

Parking

All parking in the area is metered, two-hour meters down the centre of Lonsdale Street, also long term parking on Albert Street. Parking stations on Lonsdale Street.

Accessible Parking

No parking bays in the area reserved for people with disabilities. The Theatre owner, however, has an application in with the council.

Something to watch: the gutter directly outside the theatre is very high and it may be difficult to open the doors of some cars or move from a passenger seat into a wheelchair. This gutter appears to lose height towards Little Bourke Street.

Entrance

All theatre entrances are on Spring Street. Glass doors are propped open prior to and during performances. There is a step into each door.

Accessible Entrance

Although all doorways into the foyer have a step these diminish in height as you move towards Bourke Street. A portable ramp is under construction for the door closest to Bourke Street.

Box Office

The outer box office has an awkward step with a heavy door. The counter is high. Just prior to and during performances this box office is closed and all sales are handled in the foyer. Once again this counter is high.

Foyer

The foyer is a tiled area.

All counters in the foyer area are high. These counters are awkward for staff and patrons. Staff in the "Refreshment Bar" for example have to reach over a wide cold storage bin before even negotiating the bench.

There is a slight rise into the auditorium before the tiled surface gives way to carpet.

Shop

During Les Miserables there is a small shop at the Little Bourke Street/Spring Street corner of the building. There is a low step into the shop, the door does not open fully and space in the shop is confined.

Stalls Seating

There are no steps from the foyer into the stalls seating area. Stalls seating has no central aisles. Seats fold down and forward, with the back tilting backwards, in one movement as you sit. This leaves more room between rows when seats are

unoccupied; some people however may need to brace themselves against the arm rest.

From the last four or five rows (T–W) view of the stage, above actor's head height, is affected by the Dress Circle overhang.

Accessible Seating

- 1. As there are no central aisles people who wish to transfer must book seats at the end of a row. Keep in mind that rows do not always start at seat number one. Chairs and frames are stored at the side of the stage.
- 2. There are four wheelchair "bays" behind the last row (W)-see notes above. The four "bays" are in pairs on either side of the sound box.
- 3. If you have booked seats J4 or J36 for a friend it is possible to move down next to this seat on the night.

Dress Circle & Balcony Seating

Steps up to the Dress Circle Foyer are marble, the railing is high and thick. There are countless steps to the Balcony, they are cement and the railing is black and at average height.

Keep in mind that the Balcony is a long way up and that seating rows are steeply tiered. There are no rails down the two internal aisles and the aisle's steps are irregular.

Side aisles have rails.

Toilets

- 1. Eight steps, with rails, down to the male toilets in the street level foyer. Female toilets at this level have no steps.
- To access the Balcony toilets it is necessary to go down a flight of steps and then a further five steps all with rails.

Accessible Toilets

The only accessible toilet is between the male and female toilets at the Little Bourke Street end of the lower foyer. There is no clearly visible sign. This is the best accessible toilet EASE staff have reviewed! They even have a mirror down to the floor.

Telephone

One public telephone at the Little Bourke Street end of the foyer. Too high for wheelchair users.

Facilities for the Hearing Impaired Loops are available on all floors. Helpful Hints

- 1. Keep in mind that there are no "Disabled Parking" bays in the theatre's vicinity and that parking can be hard to find.
- EASE has received numerous comments about the heavy use of toilets during interval. If you do not use the accessible toilet it is advised that you make a dignified rush for the toilets.
- 3. If you wish to discuss seating in the theatre ring EASE on: 699 8497.

HOW TO BOOK WITH EASE

To book tickets with EASE, ring 699 8497, discuss with Barbara or Chris what you would like to see and where you would like to sit. Make out a cheque to Arts Access for the appropriate amount and post it to Arts Access, 109-111 Sturt Street, South Melbourne 3205. We will either hold the tickets for you, post them or arrange for them to be at the box office—whichever you prefer. It does help us if you can provide a stamped, self-addressed envelope.

The above shows are only a selection of tickets available through EASE. We continually have a variety of tickets coming through the office. To make the best use of our services you need to ring us regularly. The more often you talk to us the more we know of your interests and the more often we will think of you when tickets come our way.

Performances that are Part of a Season

At this time of year many subscription seasons start up. In the classical music and live theatre spheres the majority of performances are part of a season. If you attend all the concerts or shows in a season it is much cheaper, compared to regular prices, to buy a season ticket. EASE can assist however with single tickets to some companies—Melbourne Symphony

Orchestra (MSO), Melbourne Musicians, Melbourne Theatre Company (MTC) and, later in the year, Victoria State Opera. Details of SOME of these performances can be found below. Ticket and price information can be gained by contacting EASE in writing or by phone. Keep in mind that the MSO, MTC and Melbourne Musicians seasons have begun.
