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

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

Arts Project Australia began in 1974 as an arts-based advocacy group for people with intellectual disabilities. A major reason for the formation of "The Art Project" (as it was then known) was the insight on the part of its members that many people who have intellectual disabilities displayed aptitude and talent in the visual arts, and that the flexible conventions of these artforms could provide access to a variety of means of expression and communication even when more common forms, particularly linguistic, were difficult for them to utilise. Broadly, the aims of the Association are:

- To provide the means by which people with intellectual disabilities can participate fully in the visual arts;
- To promote the work of people with intellectual disabilities as integral to the broad spectrum of contemporary art practice;
- To facilitate participation by people with intellectual disabilities in appropriate mainstream programs and courses, and to encourage meaningful artistic exchange between disabled and non-disabled artists;
- To broaden understanding and awareness of art by people with intellectual disabilities amongst artists and the general public;
- To advocate art as a valid vocational or recreational option for people with intellectual disabilities;
- To support and provide high quality community-based education and training programs in the visual arts for people with intellectual disabilities, as well as for the general public;

In addition to the above points, the Studio Workshop program specifically aims to provide educational experiences which will:

- Develop the artistic skills and awareness of people with an intellectual disability so that they may more fully utilise art as a vocational or recreational option;
- Focus on personal development, particularly in the ares of self-confidence and self esteem, which will enhance the individual's ability to function in other aspects of their lives;
- Encourage the development of personal symbols and expression.

President's Report - Myra Hilgendorf, O.A.M.

In presenting my Annual Report for 1990, I feel that I am able to claim that the Arts Project is being increasingly recognised as a valid and valuable facility. It enables people with intellectual disabilities to share with the wider art world both the opportunity to develop skills in expressing themselves through the visual arts and to have their work seen by a wide and appreciative public. It is also provides a venue in the Northcote and Preston community area which is shared by disabled and non-disabled people both for classes and in the use of the gallery. This is a developing area of integration which has been a natural growth, real achievement of shared interest and common needs. Despite a very serious down-turn in funding which we know we share with similar organisations in the community, the demand for services grows beyond our capacity to accept the enrollments. We had hoped to be operating five and a half days a week by 1991 but that has not been possible.

The Exhibition Program continues but, for the present, on a much reduced scale. Despite the usual high number of sales of work in the past, staging exhibitions is an expensive activity and one must accept the falling-off of sales during this recession period.

Since August 1990 we have had, for the first time, a full-time Director. Cheryl Daye returned from her Churchill Fellowship study tour to take up this position. I regard this as one of the most important steps in our development. The work load has grown enormously and the need for a Director to be present on a daily basis has become vital. We are grateful to Community Services Victoria - Intellectual Disability Services - for providing the funds to make this possible. Cheryl is eminently suited to this work with her long experience in teaching art at the Special School at Janefield. Her knowledge both of the needs of people with intellectual disabilities and the methods of stimulating their creativity is extensive, and her recent tour of Europe enabled her to assess the validity of the work being done at Arts Project and to make valuable contacts. She now has the time also to represent Arts Project both at a state and national level, at meetings and seminars, where appropriate.

I wish to thank the Management Committee for their interest and support. Jan English has gone interstate and so is unable to continue her work with us; we thank her for her the time and assistance she was able to give. Sue Sturup joined us, after some years absence, as Secretary. She was for many years a most capable and creative member during the early years of the Project, and we are all very happy to have her back. I wish to show my appreciation of the Administrative Assistant Linda Bond whose efficiency and intelligent understanding of her work is of such help to us all. And last but by no means least our very grateful thanks goes to the Artsworkers whose task of running the daily classes smoothly is such an obvious success. The high motivation of the students, the cheerful, pleasant atmosphere of the Studio Workshop, and the profusion of exciting and innovative work that is characteristic of the Studio is a worthy reflection of the efforts of the Artsworkers.

PROGRAM DIRECTOR'S REPORT

- Cheryl Daye

It is now almost five months since I commenced a full-time position as Program Director at Arts Project. Returning from my Churchill Fellowship and commencing this job has proven both exciting and challenging, and the experience I gained whilst overseas has confirmed my view that Arts Project is one of the most innovative and unique services currently operating in the field.

One of the most important aspects of the Studio Workshop is the ongoing and long-term support which the program is able to offer, and under the competent and sensitive guidance of the artsworkers, participants are continuing to make significant artistic gains and to achieve recognition as artists. Comments are often made by visitors to the Studio Workshop, as well as by support staff from centres, regarding the concentration and dedication of the participants. This positive and directed atmosphere is something which the experience and understanding of the artsworkers has helped achieve, and which is conducive to the attainment of successful outcomes for all participants.

We are also grateful for the perceptive assistance of the support staff from many of the centres. Often working alongside participants, they can provide a valuable role model and help facilitate a mutual exchange between participants and artsworkers. Their knowledge of individual needs and their skills in working with the participants can be of great assistance in carrying out the aims of the program and in supporting the artsworkers in their work.

A generous donation of carpet by the Northcote Lions Club has greatly improved the comfort of the Studio Workshop, making it both warmer and quiter. On behalf of all at Arts Project, I would like to thank Mr. John Blom and the Lions Club for arranging the supply and installation of the carpet.

By the time this report is printed, we will be in receipt of three new sets of plan drawers which have been funded through the Department of Community Services and Health. This equipment will enable participants' work to be stored in a manner which will not only protect it from damage, but also enhance the dignity of the individual and facilitate the recording and evaluation of individual development.

The informal lunchtime meetings where participants, artsworkers and administrative staff can discuss issues relevant to the Studio Workshop have provided an important avenue for input into decision making. This will be further developed through appointment of participant representatives to the Studio Workshop and Management Committees.

Program Director's Report - Continued

Community access and integration activities continue to be a focus of the Studio Workshop's development, and involve not only making it available to the broader artistic community, but also pursuing mainstream involvement and acknowledgment for participants. Our connection with the Phillip Institute of Technology's School of Art and Design will be extended in 1991, when two new participants will begin first year drawing classes, and Dorothy Berry and Valerio Ciccone will complete their final painting unit. The benefits of the program have been particularly notable in the development of understanding and mutual respect between disabled and non-disabled students. Special thanks should go to Ms. Lyn Quintal whose support and commitment have been instrumental in establishing and continuing this program, and to Mr. Jim Taylor, Mr. Godwin Bradbeer and Mr. Wayne Conduit whose assistance is also greatly appreciated.

A further development has been the opportunity for Arts Project participants to attend the Australian Print Workshop in Fitzroy on a sessional basis, where they have access to the techniques of etching and lithography. At present, a joint proposal is being developed by the Australian Print Workshop and Arts Project for funding which will enable this to become a permanent part of each organisation's activities.

In September 1990, the inaugural P-ART-Icipate Conference was held at Victoria College, Toorak. Representatives from Arts Project donated their time to run practical workshops in painting and drawing and to facilitate a discussion group on Further Education Opportunities In The Arts for people with disabilities. This was a highly successful conference and we look forward to future involvement. Members of the Management Committee as well as the Program Director also attended a National Forum convened by Arts Access to discuss a range of arts and disabilities/health issues and to provide an opportunity for an exchange of information and ideas between organisations working in the field in Australia. My experiences in Europe whilst on my Churchill Fellowship indicated the need for such networking in Australia, and this Forum represented a valuable first step towards greater communication and support nationally between agencies.

During the past year we were grateful for the financial support provided by the Commonwealth Department of Community Services and Health (Disability Services), Community Services Victoria (Intellectual Disability Services), the Australia Council (Community Cultural Development Unit), and the Victorian Ministry for the Arts. Such continued support is essential for the survival of the program, and increased efforts will be made to negotiate a secure and committed funding source for the future.

Finally, I would like to thank all those who have supported the Studio Workshop during 1990; funding bodies, the Management Committee, the Artsworkers and the many individuals who have been involved with the organisation. I would particularly like to thank Linda Bond for her invaluable and highly efficient administrative support. We look forward to continued growth and achievement in 1991.

EXHIBITIONS PROGRAM 1990

During 1990 our Exhibition Program included a range of local and overseas venues, and has continued to provide a valuable means of achieving recognition for Arts Project participants and their work.

At the invitation of Mr. Charlie Welch, Director of Very Special Arts, Hawaii, a number of Arts Project participants had their work exhibited at the Honolulu Academy of Art. This show was received very well, and the Academy purchased some of the works for its collection in addition to other works being sold to private collectors.

In August 1990, an International Exhibition of Art by People with a Mental Handicap was held in Paris at the Sorbonne. This show was held in conjunction with the 10th Annual ILSMH/UNAPEI Conference and was opened by the French President, Mr. Francois Mitterand. This exhibition went on to tour a number of European cities for the remainder of 1990, and included works by several participants of the Arts Project Studio Workshop program.


Here in Melbourne, the Arts Project 1990 Exhibitions Program has been based largely in our own gallery in Northcote. Whilst we were disappointed at not being able to pursue our anticipated program in galleries, we have been pleased at the amount of sales which have been generated through our own venue. Of particular note were the two "salon style" shows which were held at the Arts Project Gallery.

The first of these was held in July 1990 and featured works by artists from the evening and Saturday afternoon life drawing classes, whilst the second was a Christmas show of smaller works from the Studio Workshop. The Christmas exhibition was an outstanding success, with more than seventy-five percent of works sold on the opening night. The opening was combined with our Christmas party and provided an enjoyable opportunity for participants to act as hosts to the invited guests, friends and family who attended.

Prior to the Christmas Salon Show, Arts Project also exhibited at the Artists' Garden in Fitzroy. This show also included ceramic sculptures made by participants at Fire and Clay in Lilydale and Wavelink in Waverley. The two and three dimensional artforms proved highly complimentary and created a most attractive and interesting show.

A number of Arts Project participants also had their work displayed during September 1990 in an exhibition which was held in conjunction with the inaugural "P-ART-Icipate" Conference, and was opened by the artist Ms. Mirka Mora.







NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR **ENDED 31ST JANUARY 1991**

Historical Cost Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Historical Cost Convention and therefore do not reflect changes in the purchasing power of money or current valuations of non-monetary assets. The accounting policies are, unless otherwise stated, consistent with these.

Accrual Accounting

The Accrual Method of Accounting is used whereby accruals and prepayments are recognised in the Financial Year to which it relates and not when it is paid.

*3) Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated on a straight line basis so as to write off the net cost of each fixed asset during its expected useful life.

*4) Repairs and Maintenance

Costs related to repairs and maintenance of the company's operating facilities are written off as they are incurred.

*5) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets have been depreciated on a straight-line basis so as to write off the value of these assets progressively over their estimated useful lives. Additions during the year are depreciated on a pro-rata basis from the date of acquisition.
