Grants for the Arts—Some Principles and Precautions

The main aims of the Australia Council are to promote excellence in the arts, and to enlarge opportunities for practising and enjoying the arts. In pursuing these goals one of the Council's vital avenues is the granting of funds to arts organisations and to individual artists.

The awarding of grants is still the Australia Council's most conspicuous activity. It arouses periodical comment and criticism, though in the late 1970s the volume of public criticism has considerably diminished. The awarding of grants is also a time-consuming activity, and imposes pressures on the Boards and the panels and the full-time staff who make or implement decisions on the dispersal of funds. It is also probably the least understood of the Council's activities. It therefore merits public discussion and constructive criticism.

Dozens of governments, ranging from the United States and China to Finland and New Zealand, similarly grant money to arts organisations and artists. But the principles which guide the apportioning of funds to the arts, and the methods by which the public purse is protected, are not often outlined in public documents. This annual report sets out how the Australia Council apportions funds to a wide range of applicants, how it makes the decisions, the principles and policies which shape these decisions, and some of the dilemmas involved in allocating funds and in ensuring that they are spent effectively.

There is a belief that public funds are distributed to the arts largely on hunches and intuitions which, in any other form of government-spending, would not be tolerated. The Australia Council believes, on the contrary, that its spending on the arts is based on the same kinds of principles, formulas and precautions which operate in education, agriculture, scientific and industrial research, national development or any other governmental activity. In several important facets, Federal expenditure on the arts in Australia may well be more accountable and more rigorous than the public expenditure on almost any other activity. This is not a statement of complacency: rather it is a statement that taxpayers are entitled to expect that their financial support for the arts will not yield less value for money than other forms of public spending.

The Australia Council has to find and foster talent, to cultivate taste, to enlarge audiences for all the arts, and to multiply the numbers of people who gain satisfaction from practising the arts. These goals are not easily achieved. The Council has to take risks. An organisation which knowingly takes

risks has to develop principles and policies which minimise the risks and precautions which ensure that the money is carefully accounted for.

The Task of the Seven Boards

Nearly all the individual decisions on funding are delegated to specialist Boards. There are seven Boards, each of which works in one art-form or a range of allied arts: Crafts, Literature, Visual Arts, Theatre, Music, Aboriginal Arts and Community Arts. The typical Board has eight members. All are part-time members and most are artists or specialists in at least one facet of the area covered by the Board. Some of the Boards are also assisted by consultants or specialist advisory panels or working parties. Each Board also employs its own full-time specialist staff. The Australia Council relies on specialist Boards more than almost any arts authority in Western Europe or North America.

Each Board is constituted on the principle that no individuals or groups should determine and implement policies for more than a few years. Insofar as it is possible to regulate membership, the Boards cannot become the permanent home of entrenched interests, or schools of thought. Tenure of membership is short; and no member of the original Boards of 1973 now remains though some may return in years to come. The average term of office for the present members of the Boards is about four years. There are, of course, disadvantages in a frequent turnover in membership. Policies can zigzag with a drastic change in membership and vital knowledge of past achievements and mistakes can be lost. At the same time the frequent turnover encourages debate on policies for promoting the arts.

It is sometimes imagined that members of a Board, being part-time, are easily over-ruled by the full-time director of the Board. The evidence suggests, however, that the full-time director does not have undue power. The director of a Board does not have a vote. Nor does the director have security of tenure, working instead on a three-year contract.

Members of the Boards give generously the time required to examine the applications for support, and the accompanying manuscripts or slides or other evidence. Indeed many artists who sit on the Boards unduly sacrifice their own work in order to give adequate time to this work of assessment.

In order that people throughout Australia should have access to the Board's funds, the programs of each Board are advertised in the daily press in every State. Booklets acquaint enquirers of the funds for which they may apply and the rules governing the spending of those funds. In recent years the Council's budget has declined in real terms, and the number of full-time staff has declined by almost one third, thus restricting the frequency with which it can call for and assess applications. Applications for most programs are called once a year. Each Board annually receives far more applications than it can satisfy.

As each Board lacks sufficient funds to support all the individuals and projects deemed worthy of support, the process of sifting the applicants is difficult and slow. All in all, the Council awarded grants to almost two thousand individuals and organisations in the year ending June 1979, but another two thousand applications had to be read, assessed, reported upon and ultimately rejected. The Australia Council is conscious of the careful way in which its seven Boards carry out the task of competitive assessment.

Grants to Individuals

The Literature Board, the Crafts Board and the Visual Arts Board give strongest support to individual artists but every Board makes some grants to individuals as distinct from organisations. The Aboriginal Arts Board and the Community Arts Board generally use outside institutions as intermediaries to pay individual artists; and those institutions provide a financial audit.

Writers, potters, sculptors, composers and other artists seek grants primarily to meet heavy travel, research or equipment expenses associated with practising their art or to enable them to devote their full time to their art. As Australia's population is relatively small, the free market for the works of Australian artists is not sufficiently large to support more than a few full-time artists. Moreover the Australian artists, unlike Australian manufacturers, are rarely protected by duties or bans against foreign imports. Many distinguished artists working full time cannot hope to earn, through the sales of their work, as much as a factory worker or transport driver earns in a normal working week. Subsidy is essential even to sustain a small number of full-time artists in most of the major creative arts. Likewise occasional grants to talented part-time artists enable them to complete unfinished work, attain higher standards or experiment.

In deciding how to select, say, the ten most eligible artists out of some seventy applications, a Board has to assess the performance and the promise of the applicants—largely on the basis of work which they have so far completed. A Board has to decide whether the awarding of a grant would really help a playwright, composer, bark-painter or other artist to create something which might otherwise not come into existence, or to create it more skilfully, or to gain experience which will

ultimately strengthen his art. A Board sometimes has to decide whether, by supporting a dedicated artist at a time when her work is not fulfilling early expectations, the help might ultimately be more valuable than a grant awarded when she seems to be at the peak of her creativity and in little need of financial support. Such decisions are not easily made. At the same time they are not unique. A similar range of decisions has to be made by companies which are backing research, by government authorities which are investigating new projects, and by the innumerable committees which throughout the country award scholarships or make permanent appointments to salaried positions.

With few exceptions the year-long grants awarded by the Boards to full-time artists are relatively humble. Thus a young writer's grant is \$6000 a year, and like all these grants is taxable. At the top of the financial scale are the senior composer's fellowship at \$13 000 a year, the Visual Arts Board maximum standard grant of \$12 000 for a year, the senior writer's fellowship at \$11 000 for a year, and the senior fellowship for craftsmen at a maximum of \$10 000 a year. At the end of June 1979 only some forty full-time artists were receiving these premier awards; and all of these artists were women and men of proven ability, and some had international reputations. Such artists, of course, also had to meet their own expenses, pay their own rent for studio or study, provide for their own superannuation, finance their own holidays and pay their own travel expenses. At least half of these artists on the peak awards would probably not once all earnings and expenses had been totted up) equal the real income of the average Australian breadwinner.

Grants to full-time artists usually do not extend for more than twelve months. Most Boards offer fellowships which terminate, at most, after one year. The Literature Board, alone of the Boards, awards three-year fellowships. They go to a small number of experienced, professional authors. Few full-time creative artists in Australia are thus given a sense of security. At the same time the present emphasis on annual fellowships means that if Boards make a mistake it is less costly.

The Council itself supervises Board policies and at times challenges them or co-ordinates them. Council, for instance, has a firm policy on the controversial question of whether a capable professional artist should be supported year after year. 'No limit', argues Council, 'should be placed on the period over which an individual may receive assistance or the amount of funds he may be granted'. While Council sees no reason why an outstanding artist, earning little income from sales of his work, should not be supported year after year, most Boards are wary of giving continuous support to the one artist, no matter how distinguished.

Each Board applies some form of a means test, either systematic or occasional, to individuals who apply for the larger grants, especially for full-time fellowships. A fellowship is not awarded to artists who are known with certainty to be making a comfortable income from their art. Indeed, several artists who were working full-time voluntarily surrendered their fellowship after receiving large sums from the sale of film rights or from other windfalls.

On rare occasions a Board has been forced to withdraw a grant because the individual has not honoured the purpose of the grant. Most Boards insist that an artist who has not fulfilled the conditions of a grant is ineligible for further grants.

A high proportion of complaints—made publicly in the newspapers or confidentially in letters to the Council—are found, on investiation, to be unfounded or exaggerated beyond recognition. It is, unfortunately, difficult for Council to refute publicly many of these false allegations. To refute them would require the divulging of information given to the Council by an applicant in confidence.

Many of the grants made to individuals enable them to buy essential equipment, to undertake research, to travel, to exhibit work and to improve their knowledge. A glass craftsman may be studying stained glass in Europe, a woodworker may be preparing work for an exhibition, a musician may be attending a master-class for tuition, or an Aboriginal may be writing a short history of his people in a particular region. Such projects tend to call for smaller grants.

A ring of precautions and procedures surrounds most of these grants. Recipients have to report on their work, or account in detail for their expenditure of the money. A grant is in effect a contract—it carries an obligation to undertake the promised work. Grants are not usually awarded for work which has already been created or performed. Instead they are given to promote, to stimulate. Understandably the grants would be more easily administered and supervised if they were paid only after the book had been written or the music composed; but retrospective grants would be a reward rather than a stimulus. To stimulate is the Council's main function.

Toleration and Discrimination

In awarding grants the Council believes that Australians of all political views, no matter how extreme or how eccentric their views, should be treated fairly. While some of the arts are not used for conveying ostensibly political messages, literature and the visual arts and drama sometimes are. It is Council's policy that playwrights, painters and other artists, with the necessary talent and stamina, should not be penalised because their message is offensive to people of certain political

complexions. It is too easily forgotten that many classical works of art were, at birth, highly offensive to influential groups.

There is perhaps one exception to this toleration. Several of the Boards do not award grants to artists who propose, in the work to be subsidised, to reveal secrets of Aboriginal religion—secrets which are sacred to certain Aboriginal tribes. The Australia Council at present is, probably more than any other government organisation in Australia, the custodian of Aboriginal arts and culture. Members believe that the Council has a special duty to protect and rejuvenate Aboriginal culture at this crucial era in the history of Aboriginal people. This duty, on rare occasions, becomes a form of censorship. Whether this is fully justifiable is open to debate.

The Council, in allotting funds to its Boards, shows positive discrimination in favour of Aboriginals. In proportion to population, Aboriginal arts are allotted funds which are many times larger than those given to the arts activities of the white population of Australia.

Many of the grants to individuals are indirectly commissions. They commission an artist to write a particular work of the artist's own choice. They commission a composer to write music for a flute, a writer to produce a novel or the script of a play, a painter to paint a mural, or-in the period when the Council had its own Film, Radio and Television Board-a film-maker to make a particular film. Naturally a payment made to an organisation possessing some capital can perhaps be deferred until the film or book is completed. A payment to individuals possessing little or no capital is often useless if it is not made when they are in greatest need: for instance, when they are earning no other income because they are working full-time at their art or craft. Payments to creative individuals are therefore usually paid in advance. Often the commissioned work does not reach fruition until long after the artists have received their last payment from the Council. There is an unpredictable time-lag between payment and production.

These advance payments are thus made for an activity which by its very nature cannot be closely supervised or artificially incubated. Nor can the activity be hurried unduly. Some able creative artists will always attempt to meet deadlines, and some can meet them. But many do outstanding work in defiance of any deadline. The Australia Council does not enforce deadlines for creative artists as distinct from performing artists and organisations. It simply ceases making payments when the period of a grant has come to an end. It receives progress reports on the work carried out by the artist and waits until the promised work is finally completed. The artist has no prospect of receiving another grant until his original work has

been completed and been submitted to Council. That indeed becomes his incentive.

A minority of artists do not complete the work they promised to complete. That proportion is small. It is the Council's task, largely through its Boards, to make it even smaller. At the same time every profession and trade has members who rarely complete what they were expected to complete. Moreover in many secure occupations in both the private and public sectors they continue to be paid year after year. In the creative arts in Australia that is impossible. Despite the work of the Australia Council, the dedicated individual artist works in relative insecurity. In the creative world, defeat and disillusion remain occupational hazards.

Grants to Organisations

Of the Council's grants to the arts, more money in aggregate was voted to arts organisations than to individual artists. The ten largest general grants for 1978–79 were:

The three highest grants are set out in the Federal Budget as single-line appropriations. In short, the Council, after discussion with the Music and Theatre Boards, recommends that certain sums be paid to those three organisations; but the final decision rests with the Minister and the Cabinet. Council, mainly through its seven Boards, determines the sum to be granted to every other arts organisation. It is Council's view, after two years' experience of the single-line appropriations for the major opera and ballet companies and their supporting orchestras, that the arts would probably gain by a reversion to the fomer method whereby Council received a lump sum and then apportioned it according to the needs of the arts as a whole. One disadvantage of the present method is that-under the preliminary Budget procedures-Council has to recommend to the Minister exactly how much should be voted to the top three organisations before clear evidence is available on their financial position and needs.

Council—with some exceptions—delegates to the seven Boards the prime decision on funding several hundred major and minor arts organisations. It is for each Board to decide how much of its own budget should be spent on these organisations. As applications for funds far exceed the funds available, the Boards have devised a set of guiding principles. The more important principles are set

out, before the running list of grants, in subsequent pages of this report.

Nearly all the organisations receiving a grant of more than \$50 000 from the Council are regular recipients of Council funds. Most are wellestablished bodies, with professional staff and a proven record of performance. Most also receive grants from State Ministries for the Arts.

The major organisations supply the Boards with a substantial flow of information: their audited balance sheet for the previous year, a report on how they spent the funds, tables of attendances and performances, estimates for the current year, and detailed projections for the forthcoming financial year. The Boards of the Australia Council thus possess a large bank of confidential information about the major arts organisations.

In deciding whether to allocate large sums of public money to these organisations, the Australia Council has a strong obligation to ensure that the grant is justified and that the previous grant was soundly spent. Medium-sized organisations and small arts groups occasionally complain that the Council demands too much information. There is no easy answer to this inevitable struggle between the merits of accountability and the dangers of incessant form-filling. But one fact is indisputable. The Council cannot be fully accountable to Parliament if Council itself lacks full knowledge of how its funds are spent.

A few of the major organisations complain that the Council attaches too many conditions or strings to their annual grant. In the year under review, the major organisations agreed to fulfil twenty-one 'conditions of grant'. For example they agreed to spend the money granted them in accordance with the proposals and plans which they had submitted to the Board. They agreed to submit to the Board, by a certain date, the audited accounts for each half-year. If the Board so requested, additional accounting records had to be forwarded. The organisation had to maintain 'accurate and detailed records' of seats sold, of complimentary tickets issued, of the performances given of each production, and of revenue received. Most of the conditions of grant simply stipulate that the theatre or ballet or other performing-arts company should carry out those procedures which are normal in any sound commercial venture or positively required under company law and common law.

In June 1979 the Australian Ballet Foundation issued a discussion booklet which drew attention, on page 12, to the difficulty and inconvenience caused by some of the Council's conditions of grant. It argued that 'technical breaches of some grant conditions are inevitable'. It pointed out that 'strict day-to-day adherence to each one' of these twenty-one conditions has become more and more

time-consuming and therefore costly. It is fair to reply that many of the conditions do not require strict day-to-day adherence. It is also fair to agree with the Australian Ballet Foundation that ways must be found of combining the maximum of accountability with the minimum of bureaucracy.

Some informed critics of the arts and some taxpayers argue that the Australia Council should impose even stricter conditions of grant. For instance they point out that several major organisations which receive six-figure or sevenfigure sums annually from the Australia Council rarely acknowledge that fact in their publicity. Full-page newspaper advertisements recently placed by one arts organisation record the support received from Qantas, Ansett, Telecom Australia, Utah, Jim Beam, G J Coles and other large corporations but nowhere do they hint that the combined subsidies received from all these generous donors were dwarfed by the grant received from taxpayers through the Australia Council. The Council was not even mentioned. Multiplying the conditions of grant sometimes reflects the failure by recipients to fulfil the simplest of all obligations.

Meeting a Crisis

The Australia Council is reluctant to interfere too closely in the affairs of major arts organisations. It believes that major organisations should be answerable primarily to their own electorate of members rather than to the Australia Council. If these organisations should fail to maintain artistic standards, fail to achieve their own goals, or lose unusually large sums of money, the main move to reform the organisation should come from its own members. A sick organisation should be capable of healing itself. One of the aims of the Australia Council, as formulated in clause five of the amended Act of 1976, is to promote 'the appreciation and understanding and enjoyment of the arts' by a wide range of people and groups. This aim will be met more readily if major organisations have a large active membership which takes pride in, and accepts responsibility for, the success of the organisation. Several major arts organisations, however, still have only a handful of members and a self-elected board.

Council is conscious that when a major arts company encounters a crisis, and the governing board of that company is partly responsible for creating that crisis, there should be an accepted mechanism whereby that board can, if necessary, be replaced or rejunvenated. It is not the task of the Australia Council to replace that board. If it does replace the board, then the new board becomes consciously or unconsciously an instrumentality of the Australia Council. The crisis in the Old Tote in 1978, and its inability to reform itself, should be a lesson both to the Australia Council and to the major arts organisations. The Old Tote might still be in existence if it had had an

electorate or some other body capable of placing pressure on its board and, if necessary, replacing that board.

The Australia Council has the power to withhold funds from an ailing arts organisation. That is sufficient power. It would be unwise if the Council had the power to replace the boards of major outside organisations and to select their successors. Broad government stimulus for the arts is to be encouraged. Detailed government control is to be avoided. The Council's 'conditions of grant' essentially demand sound management and not subservience.

Council has considered various forms of representation on the boards of major client organisations. On some arts organisations in Australia sit board members appointed by funding bodies. The Arts Council of Great Britain stipulates that an 'observer' of its choosing has the right to attend all board meetings of client companies. The Australia Council has not sought the right to appoint members of boards, and is currently introducing an observer system by mutual agreement with major companies. But there are difficulties. An observer is not bound by the same collective responsibility as the board members, and they can be understandably reluctant to talk freely in front of an 'outsider'. On the other hand, if Council appoints a board member, there is a danger that he may exercise undue influence as a result of his connection with Council. Simultaneously Council may be implicated in the board's decisions and have to shoulder major financial problems. The ideal remains a small, able, independent board, responsive to a large concerned membership and delegating responsibility to a competent and dedicated staff.

The Council is rarely able to offer more han one year's firm support to any organisation. A large drama or opera company would clearly gain from triennial funding, but Council is unable to commit itself that far ahead without an assurance, in turn, that the Federal Government will supply the necessary funds in the second and third years of a triennium. Council, however, is able each year to advise major organisations that in the coming year they will receive not less than 80 per cent of the present annual grant so long as Council's own total income is not reduced and so long as 'the organisation complied with the conditions of subsidy and was in a satisfactory financial position'.

Several of the Board programs offer the hope of funding arts groups for three years but these involve relatively small sums. The Community Arts Board will pay up to half of the salary of a community arts officer for a period of three years. Thereafter the municipal council or the community arts centre is expected to pay the entire salary.

In giving money to arts organisations the Australia Council almost invariably sees advantages in State governments, municipal councils and other donors giving additional support. The Council is not often the sole public backer of major arts organisations, though it is frequently the largest. The Council does not offer to fund regional theatres, and certain other arts organisations, unless the State and municipal governments also give support.

The dozens of small organisations which might receive \$400 or \$4000 for a sustaining grant or a particular project have first to specify in detail how they will spend the money. They also have to persuade the relevant Board that they are capable of achieving their aims. Thus the organisers of an arts festival in a country town or an ethnic gathering in a city must provide financial and artistic details of the whole program, describe the skills of the artists who are to be engaged, show that the gathering will receive support in money or kind within the community, and indicate the kind of audiences which will attend and what the festival will probably achieve.

To small organisations which rely on voluntary staff the paperwork will sometimes be burdensome. Often it helps, however, to clarify their own aims and to acquaint them with obstacles they must surmount, irrespective of whether they seek support from the Australia Council. For the staff and boards of the Australia Council the paperwork is also a burden. And yet the heavy expense of travelling in Australia in order to conduct interviews makes paper applications essential.

If a small arts organisation receives a grant it normally has to sign a document which sets out formally the terms and conditions of that grant. This is a contract and its terms have to be honoured. Later the arts organisation has to supply audited accounts which satisfy the Council that the money has been spent in the manner authorised. It also has to report on the success or failure of the arts venture which the grant was intended to subsidise. Nearly all arts organisations accept these rules as legitimate checks on the spending of public moneys and as vital guides to future plans for promoting the arts. If the rules should prove unnecessarily burdensome, or if they seem pedantic or arbitrary, arts organisations should write to the Council suggesting new conditions which simultaneously safeguard public funds and cut red tape. The Australia Council also has its own incentive for cutting red tape because mindless bureaucracy is mighty expensive.

Appeals and Reviews

The Australia Council has no formal tribunal to which dissatisfied applicants can appeal. At the same time individuals or organisations whose applications are rejected can seek a review of their application or apply again in the following year. Normally a Board does not give specific reasons for rejecting an application for funds. To engage in detailed correspondence with novelists, painters and music societies about the reasons why they did not receive a grant would call for a substantially enlarged administrative staff. The curbing of unnecessary administrative costs must always be one of the Council's aims.

The Council will always consider appeals from major organisations whose annual grant is likely to be reduced. These appeals are discussed by the full Council of some nineteen members. As major arts organisations can employ directly or indirectly several hundred people, and as their effect on the arts is considerable, the Council automatically reviews any recommendation from one of its Boards that the grant of a major organisation should be reduced. The full meeting of Council may endorse or over-rule a Board recommendation but it does not publish its reasons. When the Council endorsed, after an all-day discussion in August 1978, the Theatre Board's earlier recommendation not to continue to fund the Old Tote Theatre in Sydney, it did not publish the reasons though the Minister for Home Affairs was kept informed of the detailed arguments supporting the decision.

In the year 1979–80 the Council itself will review all the long-standing and major programs and schemes pursued by its Boards. What have those schemes achieved? How far have they stimulated the arts in Australia? Should some schemes—in the present economic climate—be drastically changed or phased out? While the turnover in the membership of Council and its Boards ensures that no scheme is static and unreviewed, this will be a more comprehensive review of government support for the arts than any previously attempted in this country.

In the last five years the Council's budget has fallen in real terms in every year except one—the year ending June 1978. This decline in part reflects the country's economic difficulties and in part it may reflect the idea that the arts budget is not always spent in keeping with the normal canons of accountability. That the directors of the Australian Ballet Foundation—and they include some of the country's most successful businessmen—should suggest publicly that the Australia Council's stewardship of public funds is now too rigorous and too conscientious is, in one sense, a welcome sign.

Council's last annual report set out the remarkable achievements in the arts during the past ten years—achievements which depended heavily on the generous government support of the late 1960s and early 1970s. Council hopes that, with renewed support from Federal and State governments, these achievements can be consolidated and built upon.

AUSTRALIA COUNCIL NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 1979

1. Statement of accounting policies:

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis, with the exception of depreciation. The effect of depreciation on the Australia Council's assets is shown in note 6. This accounting method is prescribed under Department of Finance policy for non-trading statutory authorities. Assets have been recorded at cost.

Purchases of films and video cassettes have been treated as expenditure. Additionally, items of furniture and equipment with a value less than \$50, previously recorded as assets, have been written off in accordance with Department of Finance practices. In both cases this action was taken to reflect their consumable nature. Consequently, Losses/disposals of assets includes \$52,524 representing the book value of films and video cassettes in the accounts at 1 July 1978; and \$12,100 of other consumable items.

In prior years the Trust Account has been used for both trust and suspense transactions. The 1978–79 Statement of Receipts and Payments for the Trust Account has been prepared for both the current year and the 1977–78 comparative year to include only trust items.

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

Grants Lists 1978–79 And Introductory Statements

Aboriginal Arts Board

The Aboriginal Arts Board consists solely of Aboriginals. They are selected from nominations made mainly by Aboriginal community organisations and are generally involved in arts and cultural programs in their own communities, thus ensuring effective consultation between the Board and the programs it supports.

The Board's main effort is concentrated in three areas; firstly, supporting the practice of traditional Aboriginal culture; secondly, disseminating knowledge about it, among both Aboriginals and non-Aboriginals, by exhibitions, performances, publications and the sale of artefacts; and, thirdly, by providing means by which those Aboriginals who have lost touch with the traditional ways can be encouraged to establish new contacts with them and find fresh forms of artistic expression in their search for a new bi-cultural identity.

Support for the arts

Unlike those Boards of the Australia Council concerned with specific art forms, the Aboriginal Arts Board has to provide support across a wide spectrum of the arts. The arts are now vital to Aboriginal people, both as a means of preserving cultural identity and as a way of gaining enough income to escape poverty and deprivation. Art is an integral part of the social and ceremonial behaviour of Aboriginals and much of the emphasis of the Board's work is therefore on supporting the creation and performance of traditional dances, music and crafts. This is done mainly through the Aboriginal Cultural Foundation in Darwin and the Aboriginal Artists Agency, but assistance is also given to local communities where traditional arts are still practised, to enable them to set up basic structures for the marketing of artefacts.

Literature

Traditionally Aboriginal people had no written literature—the stories, myths and legends being passed down orally from generation to generation. In many areas, however, the Aboriginal people have now established literature recording programs in order to preserve their oral tradition and the Board provides assistance to such programs, for the purchase of equipment, payments to story-tellers, transcribers and illustrators as well as production subsidies for bi-lingual texts.

The Board also assists individual Aboriginal writers with special purpose grants for research or writing. projects and subsidises the publication of works written by Aboriginals.

Film and video

The Board see film as an important medium for the dissemination of knowledge about traditional Aboriginal art and culture, and also as a medium to allow Aboriginals to present interpretations of and reactions to their own situation. Assistance is therefore provided to individuals and groups for training in film techniques and for the production costs of films and video tapes in which Aboriginals are involved.

Criteria

In assessing applications for grants, the Board considers whether the project will assist and encourage the continuation, revival and knowledge of Aboriginal culture. It determines whether there is local support, self-help and adequate planning, and whether the applicant can carry out the project and provide sound financial management. If the project has received support in previous years the Board also considers whether it will become increasingly self-sufficient, and what alternative sources of funding have been sought. The Board has to decide, on the basis of these criteria, whether the proposal compares favourably with those of other applicants.

Community Arts Board

The primary purpose of the Community Arts Board is to serve as a bridge between the arts and the community. It brings together the work of all the other Boards, that of the Council itself, and of Federal, State and local governments, in order to stimulate a wider involvement in the arts by the community. Its main responsibility is for projects involving more than one art form, such as arts centres, workshops and festivals. It is also responsible for meeting the needs of particular community groups, such as the ethnic communities, and those in outer suburban or disadvantaged and remote areas.

Grants program

The grants program consists of nine specific categories. Through it the Board provides support for a wide range of community activities. Basic annual grants are considered for established community organisations involving more than one art form, providing the group works at the local community level outside formal arts institutions. Community arts centres and workshops are also supported.

The Board accepts applications from local authorities for subsidies towards the salaries of Community Arts Officers and Field Officers. These are made on the basis of up to 50 per cent of an annual salary up to \$14 000 for an initial twelve month period, with a normal maximum of two further years.

Support is also provided for the arts content of festivals, celebrations and happenings, programs which take the arts to the people in an extension capacity, and projects which communicate the community arts message through seminars, publications and public radio. Limited support is available for study/travel.

For the last two years the Community Arts Board has operated a Pilot Project scheme to encourage projects in any art form which are innovatory in relation to the community group and art forms involved, and are designed to stimulate new interest in communities which may not otherwise be actively aware of the arts. Pilot projects frequently involve consultation and co-funding with the specialist arts boards of the Council, State Government departments, and other agencies such as tertiary institutions and private sponsors.

An area of significant development over the past few years has been the ethnic, folk and traditional arts. The Board accepts the multicultural nature of the Australian community and provides support for the practice and presentation of ethnic, folk and traditional arts activities. Although these are mainly non-professional and voluntary, assistance is given towards fees for teachers, composers, choreographers, and for the replacement of costumes and musical instruments, particularly when such items are not available in Australia. To raise standards, a small number of grants are given to bring overseas teachers to Australia, and to enable artists to study in other countries.

Criteria

In assessing applications for grants, the Community Arts Board considers whether the project will extend access to, participation in and enjoyment of the arts and raise artistic standards; whether there is evidence of community need and interest, demonstrated by adequate planning, self-help and local support; and whether the applicant is capable of carrying out the project and ensuring sound financial management. If the project has received support in previous years the Board also assesses whether it will become increasingly self-sufficient. Finally, the Board has to decide whether the claim, based on these criteria, compares favourably with those of other applicants.

Crafts Board

The aims of the Crafts Board are to encourage continuing improvement in the quality of crafts practised in Australia; to provide greater opportunities for craftsmen to earn a living; to foster wider community access to the crafts; and to create an awareness of Australian crafts overseas and of crafts of other countries within Australia. The Board works for the improvement of education and training in the crafts and gives priority to professional training and workshop experience and to the development of resource materials to meet educational needs at all levels. It is both a funding and an advisory body, providing assistance to organisations and individuals through its grants programs; and directing special attention to areas of particular need through its program of exhibitions, films, information resources and community craft projects.

Assistance to individuals

The Board places particular emphasis on increasing opportunities for craftspeople to make a living from their craft and to extend personal development through specialist training, communication, the exchange of ideas with other craftspeople and critical appraisal. In 1978–79 this was achieved through Study and Research Grants, Workshop Development Grants, Special Project Grants, Production Workshop Grants and Craftsman Training Grants. Grants ranged from \$2200 a year for compensation for loss of time paid to a Master Craftsman who takes on a trainee under the Craftsman Training program, to \$10 000 a year under the Senior Fellowship program.

Assistance to organisations

Grants are made to professional organisations, amateur groups and specialist groups for projects aimed at extending activities and encouraging the development of new ones to raise the levels of achievement within the group. The continuing activities of groups are expected to be mainly self-supporting. Grants are usually made for specific projects, such as the purchase of new equipment, summer schools and lectures, the production of resource material, exhibitions, and other forms of promotional activity. Grants for administrative costs are made only to the Crafts Council of Australia and the State Crafts Councils, which operate as national or State co-ordinating bodies. These bodies also receive assistance for their programs of activities.

Exhibitions program

The Board sees a balanced exhibition program as being vital to the development of the crafts in Australia. It provides assistance to organisations and institutions, as well as initiating its own program of exhibitions to complement the programs of State and regional galleries. Support is available for exhibitions in community places, for craft exhibitions in museums and galleries, for overseas exhibitions of Australian crafts and for exhibitions here of craft from other countries. The Board also provides subsidies for the purchase of important works of contemporary craft for public collections in the form of a percentage of the total cost of the work—varying from 40 to 70 per cent according to the type of collection involved—up to a maximum of \$5000 for a single work.

Craftsman-in-residence program

The aim of this program is to enable a creative artist to live and work in a community, attached to either an educational institution or a community organisation, in order to increase contact between craftspeople and the community. Assistance is given up to 50 per cent of the costs involved.

Criteria

In assessing the many applications it receives the Crafts Board has to decide whether the project is compatible with its overall objectives and complies with the criteria established for its particular category of grant. For individual grants it has to decide whether the applicant's work is of sufficient standard, whether he or she has the ability to carry out the project effectively and whether the benefit of the grant to the individual and/or the community would justify the grant. For organisations, it takes into account whether the project will extend people's expectations and achievements, will lead to improved standards and understanding, is relevant to community needs, and furthers the promotion of the crafts.

Literature Board

The aim of the Literature Board is to encourage all forms of Australian creative writing: in the first place by direct grants to writers and secondly by subsidising and promoting the finaished work.

Direct grants to writers

About two-thirds of the Board's annual expenditure goes in grants to writers: in the form of fellowships (ranging from \$5000 a year for a one-year Young Writers Fellowship to \$11 000 a year for a three-year Senior Writers Fellowship); special purpose grants to assist writers to meet travel, research and other expenses in connection with particular projects; and Literary Pensions.

Literary Pensions, which are paid to a limited number of outstanding literary figures, cannot be applied for. All other writers' grants are made on the basis of written applications received between early February and the end of May each year. As funds are limited only some 5 per cent on average of the thousand or so applications received annually are successful and strict criteria for assessment have to be applied. The Board's members must satisfy themselves that the writer has the necessary talent and persistence to produce a work of high quality; that his production of it would be retarded or impaired if the grant were not made; and that the completed work is likely to find a publisher. Successful applicants are expected to devote themselves to their writing during the period of their Fellowship and, after it is completed, to give the Board a copy of written work achieved.

Publishing subsidies

The Board encourages the publication of Australian work of high quality by offering subsidies to publishers, priority being given to the support of adult fiction, drama and poetry, though some assistance is also given to non-fiction, anthologies and children's books. Although the support given to publishers is modest in overall terms (amounting to some \$200 000 a year against a total publishing turnover of Australian books of \$100 million a year), its help has been vital in making publication possible in areas in which the needs have been greatest and the rewards, traditionally, cultural and long-term rather than immediately financial.

Promotion

The Board has an active and growing program of support for the promotion of Australian literature, both at home and overseas. In Australia it has sponsored or originated projects and pilot schemes to foster interest in Australian creative writing and, through the National Book Council, has subsidised a number of promotional activities. Its overseas program includes support for exchange visits by writers and literary critics, seminars on Australian literature in overseas centres, displays of Australian books overseas, and assistance with the translation of Australian works into other languages.

Literary magazines and organisations

The Board has continued the practice established by the Commonwealth Literary Fund of supporting well-established and prominent literary magazines, including Australian Literary Studies, Meanjin, New Poetry, Overland, Poetry Australia, Quadrant, Southerly and Westerly. It has also given support on a less regular basis to smaller magazines.

Assistance is given to national writers' organisations and other literary bodies, in the form of grants, averaging around \$6000 a year, for general administrative expenses and expansion. Organisations supported in this way include the National Book Council, the Australian Society of Authors, the Fellowship pf Australian Writers, the Australian Writers Guild, the Children's Book Council of Australia and the Australian Library Promotion Council.

Educational activities

The Board supports projects aimed at encouraging greater awareness and knowledge of Australian creative writing in educational circles. It has subsidised literary seminars and writers' workshops; it assists tertiary institutions on a regular basis to fund writers-in-residence, theatre companies to engage playwrights-in-residence; and in 1978 and 1979 it subsidised pilot Writers-in-Schools programs in Victoria and Tasmania which it hopes to extend to other States.

Music Board

The Music Board's functions are to encourage and support the development of music in Australia and of Australian music and musicians overseas. The Board aims to stimulate composition, extend opportunities for musicians, encourage extension and diversity in music training, support community music needs, and develop the exchange of information and musical resources between groups, both within Australia and internationally.

Financial assistance is available from the Board for a wide range of musical activities in programs grouped under four main headings; composition, performance, education and documentation. The Board also provides subsidies for major performing and servicing organisations, such as the Australian Opera, the AETT Orchestras, four State Opera companies, Musica Viva Australia, the Australian Chamber Orchestra and the Australia Music Centre—at which a full-time Music Co-ordinator is based.

Composition

The Board offers financial support to Australian composers through a series of fellowships, ranging from \$6000 for a Young Composers Fellowship for twelve months, to \$13 000 a year for a maximum of three years for a Senior Composers Fellowship. It makes Special Purpose awards up to \$1000 for short-term projects of demonstrated value and gives grants of up to 75 per cent of a composer's fee for assisting in the commissioning of new works. A Composers-in-Residence scheme is also funded.

Performance

Through its performance program the Board seeks to involve as many people as possible in active participation in music. Although it will consider applications from all kinds of societies, professional performing ensembles and entrepreneurs, preference is given to those which develop audience involvement and improve opportunities for concert experiences in areas not well served by concerts. Support is also given to applications from schools, tertiary institutions and other organisations for musicians-in-residence, though applicants are expected to provide a substantial financial contribution. In association with Musica Viva Australia, support is given to a limited number of overseas tours by Australian groups of the highest professional standing.

Education

The Board supports a wide range of education programs. Direct grants to musicians include National Fellowships of \$4000, International Fellowships of \$6000 and Special Purpose Awards of up to \$1000. In addition the Board pays up to 50 per cent of the cost institutions and organisations incur in arranging specialised teaching programs involving musicians of eminence. Master classes, workshops, lectures and working seminars are also funded. Assistance is provided for the establishment of ensembles in metropolitan and regional areas and for youth orchestras, music camps and other forms of community music that will stimulate music experience in areas not affording easy access to conventional forms of concert experience.

Documentation

As the artistic activities of a nation grow, accurate documentation and recording becomes essential. The Board therefore provides subsidies for the production of recordings of Australian compositions and performers and for the publication of Australian music books and journals dealing with Australian music, music research and musicianship.

Criteria

In assessing applications for assistance the following criteria are considered:

- the demonstrated capacity of the applicant to carry out the project or program successfully;
- the availability of suitably qualified personnel in the area to conduct the project;
- the value of the project or program in the context of national priorities and growth;
- the potential for influencing the quality of music in Australia;
- the extent of prior and proposed commitment on the part of the applicant, both in terms of funds and effort, compared with requested subsidy;
- · the acceptability of an organisation's constitution;
- evidence, in situations involving travel, that the applicant has fully utilised and benefited from local resources and opportunities (teachers, courses, employment etc.).

Theatre Board

The Theatre Board's aim is to improve the quality of the content, performance and production of dance, drama, puppetry and mime and to ensure the maximum public access to them. The Board provides opportunities for professional theatre people to work at and develop their skills, encourages growth in theatre attendance and promotes community involvement in live theatre. It provides continuing support for some thirty drama, dance and puppetry companies which attract audiences running into millions annually.

Assistance is made available in two main categories, Project Grants and General Grants. Other specialised grant programs are announced from time to time.

Project grants

Assistance in the form of direct grant, guarantee against loss, or loan, is available to individuals and organisations. It enables them to present public performances, arrange training programs, provide for visiting theatre people and undertake other projects of special merit, especially those which encourage innovation, the development of new audiences, or the theatre interests of ethnic and national groups.

General grants

General grants, which constitute the Board's major outlay, are given to professional organisations offering the highest standards of performance and/or training. In dance, the Board supports the national company (The Australian Ballet) and regional companies serving all States. In drama, the Board aims to finance at least one properly subsidised non-commercial theatre company in each State, but it regards as of equal importance the funding of other professional companies, especially those concentrating on the development and presentation of new theatre styles and new writers. The Board also supports a limited number of companies in puppetry.

Among the specialised grant schemes are the following:

Drama directors' theatre designers' development

Through this grant scheme the Theatre Board provides the nurturing ground for theatre artists of proven potential and talent, to develop their directorial or design skills. Applicants must present a self-planned program of practical work in the theatre, which may be undertaken through existing theatre companies, community theatres and new groups. The emphasis of the program varies according to the interests of the applicants and ranges from experimentation in theatre techniques to working in country and remote areas. Grants are calculated on a maximum of \$11 000 for any one full year, varying with the program proposed and length of time involved. This sum includes provision for fares and expenses, as well as accommodation and living expenses.

Community regional theatre

The Board offers establishment assistance for the development of community and regional theatres. Any initial assistance provided by the Board is conditional on the project receiving at least matching State government and local funding. Programs must also produce evidence from the applicant and local bodies that demonstrates specific needs for theatre in the chosen district. Any further assistance is on a reducing basis up to five years by which time the project has to be fully sustained from other sources. In cases where applicants have not substantially familiarised themselves with the region, consideration will be given to providing some assistance for a six months establishment and research period. Applicants must have both State government and local financial support for the research proposed.

Criteria

In assessing applications for grants the Theatre Board considers, first, quality, then audience reach, and community participation as appropriate. Quality criteria include the standards of production and performance, innovation in content and production, and the development of theatre skills especially at the professional level. The criteria for audience reach include size of audience, increase in audience, and extension to new audiences who for sociological or geographical reasons do not normally attend theatre. Where community participation is involved the key factors are the number of participants and the extent of expected future benefits to both the participants and others. Finally, the Board takes into account the artistic and financial soundness of previous activities and current proposals, and compares the application with other requests in the light of funds available.

The Board's overriding commitment is to the creation of a climate in which the theatre arts will flourish.

Visual Arts Board

The Visual Arts Board provides assistance to individuals and organisations working across a wide spectrum of the visual arts in Australia, from painting and sculpture to architecture and museology. Its programs include grants to individuals, the commissioning and placing of works of art in public places, support for artists in residence, and the acquisition, exhibition and conservation of works of art.

Grants to individuals

Grants are available to artists who have achieved a high degree of professional competence in their field. They must be of Australian nationality or have lived in Australia for a minimum of two years prior to their application, and must produce evidence of recent high-quality work. The purpose of the grants is to provide time for creative work, by freeing the artists from other employment; to assist with short-term projects; or to cover travel expenses for specific projects. Individual grants up to a maximum of \$12 000 may be made, and successful applicants must produce a written report on completion of the project.

Artists programs

The Board supports several programs designed to assist artists in other ways. The Artists Trainceship program provides an opportunity for talented emerging artists to work in professional workshops with established artists. The Artists-in-Residence program creates new, stimulating working situations for artists which enable them to contribute to the artistic consciousness of the community by placing them in a challenging working situation which at the same time gives them a secure period for productive work. The Visiting Artists program sponsors visits to Australia by significant artists from overseas, and the Artists Studios Overseas program provides access to several overseas studios and fellowships which are made available to Australian artists for long or short periods, not necessarily with financial assistance from the Board. Since competition for grants is great, the Board's assessment policies are strictly implemented. Audited statements of expenditure are usually called for in addition to a written report from the artist participating.

Public art and exhibitions programs

The Board considers that one of its most important functions is to bring the community into contact with significant works of contemporary Australian art; and its public art program is designed to place works of art in public places, including civic centres, city plazas and gardens, universities, schools, libraries and government buildings. Grants made under this program are intended to supplement available funds, and the Board expects the commissioning body to provide evidence of local enthusiasm and strong support for the project. The works commissioned may be paintings, sculpture, prints or photographs but only a limited number of grants is available.

The Australian Contemporary Art Acquisition program is designed to assist public art museums (other than those fully funded by the Federal Government) to acquire significant works by living Australian artists. The applying institutions must guarantee genuine public access and regular display, acceptable storage conditions and proper security arrangements. The works must be selected by curators professionally qualified, competent and experienced in the visual arts, and be acquired directly from the artist (or through his or her agent) for the first sale. Following satisfaction of these and other requirements grants from \$1000 to \$7500 may be made.

The Visual Arts Board gives limited assistance to exhibitions in institutions which are seen as complementing the programs of State and regional art museums. It also provides some support for the publication of scholarly works on the visual arts in Australia.

Council Programs

In addition to the schemes conducted by the Boards the Council maintains several central programs and funds other activities in support of the arts.

International Program Much of the Council's work in supporting international projects such as travelling exhibitions, touring of performing companies, and cultural exchanges is carried out by the Boards, and for this purpose they have access to specially allocated funds. However a central fund is maintained also, to meet emergent needs and to provide for projects of a general nature.

Research Studies are commissioned from University departments and private research firms to provide information for policy development and program planning. The lack of adequate Census data on the arts or of systematic research by other bodies makes Council sponsorship of surveys essential. The research results are made available to other organisations and individuals.

Education and the Arts. In association with the Schools Commission and the Arts Council of Australia, continuing steps are being taken to enhance the role of the arts in schools and colleges. The program is designed to implement recommendations contained in a nine-volume report on education and the arts released in 1978.

Arts Information The provision of information and reference material for the arts community and the general public is a valuable form of support for the arts. Material is produced in a variety of media including booklets (some in languages other than English), discussion papers, educational kits, directories, films, radio programs and newspapers.




