding of what is being created out there. Arthur Johns is the first artist I have been to visit and I was pleasantly surprised at the strong body of artwork Arthur had. Working off landscape, figurative and abstract themes. Arthur has experimented in photography, watercolours. acrylics, pen and ink, crayon and charcoal. What I enjoyed about these images was the emotional and spiritual depth to his imagery and the thoughtful attention given to detail in his artistic process. A strong awareness of organising shapes within a composition have seen this artist present strong imagery that organises the figure, landscape and still life images within definite shapes. Arthur's enthusiasm for creating imagery is present in his sensitive approach evident in the work. No matter what this artist works from. In the meantime we are still doing our training at Treasury Casino in the city. We are waiting to hear back from Queensland University Hospitality section about training there as well.


Caboolture Project

Twenty thousand wedding photographs over forty years, all taken by one man on a bike who was never officially invited to these weddings and was never married himself.

The Central Goldfields Regional Art Gallery in conjunction with the brother and family of Wallace Richards recently hosted a tribute to a man who has become a beloved icon in the small town of Maryborough, Victoria for his very peculiar hobby. Taking photos of weddings.

Wallace Richards was a local identity in Maryborough and a person with an intellectual and physical disability. He lived independently, was

self sufficient through his own work and maintained very good friendships. Every weekend he would jump on his bike and ride around to weddings held in and around the district of Maryborough to take photos of the weddings.

When Wally died, aged 66, he left a collection of more than forty years of weddings in Maryborough and surrounding district.

In April an exhibition of Wally's wedding photos was held. Eighty photos had been selected to be enlarged and mounted as an exhibition displayed in the Central Goldfields Regional Art Gallery. The whole collection has been donated to the Midlands Historical Society who will continue to catalogue and preserve the collection.

It is hoped that, one day, we may have the opportunity to view an exhibition of Wally's photos in Queensland.

From the Regional Indigenous Project Officer...

Stay Strong - Moreton Correctional Centre

I am pleased to announce that the Stay Strong project has finally commenced. The project continues Access Arts' with Moreton partnership Correctional Centre to offer Aboriginal and Torres Strait currently people, Islander resident within the centre, professional development and training with the aim of equipping artists to undertake work opportunities on their release.

Stay Strong is comprised of artforms including four traditional and contemporary visual arts techniques, music, traditional dance and screenprinting. Stay Strong also involves an arts industry component which will educate participants on issues such as pricing copyright, marketing work, exhibiting works and artists contracts.

We look forward to exhibiting some of the works developed during the program at the Inala Community Gallery and Cultural Centre in early September.

Mental Health Promotion Project

The Mental Health Promotion Project is a partnership between Access Arts and Queensland Health with the aim of

increasing the awareness of mental health issues within Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. The project involves a series of workshops in Brisbane, Palm Island, Bamaga and Thursday Island. Apart from Brisbane, you may need a fairly good map to locate the other places. Feel free to drop me a line if you need a hand locating them.

Brisbane workshops are set down for 18th & 19th June. I will be visiting Palm Island, Thursday Island and Bamaga communities between 20 July and 5 August. The work developed from the workshops shall than be used to develop a series of posters and flyers which shall be distributed to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities throughout Queensland.

Inala Sculptural Project

The Inala Sculptural project aims to strengthen support networks for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who are experiencing a mental illness, and currently living within the community. The project involves developing a
